TEN CENT GAS REDUCTION DUE IN CLARENDON THIS MONTH

PIONEER DONLEY COUNTY WOMAN DIES AT HER HOME IN HEDLEY YESTERDAY

Was Former Citizen Of Rowe And Later One of First Hedley Residents; Funeral Services This Afternoon

Mrs. Josie Adamson, 78, pioneer resident of Donley County and one of the first citizens of Rowe and Hedley, died at her home in Hedley yesterday afternoon about one o'clock.

Funeral services will be held at the First Baptist Church in Hedley this afternoon at 3 o'clock with arrangements in charge of the Hedley American Legion Post. Rev. Webb will read the ceremony.

Coming to Donley County with her husband and children, she lived at Rowe until the town was moved and re-named Hedley. The family then moved to Hedley and were one of the first residents.

For the past years she has lived on a farm near Hedley after disposing of a drug business in that city.

Mrs. Adamson was widely known and loved for her many kind deeds.

She is survived by four daughters, Mrs. Ray Storoth, Amarillo; Mrs. Ola Wilbur of Denver, Colo.; Mrs. Nova Tomlinson of Los Angeles; Mrs. O. R. Culwell of Hedley and one son, R. G. Adamson of Denver, Colo.

Burial will be in the Rowe Cemetery at Hedley with the Buntin Funeral home of Clarendon in charge.

PENSION CHECKS GO TO 125,000 THIS MONTH

Practice Of Submerging Beverages Against Law

The practice of submerging bottled foods and beverages in water in ice boxes, tubs and refrigerators is a violation of the Texas Food and Drug Law and is punishable by a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$200, according to a warning received by Dr. M. L. Stricklin, county health officer, from the State Department of Health.

In many instances milk and other products put in milk bottles with paper stoppers, as well as other bottled goods, have been entirely submerged in water which has not been changed for many hours. This is comparable to that of a lavatory without the possible germicidal benefit of soap, the bulletin read.

Stock Secured For July 3rd. Rodeo; Prizes For Singing Is Announced

Calf roping, broncho busting, steer riding and horse racing, all the main attractions of rodeos, are to be featured at the F.F.A. and 4-H show here July 3, in connection with the 50th anniversary of Clarendon and the old settlers reunion, according to H. M. Breedlove, director of the rodeo.

Breedlove announced yesterday that all of the stock had been secured and the show would start at 2 o'clock at the College football field. Besides the regular events, Winks Adams will give exhibitions with his trick horse, Breedlove said.

Prizes for the singing contests were also announced yesterday by J. R. Gillham, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce. In the class division, first prize will be \$20, second \$10 and third \$2.50. Quartet division competitors will receive \$10 for first place, \$5 for second and \$2.50 for third.

Beauty Operators Must Have State License

Mrs. Sam McAdams, Inspector for the Board of Cosmetologists, while here making inspections and investigations, said beauty operators must have a license or be subject to a penalty of \$100 fine or a 90-day jail sentence or both.

"We have given everyone time enough to obtain their operator's license and are now gathering evidence on which to prefer charges," Mrs. McAdams said. "No beauty shop is permitted to be opened for business until inspected, approved and licenses issued."

Fear Widespread Damage On Farms By Grasshoppers

COLLEGE STATION, Texas, June 9.—Entomologist at Texas A. & M. College today predicted grasshopper infection this summer in Texas farm fields would be worse than expected and may equal the terrible plague of 1924.

A State grasshopper committee, with R. R. Reppert, Extension Service entomologist as head, has been formed to combat the pest. Reppert has received discouraging reports from county agents and has asked the Government to give 150 carloads of poison maul for control purposes. Congress recently set aside \$1,000,000 for grasshopper control.

Texas farmers were saved more than \$7,000,000 thirteen years ago by a poisoning campaign.

The Federal material for the maul, which is composed of bran or mill run feed and sawdust, an arsenic compound, and water, would be delivered in infected centers and distributed under supervision of county agents.

