ing and a good sanitation program. For the latter he recommends spraying with carbolineum one part and kerosene four or five parts to keep down external parasites. As a further precaution do not place young pullets in the same house with old birds. If this is not possible, cull all of the light weight, emaciated, crippled and grey-eyed birds before putting them into house with the older hens. Here's a further safeguard. In buying replacement stock inquire how much of the disease is present in the flock which produced the eggs. If you have an outbreak of the disease, talk to your County Extension agents.


