

THE WAR LORD'S PRAYER.

Mark Twain was a delightful humorist, but he so hated war that there is no humor in this one of the few bitter articles that he gave to the world for sober thought. Here is the article:

"O, Lord our God, help us to tear their soldiers to bloody shreds with out shells; help us to cover their smiling fields with the pale forms of their patriot dead; help us to drown the thunder of the guns with the wounded, writhing in pain; help us to lay waste their humble homes with a hurricane of fire; help us to wring the hearts of their unoffending widows with unavailing grief; help us to turn them out roofless with their little children to wander unfriended through wastes of their desolated land in rags and hunger and thirst, sport of the sun flames of summer and the icy winds of winter, broken in spirit, worn with travial, imploring Thee for the refuge of the grave and denied itfor our sakes, who adore Thee Lord, blast their hopes, blight their lives, protract their bitter pilgrimage, make heavy their steps, water their way with their tears, stain the white snow with the blood of their wounded feet!"

#### THE OLDEST PAPER

It is claimed that the Virginia Gazette, Williamsburg, Va., is the oldest newspaper in continuous publication in America, and celebrated its 200 anniversary on Aug ust 7, 1936. The first newspaper in the United States was established in 1690 in Boston, and the Virginia Let me live, O Mighty Master. Gazette was founded in 1736, more than forty years afterward, by William Parks. It is also claimed this paper has the distinction of having had the first woman editor. the wife of William Rhyne, the editor, having succeeded to this position on the death of her husband in 1775. However, this is not the first woman editor in America. South Carolina has that distinction. The first newspaper in South Carolina, The Weekly Journal, was established in 1730 at Charleston, and in 1731 changed to the South Carolina Gazette, edited by Louis Timothy, and financed by Benjamin Franklin. Timothy died in 1738, and his wife, Elizabeth Timoceeded to the editorship. nd held this position for many , eliciting high con klin, from week.

conditions as they found them. "We had a lot of dry weather and crops would not seem to do any good except in the valleys where the water would run down off the hills," said C. L. Benson recently in speaking of early conditions in the settlement of Brice valley.

Times were hard, he says, forcing them to often work for wages in order to "get by" during the strenuous period.

Today, a thousand and fifty acres of the C. L. Benson farm is being cultivated with modern tractors and other machinery that means the last word in economy. The second generation of Ben-

sons is in charge. Two sons of Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Benson, C. L. Jr. and Lloyd, are making a success having profited by past experience of their elder, and by close observation

These two young men have about five hundred acres in cotton that is expected to make approximately a third of a bale to the acre this year, the elder Mr. Benson stated Saturday.

The remainder of the thousand and fifty acres is planted in a varied assortment of crops, but mostly feed stuff.

The seasons are closely watched as well as conditions. At this time roasting ears are plentiful on the Benson farm. A plentiful supply of products are grown for home consumption, most of which is put up for winter use.