Reports to Reppert show that the worst centers are Northwest and Central Texas. He is making a tour to examine eggs not yet hatched and to investigate conditions favorable for spread into other sections of the State.

Government Poles And Bran To Be Received Here For Hoppers

Fifty tons of bran and a supply of arsenic will be received here, within the near future, for poison mixture to war against heavy infestation of grasshoppers, county agent H. M. Breedlove said yesterday.

Breedlove's statement came after receipt of a letter from R. F. Reppert, College Station entomologist and head of a drive against the pests, saying a car would be shipped here immediately.

Although infestation now is not far above normal, Breedlove stated, all steps should be taken to prevent rapid growth of the hoppers before serious damage results.

Farmers will be notified by the LEADER and letters mailed from the agent's office when the car arrives.

Mr. Sibley was born in Alabama, April 9, 1868.

Besides his wife he is survived by three daughters; Mrs. C. B. Owens, Clarendon; Mrs. W. A. Lewis of Roaring Springs and Mrs. Luke Stephenson of Panhandle, and five sons: Rev. W. S. Sibley of Amarillo, Rev. J. M. Sibley of Tulsa, E. A. Sibley of Dallas and Guy and Horton of Clarendon.

A 10-cent reduction in natural gas is due for Clarendon this month, City Commissioner T. M. Pyle said yesterday.

This cut would result in lowering the present rate of 70-cents per 1,000 cubic feet to 60-cents per thousand cubic feet.

The franchise issued under date of June 3, 1927 specifies the reduction after a 10-year period, Pyle stated.

Confirmation of the reduction had not been received from the gas company by the city commissioners last night, but Pyle said the cut should appear on this month's bills.

He said he had notified the local gas office two or three times since the first of May.

Asked for a statement, D. A. Davis, manager of the local office, said he had not been informed what action had been taken by the home office in Mount Vernon. He declined to comment further saying only, "I don't know anything about it."

In part the section of the franchise reads:

"It is further provided that after 10-years after the date of this contract, that the said grantee shall reduce the domestic rate from 70-cents per thousand cubic feet to 60-cents per thousand feet, and allow the same discount for cash payments as provided under the present rate."

ENGINEERS TO MAP NEW GAS SYSTEM

MEMPHIS, Texas, June 9—The Ward Engineering company of Wichita Falls has been awarded a contract to draw plans, specifications and estimates for installing a municipal gas system in Memphis. The engineering company will do all preliminary work in order that the city may be in a position to close a contract with Dunn-Simpson company, who plan to lay a pipe line from Lela gas field in Wheeler county to Memphis and install a municipal gas system.

Bonds were voted and issued some years ago for a city-owned gas plant in the sum of \$65,000, which would be available for use. The city granted the Upham Gas company a franchise here in 1926. Later this company was acquired by the Northern Texas Utilities company, the present distributors, of gas here.

