MEATS, FATS-Brown stamps Y and Z in Book Three are good through March 20. Red 10-point stamps A8, B8, and C8 in Book Four are good through May 20. Waste kitchen fats are redeemed at two ration points plus four cents a pound.

Postal Rates Will Change March 26

Postal authorities as well as the general public may now settle down to a close study of the new postal rates to be in effect after March 26th, stated Postmaster J. C. Estlack Wednesday.

Take the clerks waiting upon the patrons at the parcel post window, one of the favorite stands of revenue for Uncle Sam. The old rates will have to be revised from start to finish to comply with rate increases in all zones, "We should have an immediate 'face lifting' on the parcel post scales that compute the charges as the package is weighed," the postmaster remarked.

Some Increases Double

Rate increases in some departments will be double. Examples are to be found in the fees charged for insured packages, and c.o.d. mail. The rate on c.o.d. packages up to \$5 in value, will increase from 12 cents to 24 cents. On insured packages up to \$5 valuation, the rate will be 10 cents instead of

Money order fees on values of 1-cent to \$2.50 will be 10 cents in- * WORTH WHILE stead of 6 under the new rate. The new rate on a \$100 money order will be 37 cents instead of 22 + cents, and other rates will change in proportion.

Registry fees will increase 5 cents on values up to \$5 and thence in proportion.

Parcel post rates under the new schedule will mean slightly increased rates for books, packages, and various types of printed matter to all zones.

The 3-cent rate on first-class letter mail will remain in effect. Drop letter rates will not be changed here, but the 2-cent rate on letters mailed in rural mail boxes will require a 3-cent stamp after March 26th. In other words, there will be no 2-cent letter rate "to or from" the rural lines with this change
