
# **GET MILLIONS IN CONSERVING SOIL**

STATUES OF PIONEER MOTHERS.

There never has been a statue of a pioneer mother that accurately told the story. A woman standing holding a child and peering toward the west with the breezes fanning her skirt does not begin to portray her as she existed in

The old-time pioneer mother tramped behind oxen teams foot-sore and tired. Often she carried her babythe babe born in a log hut without medical aid.

She made her home in a half dugout on the far flung, wind swept plains where mesquite brush became her clothesline. She guarded her little brood with the aid of a gun and unerring aim against Indians and outlaws.

But she stuck and western civilization became a reality because of the grit and determination of mothers who knew not fear in any form.

ALIENS AND THE LABOR SITUATION.

Congressman Martin Dies of Texas protests against America's alien population. Meaning of course that those who have no legal residency in our nation.

"The Alien Menace of America" will be the subject of Mr. Dies' talk over the NBC broadcasting system the evening of June 21st from 9:30 to 10 p. m.

He proposes that a law be passed stopping foreign emigration from every country. Not only that, but he wants those illegal residents sent back home. He says that we have 3,500,000 aliens in the nation who have gained entrance unlawfully.

Congressman Dies wants Americans to have the jobs now being absorbed by the six million aliens and those who have not complied with the requirements of citizenship.

Protesting against the Dies idea comes first the Jewish members of our national lawmaking bodies. Next the factory district registers a protest as the aspect of higher priced labor looms when the cheap hands of southern Europe are sent away.

It is one of the few purely American protection laws advanced in the several years of our alleged depression. The passage of such a law would materially help.

In the southwest, thousands of Mexicans, a few Japs and Chinese gain entrance to Uncle Sam's domain each year without complying with any legal requirements. The Orientals are smuggled in, and the Mexicans come over the Rio Grande at their leisure because border patrols are not sufficient in number to keep them out.



Applications For Aid From Rural Schools Under Way

Austin, June 5.—Examination of applications for aid from rural \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* school superintendents was under way again this week as Texas Relief Commission officials were formally notified by federal authorities that money for the program will be allotted from Federal Emegency Relief Administration funds

"We already have approved applications from 454 schools and have begun the examination of applications from 648 more," said Adam R. Johnson, state relief director. "School superintendents are reminded that all applications found to be in order will be approved immediately. Those not in order will be returned to superintendents. Checks to teachers will go forward as soon as money for the program is received from Washington."

The 1,102 applications received by the Texas Relief Commission request \$864,107.27 to pay the salaries of 6,940 teachers and 655 bus drivers, who continued to perform their duties in order that their school might proceed to the end of their normal terms after funds for their maintenance had

A staff of examiners has been assigned to expedite the work of clearing the remaining applications. The work is expected to require three or four weeks' time. Superintendents were requestd not to worry about applications not returned to them for corrections.

"If school heads do not hear from their applications, in most instances it means they have been approved and that we are waiting on funds from Washington to supply the requested aid," said Mr. Johnson.

#### T-Anchor College Farm Ends Very Successful Year

Canyon, Texas, May 27.-T. M. Moore, professor of Agriculture at the West Texas State Teachers College, announces the closing of a successful year for the T-Anchor College farm, of which he is over-

The College farm is operated entirely by student labor, having its young men carefully selected by Mr. Moore each year from the applications of hundreds of high school graduates over the Panhandle. Aside from helping forty expenses, the farm serves as a partial laboratory for the College Agriculture Department, and supplies Grade A milk to the college dormitories and cafeteria.

Foremost among this achievements has been the construction of a five room rock house to be occupied on June 1 by six boys. This building, constructed of native rock by student labor, was built with slightly less than \$400. It consists of three bedrooms, a kitchen, and a common study room. The house is attractively situated near the Amarillo highway on a hill overlooking the farm, the Palo Duro Creek, and the city of Canyon.

An irrigation project conducted on the farm this winter has turned out fruitfully. A fourteen-acre plot of ground situated beneath the artificial farm lake was irrigated through pipes from the lake and made to yield enough pasture to materially reduce feed costs for the dairy herd. The lake is fed by a large spring.

The lake is being converted into a scenic spot to provide a college recreation grounds. Two-hundred trees, most of which are willows and cottonwoods, are now being planted around the lake.

Next year the farm will cooperate with the Dalhart Soil Erosion authorities in an experiment to control wind erosion on T Anchor. Efforts in this direction may reveal methods of erosion control for this particular region.

Six of the forty positions for young men on the farm have been filled for next year. They are: Fred Thompson, honor graduate of Samnorwood; Roy Marshall, Cee Vee (Cottle Co.); Marvin Porter, Conlen; Howard E. Boatman, high point judging champion of Tulia; Claude Miller, Friona; and James Blaine, Claude. Many boys of the present personnel will continue at the farm. George S. Gandy of Tulia and John W. Blaine of Claude will graduate and leave the farm this spring. Mr. Gandy has worked at the farm through all four years of his college career. Applications for places on the college farm are being received by Mr. T. M. Moore of the

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

## Interest Rate On **Federal Farm Loans** Has Been Reduced

Big Saving is Effected To Many Donley County Land Owners

The interest rate on all Federal Land Bank loans made through National farm loan associations will be reduced to 31/2 per cent for all interest payable in the one-year period commencing July 1, 1935 and to 4 per cent for all interest payable in the two-year period commencing July 1, 1936, according to C. E. Killough, secretarytreasurer of the Clarendon National Farm Loan Association. This announcement was made June 6th when Mr. Killough was notified of the new loan rate by A. C. Williams, president of the Federal Land Bank of Houston and General Agent of the Farm Credit Ad-

This temporary reduction of interest on Federal Land Bank loans having installments due prior to July 1, 1938 is the result of new legislation, the Farm Credit Act of 1935, which was signed by President Roosevelt June 3. Interest payable on installment dates occurring after July 30, 1938, will be at the original contract rate, which is 4 4 per cent on loans now being made through National farm oan associations and varies from 5 to 6 per cent on loans made prior to April 1, 1935.

The Farm Credit Act of 1935 also provides for another important inovation. Under its terms, the Land Bank Commissioner now may make loans to finance the purchase of farms by deserving tenant farmers. Formerly, Commissioner loans could be made only for the purpose of refinancing debts, for repurchasing farms lost through foreclosure and for workng capital. The Act extends to January 1, 1940 the time in which the Land Bank Commissioner may make direct loans to farmers on first and second mortgages. The Commissioner loan plus any prior encumbrances on the property may not exceed 75 per cent of the appraised normal value. Commenting on the new provisions Mr. Killough said: "The new provision enabling the Land Bank Commissioner to make loans for the purpose of purchasing farms provides a new opportunity for young farmers and deserving tenants to become farm owners and home owners in their own right. We shall be glad to talk things over with worthy tenants who wish to buy farms of their own."

Since May 12, 1933, when the Farm Credit Administration was established, the Federal Land Bank of Houston, acting for itself and as agent for the Land Bank Commissioner has made 42,738 loans aggregating \$129,192,350.00. This is almost as large as the amount of business carried on the books of the bank on May 1, 1933 after 17 years of operation. The interest rate reduction provided by
