When Killough showed the check to Whitlock, it was recognized as one that was taken in the purse the night of the robbery. The check was dated Sept. 3, 1927. The check shows evidence of having been kept out of the weather. "No, I am going to keep the check," Mr. Whitlock stated Tuesday, "just to remember the only time I was robbed in a modern manner."

Residing in Bonham, Texas 53 years ago, Mrs. A. T. Russell walked down the street holding in her childish hand a small bouquet. A Jew rewarded her for the gift offered him by paying her ten cents. The ten cents was in the form

of United States currency, a mere slip of paper that resembles a greenback except as to size. The relic is about two and fourth by three and a half tnehes and was signed by William Meredith as secretary of the U.S. treasury at the time the money was minted, approximately 1863.

Mrs. Russell through the years has kept the product from the sale of the flowers. Old and brittle, is the small bit of paper, but wholly intact . The bit of paper is said to be worth about \$300 today. If that be the price,



#### 350 Are Employed On New Farm Plan

College Station, Texas, March 31 -The assembling of personnel and arrangement of facilities for handling work of the Government's new agricultural program, expected to be announced by the Department of Agriculture shortly, is going on with as much dispatch as possible at state headquarters here, H. H. Williamson, director of the Texas Extension Service, has announced. Mr. Williamson has estimated that the combined personnel in the various units here will within the next three or four weeks reach a peak of approximately 350 people.

Clerical activities at headquar ters in the new program will probably not begin for some six or eight weeks, however, Williamson said. "It will be necessary for producers to be supplied with the necessary application forms and county offices equipped with supplies before there will be need for work in the state office," he said.

The college is completing a temporary building to house activities of the new program. This structure will have 20,000 square feet of floor space. Additional space in college buildings will give the federal workers here a total of approximately 35,000 square feet of floor space.

The Extension Service is now busily engaged in the completion of the commodity programs that are being terminated, namely, cotton, corn-hog, wheat, rice and peanuts. All activities have been resumed in the old offices of cotton, corn-hog and wheat. New work which has to do with the cotton price adjustment under the 12c loan is being inaugurated but this will be for only short dura-

#### **Not Paupers Asking Old Age Assistance**

No "pauper's oath" is required to obtain assistance under the new law, Orville S. Carpenter, executive director of the Texas Old Age Assistance Commission, declared this

"It is unfair to consider a man or woman a pauper when he or she the bank. These are the maximum amounts of property and cash an applicant may have and still qualify for assistance. The larger amounts are for married applicants," he explained.

"Broader qualifications would keep us from receiving federal aid. If our law were changed to make everyone past the age of 65 eligible, we could not obtain funds from Washington. Cooperation of the Federal Government is limited to only those states giving aid to the

"The National Social Security Act reads that it was passed for the purpose of giving financial assistance to states for helping aged needy individuals (Section 1, line 3)," Mr. Carpenter stated.

"Our old age assistance set-up for administering the new law was created only after I had conferred with the Social Security Board in Washington.

"State legislators passed the Texas law in such form as to agree has \$5,000 or \$7,500 worth of Old Age Assistance Commission property and has \$500 or \$1,000 in and our entire plan are based on the State law and upon rules and regulations made by the Federal Government," he added.

> "We have formulated our plan in such a way to be accepted by the Social Security Board, which must pass upon our law and plans before matching our payments dollar for dollar," the Executive Director said.



Utilities Electric Rates Most Reasonable Report Shows

A review of the report just received from the Federal Power Commission on rates discloses that West Texas Utilities Company's net average residential rates are below that of the average over the nation and for the state of Texas, and below that of similar sized communities and 17% below that of the average of all municipal plants in the state of Texas, even though it pays large amounts in taxes to the various governing

Payment made in taxes this previous year was 60% more than was paid to all stockholders. Electric service costs average about 1-20 the taxes the average household pays in various ways, according to the Bureau of Census, and other governmental services.