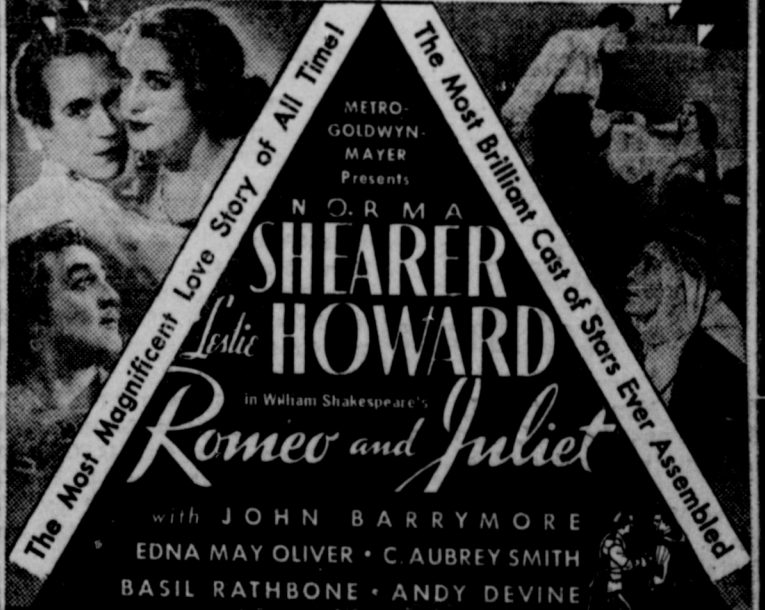

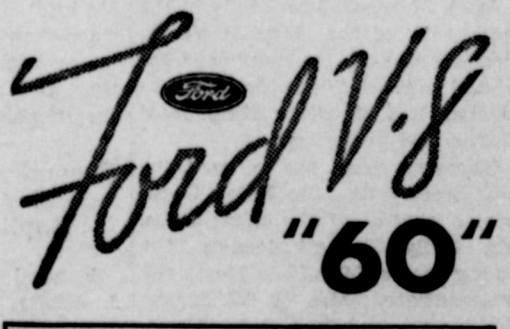

This bit of filler is being written in the office of Dr. Milling, in the Milling Sanitarium here in Mineral Wells. This is my second visit in four years, and GW's first visit. She expects to be here for some time. Last night I sat on the veranda until late listening to an Oklahoma farmer detail his experiences. He has owned a lot of land for some years. Then came along the oil boom and added to his wealth. After talking at length, he leaned back in his chair and remarked that "health is everything. If I could give my wealth for my good health back, I would gladly do so at once." The Milling Sanitarium is full. Some leave each day cured, and others come. Many of the 'inmates' are victims of auto wrecks. Their ages range from 10 years to past middle age. Some are crippled in limb. Others have head injuries. All are helped, and 90 percent are cured, or restored to normal health.

Chronic disease appears to be a specialty here. Over half the patients are ladies. The ailments represent the category of human ills. The restorations (cures so-called) are remarkable. The party accepted as a patient first passes an examination by a practicing physician, an M. D. The treatments may include some drugs, but are principally of the magnetic type. What one would term personal magnetism. The system of treatment has proven a success over a long period of years. Many avoid an operation by coming here.

The staff consists of three experienced practitioners and the medical doctor. The building is

large, modern throughout, light and fresh air being given first consideration for the comfort and benefit of the patient. The rooms are kept clean and are nicely furnished. The dining room is an example of modern sanitation. The food is equal to any hotel. One may find most anything they like on the table served family style. Meats, fruits, grains and fresh vegetable constitute the menu.

The charges are reasonable. All classes, trades and professions are represented in the patronage. Donley, Hall, Motley and West Texas counties predominate in population just at this time. Local patronage is heavy. Others from practically all sections of the state, and some from other states.

Some fossils of the marine type are collected. These trophies are being gathered for the Scout museum on the ground.

John Doss of Mineral Wells is the big shot in the Scout movement, and a mighty fine young man. He has shown me many courtesies in locating points of interest. 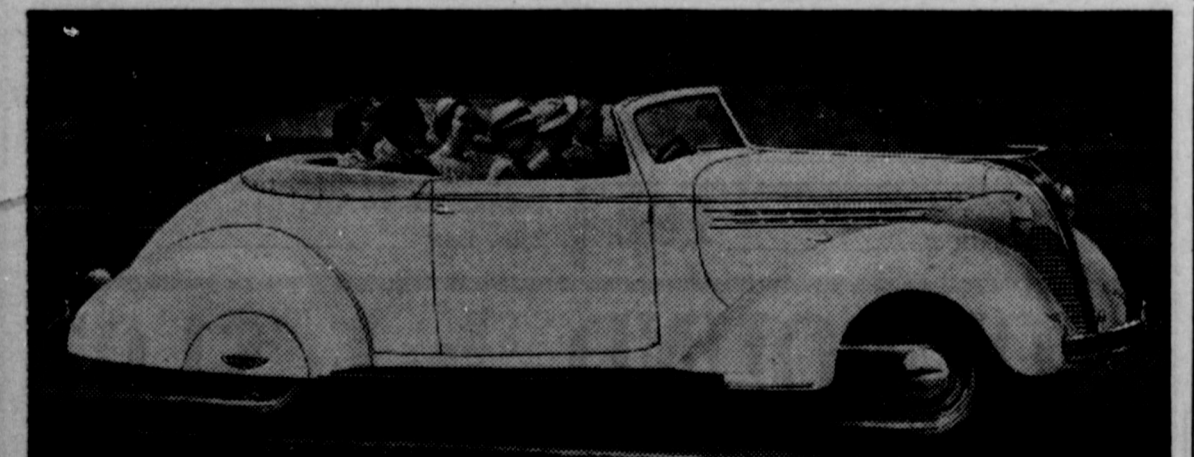

