Farm Help For eterans

Soldier-farmers returning from the war should be helped in buying farms, J. H. Wood of Upper Darby, Pa., regional director of the Farm Security Administration, declared in a General Elec-

tric Farm Forum address recently. Speaking of the veterans' needs, Mr. Wood said: "This is what they tell me they want: first of all, credit-credit for the purchase of equipment, seed, feed, fertilizer.

"Secondly, these boys need technical guidance. They need experienced supervisors to advise them how to keep records, what to grow for the market and what to grow for home canning and consumption. They want to know how to run their farms and homes efficiently and economically.

"These veterans also want medical care plans such as the Farm Security Administration sponsors in co-operation with county and state medical societies. They want their doctor and hospital bills prorated so that no accident or illness that they never again can hope to farm prosperously.

"They want purchasing and marketing advantages that come from membership in co-opera-tives. They want to belong to groups that buy fram materials in wholesale lots and sell produce as an organization rather than as an individual, in order to cut costs."

If you want to buy feed on a scientific financial basis, you ought to get acquainted with "Belinda", the

wonder cow. ("Belinda" is the pen name used by dairy experts at Michi-gan State College.)
In addition to being an accom-plished letter-writer, "Belinda" now proves herself a mathematical that automatically tells the comparative price values of feeds for dairy cows when such feeds are used in a balanced ration. All you need is a ruler to tell whether the price of a feed is too high, "O.K.," or a bargain. To secure this device, write to Michigan State College, Dairy Extension, East Lansing, Michigan.* Ask for the Dairy News Letter for October-November, 1943.

Now that we've talked about your calf's mother, let's talk about his fodder.

Point 8 in the government's 8-point program for more milk production is the raising of calves with less milk By starting calves on grain and hay at 2 weeks of age and by using home mixed or approved calf meals, the whole-milk feeding period can be shortened and more milk can be sent

For practical help on this subject, write the Agricultural Extension Service, University of Nebraska, Lincoln Nebraska *

It will also be worth your while to send for Circulars 326 and 308, issued by the College of Agriculture, University of Wisconsin, Madison,

Well, I always say a calf is just one thing after an udder.

Speaking of udders, there seems to be more mastitis (garget, mammitis) about than ever before. So don't be too sure that some of your cows aren't infected. The safe thing to do is to check right now with thybromol or a strip cup. If your veterinarian is equipped to run a Whiteside or Hotis test, so much the better. Both Missouri and Wisconsin have booklets on this subject. Write for Circular 385 Agricultural Extension Service University of Missouri, Columbia ouri. Write the Extension Service of the College of Agriculture, University of Wisconsin, Madison, Wisconsin,* for their Special Circular on preventing mastitis.

When you look at the 1944 milk production goal of 102% over 1943, it looks pretty difficult.

But all the reasons why it can't be done look very small compared to just one reason why it must be done. That reason is that your country needs the milk and the products made from it, and a good share of it is eded for your sons and rela-

tives in the service.

It has been estimated that cattle grubs are a \$50,000,000 pest. If your cows are afflicted with them, you're paying part of this bill. The Extension Service of our state college has available a bulletin that gives specific instructions on how to get rid of these pests. Your Uncle Bob suggests that you write right away for Bulletin E-562, Agriculture and Mechanical College of Texas, College Station, Texas.

It would also be a good idea to write Mississippi State College, State College, Mississippi,* for Circular 123 on this same subject. In this circular, Mississippi also points out that it is time to rid your cattle of internal parasites and gives suggestions for treatment.

I'm always a little amazed when I run into a dairy farmer who is trying to battle out his problems all by himself. So much wasted effort and money, too, could be saved, if he would write to our State College of Agriculture. Experiments have been conducted and literature is available on almost any subject you can think of. The combined talent and experience of many capable men is available for the asking, so why not ask?

If you haven't got storage space for all the silage you'd like to plan on having this summer, you'll be interested in a bulletin from the Extension Service of our state agricultural college. This bulletin tells how to expand your permanent upright silage space with trench silos,

and tells you how to construct them. Trench silos are very inexpensive to build and they make it possible to adjust the amount of silage stored according to the number of cattle you have or plan to have. Write for Extension Bulletin B-84, Agriculture and Mechanical College of Texas, College Station, Texas.



New Shoe Stamp Valid May 1

A new ration stamp will be good for a pair of shoes beginning May 1st, but one of the two coupons now in use-No. 18 in ration book I-will expire April 30.

The Office of Price administration, announcing this said that despite a continuing tight supply of leather "it is expected that shoe rationing can be maintained at about the present level" of two

The new valid stamp, which will be good indefinitely will be designated shortly before May 1,

OPA said. Today's action will leave two shoe stamps in use as at present, since airplane stamp No. 1 in ration book 3 is also good indefi-

How To Get Ready For Canning

Homemakers who wait until the garden season is well advanced before they get their canning equipment in shape are running a big risk, warns Mrs. Winifred J. Leverenz of the Texas A&M College Extension Service. Mrs. Leverenz, who is Extension food preservation specialist, says equipment people are busy making repairs and supplying parts, and further delay may mean the loss of days or weeks in getting equipment in tip-top shape.

There are some kinds of checking homemakers can do for themselves, the specialist points out. For example, they can check their jars to be sure there are no cracked or chipped ones set aside for use this year. Re-use of war-time tin cans is not recommended by the Extension Service since these often become discolored, rusty, and corroded. Usually the seams are not suitable for reflanging. Mrs. Leverenz also warns against reusing war-time rubber rings.

"Smell rubber rings when you are buying them," she advises. 'Avoid getting rings which smell strongly like rubber tires or tubes, since this affects flavor and odor

Homemakers should make certain the rings they buy are suitable for the type of closure they intend to use, and they should follow carefully the instructions which come with war-time jars, closures, and tin cans.

Throughout Texas, home demonstration agents and experienced home demonstration club women who have been canning successfully for years are helping less experienced homemakers test their pressure cookers and check other equipment. In testing Victory model cookers, ordinarily made of steel with valve or weight-type gauges, Mrs. Leverenz recommends leaving the maximum thermometer in the cooker for 10 to 15 minutes. In the pre-war models three to five minutes was sufficient.
