Did you know that more than ninety percent of the merchants of Clarendon are country boys grown up? Did you know that 78 percent of the bankers of Texas, 87 percent of the preachers, 72 percent of the doctors and 94 percent of the lawyers of Texas were born on a farm?

Your boys and girls have the same right to expect an equal chance as any other folks in the world. Your young people are just as intelligent, just as well qualified and just as appreciative as those of any section.

You fellows who went a round and ahalf with the Georgia stock to clean a middle would not think of farming in that manner today in competing with men using modern machinery. Are you willing to permit your children to go out into the world with a Georgia-stock education to compete with the tractor-trained mind?

If one is in doubt as to the advisability of carrying life insurance, ask some widow-she can tell you. If you would learn the value of an education, ask some fellow like Homer Mulkey who grew up as a "pudden-footed" country boy where he had no chance.

With a paved highway from east to west and graded lateral roads next year, our young folks can drive in to school from any part of the county and live at home thus saving a board bill

There will be no letup on the part of the editor of this paper until every "puddin'-footed" kid in the county has an equal chance. The writer was a "puddin-footed" country boy at one time with no capital except a burning desire to go to school beyond the small ungraded makeshift of that day. He went, but believe me folks, it is a man's job to battle your way up the line when you're broke. Wearing second hand clothing and frailing dishwater is no disgrace, but I don't want my boys to travel the road I have gone over, or your boys or your girls either.

A great many people are wondering why cotton is not a higher price than it is today, from the fact that we have had comparative ly three short crops in this country. If they will read Mr. Greenwood's article, they will not be surprised that our cotton is selling as low as it is today.

Our farmer, at present is growing cotton in competition with Egypt, India, Africa, China, Peru and several of the smaller countries where the farm labor is about 20 cents a day and our cotton will continue to grow cheaper every where until our farmers commence to grow better cotton or the better staple. The farmers of Texas and Oklahoma in the past few years have talked turn-out and forgot the grade of cotton that they were growing.

Cotton that will make 30 per cent turn-out and bring 20c per pound is more profitable than cotton that will make a turn-out of 40 per cent and bring 10c or 12c nothing of the profit anticipated per pound.