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO STATE CONSTITUTION; AUGUST ELECTION

The State Pays for the Publication That Voters May Know What They Want to Do About the Matter. It is Now Up to the Voter

S. J. R. No. 9
A JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an amendment to Section 16, Article XVI, of the Constitution of Texas; providing that the Legislature shall authorize the incorporation of banking bodies and provide for the supervision and regulation of same; providing for all of the capital stock to be subscribed and paid for before charter issued; restricting foreign corporations from doing banking business; restricting corporate business to one place.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 16, Article XVI, of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 16. The Legislature shall by general laws, authorize the incorporation of corporate bodies with banking and discounting privileges, and shall provide for a system of State supervision, regulation and control of such bodies which will adequately protect and secure the depositors and creditors thereof.

"No such corporate body shall be chartered until all of the authorized capital stock has been subscribed and paid for in full in cash. Such body corporate shall not be authorized to engage in business at more than one place which shall be designated in its charter.

"No foreign corporation, other than the national banks of the United States, shall be permitted to exercise banking or discounting privileges in this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Monday in August, 1937. At this election all voters favoring the proposed amendment shall write, or have printed, on their ballots the following words:

"For the amendment of Section 16 to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the amount of the liability of stock-holders in State banks."

Those voters opposing said amendment shall write, or have printed, on their ballots the following words:

"Against the amendment of Section 16 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the amount of the liability of stock-holders in State banks."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and to have same published as required by the Constitution and the amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such election.

S. J. R. No. 16
A JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 52, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 52d; providing that the Legislature may authorize by law, after a majority vote of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein, the adoption of a plan for the construction of paved roads and bridges or both in Harris County and in road districts therein; providing for the levy of a tax to pay for such construction; providing for the necessary proclamation; and appropriating funds to defray the expenses of the proclamation, publication and election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 52, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto another section to be known as Section 52d, which shall read as follows:

"Section 52d: Upon the vote of a majority of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein so authorizing, a county or road district may collect an annual tax for a period

not exceeding five (5) years to create a fund for constructing lasting and permanent roads and bridges or both. No contract involving the expenditure of any of such fund shall be valid unless, when it is made, money shall be on hand in such fund.

"At such election, the Commissioners' Court shall submit for adoption a road plan and designate the amount of special tax to be levied; the number of years said tax is to be levied; the location, description, and character of the roads and bridges; and the estimated cost thereof. The funds raised by such taxes shall not be used for purposes other than those specified in the plan submitted to the voters. Elections may be held from time to time to extend or discontinue said plan or to increase or diminish said tax. The Legislature shall enact laws prescribing the procedure hereunder.

"The provisions of this section shall apply only to Harris County and road districts therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State on the fourth Monday in August, 1937, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to the Constitution providing that Harris County and any road district therein may upon a vote of the people therein adopt a road plan and levy taxes for road and bridge construction in lieu of the issuance of bonds"; those voters opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment to the Constitution providing that Harris County and any road district therein may upon a vote of the people therein adopt a road plan and levy taxes for road and bridge construction in lieu of the issuance of bonds."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to be known as Section 20 of Article VIII, providing that no property of any kind shall be assessed for ad valorem taxes at a greater value than its fair cash market value; and giving the Legislature power to provide that the State and all governmental or political subdivisions or taxing districts may allow a discount for payment of ad valorem taxes before the date when they would otherwise become delinquent; and providing that this Amendment shall become effective January 1, 1939; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of this Amendment; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; and making an appropriation therefor; and prescribing the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section to Article VIII to be known as Section 20 and to read as follows:

