The 1933 session of the Northwest Texas Annual Conference of the Methodist church will be in session here from next Wednesday the 8th, closing on Monday of the 13th. Bishop H. A. Boaz of Hous-

This Conference organized in 1910 has met here once since that time in 1920. It comprises nine presiding elder districts: Amarillo, L. N. Lipscomb; Abilene, W. M. Murrell; Clarendon, M. M. Beavers; Lubbock, C. A. Bickley; Perryton, J. E. Eldridge; Plainview, W. L. Tittle; Stamford, G. S. Slover; Sweetwater, O. P. Clark; Vernon, R. A. Stewart.

In addition to the above named presiding elders, there are two hundred and twenty regular pastors and forty retired pastors.

The territory extends from Vernon on the east to Abilene on the south. Midland on the southwest and at present, extends north and includes the Panhandle strip of Oklahoma. There is a combined membership of 77,000. Church property is valued at \$4,111,775.00 with three hundred and six structures. Two hundred parsonages are valued at \$598,000.00.

There is an enrollment of 4,617 in the 327 Sunday schools. The Epworth Leagues number 333 with a membership of 9,276. W. M. S. societies number 229 with 6,338 members. Additions to the church last year totaled 7.430. Total cash receipts of the Conference district for the past year is \$697,606.00.

Bishop Boaz will read the announcement of appointments of preachers for the coming year at the close of the service Sunday evening. Bishop Boaz will preach Elder Sanders Will Preach at the morning service.

After Thursday, Bishop A. Frank Smith will preach twice daily, at 11:45 a. m. and at 7:30 each evening. The Bishop has this time to devote to his people and will no doubt be given hearings by large congregations at each service. He is said to be one of the best in Methodism today. Local members are elated to know that they are to entertain two bishops over the week, one of whom will devote his time to inspirational ders who has been doing some good messages.

Pastor E. B. Bowen in speaking of the Conference said: "The entire community is cordially invited to attend at any time. You will be welcome. We are especially anxious to have you hear Bishop Smith twice each day, and Bishop Boaz on Sunday morning."

There will be about ninety official lay delegates. In addition to these, there will be a large number of preacher's wives, laymen and onnectional representatives from Nashville, Tenn., Louisville, Ky., St. Louis, Mo. and other places.

In the backwoods of Alabama thirty-six school districts are without school this season because of a lack of funds. In Chicago, not classed in the backwoods, no school tax has been collected since 1932, but they carry on somehow.

We are not saying that these thousand and one new ideas of the so-called brain trust are not a good thing, but we will say that if they do work out just right, it will be the first time in the history of the world when a poverty-stricken people ever recovered on a credit.

Those who accuse the Ferguson administration of job selling at this time would likely find it hard to explain why Ferguson appointed rangers are rounding up the alleged job sellers. But then we are likely to read any thing in the subsidized press.

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