"Section 20. No property of any kind in this State shall ever be assessed for ad valorem taxes at a greater value than its fair cash market value nor shall any Board of Equalization of any governmental or political subdivision or taxing district within this State fix the value of any property for tax purposes at more than its fair cash market value; provided that in order to encourage the prompt payment of taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to provide that the taxpayer shall be allowed

and for the payment of same not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month per person; such assistance or aid to be granted only to actual bona fide citizens of Texas; provided that no habitual criminal and no habitual drunkard and no inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, shall be eligible for such assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided, further, that the requirements for the length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one year immediately preceding such application; and providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for assistance to such blind; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of such amendment and making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof and prescribing the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

per cent (3%) discount on ad valorem taxes due the State or due any governmental or political subdivision or taxing district of the State if such taxes are paid ninety (90) days before the date when they would otherwise become delinquent; and the taxpayer shall be allowed a two per cent (2%) discount on said taxes if paid sixty (60) days before said taxes would become delinquent; and the taxpayer shall be allowed a one per cent (1%) discount if said taxes are paid thirty (30) days before they would otherwise become delinquent. This amendment shall be effective January 1, 1939. The Legislature shall pass necessary laws for the proper administration of this Section."

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 23rd day of August, 1937, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that property shall never be assessed for taxes at more than its fair cash market value, and providing that in order to encourage the prompt payment of ad valorem taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to permit a discount for the payment of same before they become delinquent."

Those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that property shall never be assessed for taxes at more than its fair cash market value, and providing, that in order to encourage the prompt payment of ad valorem taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to permit a discount for the payment of same before they become delinquent."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

"Section 51-c. The Legislature shall have the power by General Laws to provide, under such limitations and regulations and restrictions as may be deemed expedient, for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years,

and for the payment of same not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month per person; such assistance or aid to be granted only to actual bona fide citizens of Texas; provided that no habitual criminal and no habitual drunkard and no inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, shall be eligible for such assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided, further, that the requirements for the length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years; and continuously for one year immediately preceding such application.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of said publication fund election.

Dickens is not somebody to be taken out of moth balls and handled in a stereopticon slide manner."

Some of Cukor's greatest triumphs have been scored with multiple-star casts. David Copperfield, for example, had a star, virtually, for every character part. "Dinner at Eight" had a dozen starring names, and "Romeo and Juliet" has Norma Shearer, Leslie Howard, John Barrymore, Edna May Oliver, Basil Rathbone, Reginald Denny and other luminaries. Cukor has the knack, apparently, of being better able to make all these diverse temperaments flow more smoothly together than any other director in Hollywood.

Born in New York, Cukor graduated from DeWitt Clinton High School just in time to become a member of the student training corps for the duration of the war. After the war he determined to ally himself with the theatre. He got a job in 1919 as assistant stage manager of the Chicago

The excursion into Texas is being made because of the kindly feeling of Greer county pioneers and present-day citizens toward Texas, of which old Greer was an organized county for 36 years.

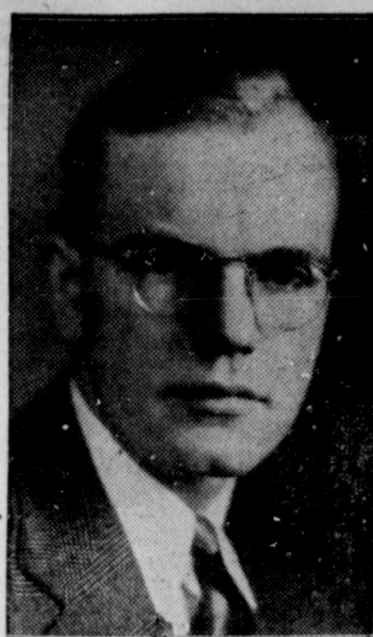
