## Retail & Wholesale Deliveries Receive Sharp Curtailment

A sharp curtailment of all retail and wholesale truck deliveries throughout the nation became effective at 12:01 o'clock Monday morning, October 11, under order of Joseph B. Eastman, director of the Office of Defense Transportation.

Retail delivery of any package weighing less than five pounds or measuring six inches or less in length and girth combined, is banned. Except for ice, milk or cream, retail deliveries on Sunday also are prohibited.

A maximum of three deliveries a week is permitted for fresh or frozen meat, poultry, eggs, fruits, vegetables, fish and shell fish, but five wholesale deliveries of these products may be made.

Retail deliveries of alcoholic beverages, tobacco, confectioneries, soft drinks, and other non-alcoholic beverages are cut to once a week. The same limitation is placed on ice cream, sherbets or ices, magazines and cut flowers.

Three deliveries are the retail maximum for bread and perishable bakery products, but six wholesale deliveries are permitted. Two deliveries a week may be made by laundries, dry cleaners and tailors, while the wholesale limit on such service is five deliveries.

Mr. Eastman's order requires all delivery truck operators to establish and map delivery areas or delivery routes that are neither duplicating nor overlapping. However, this does not mean that one operator may not duplicate the routes of another; it requires merely that no carrier operate over a delivery route which overlaps another of his own routes.

One exception to the regulations is in connection with telephone orders. The size and weight provisions do not apply to anything ordered through the switchboard, but the frequency of delivery limitation will apply. This is, primarily, for the convenience of persons who are ill, handicapped and otherwise unable to do their shopping.

While the order permits delivery of medicines and medical supplies, a person ordering a prescription from a drug store cannot have the druggist include a carton of cigarettes, a box of candy or a bottle of perfume with the order, unless in the aggregate, the order would be in the excess of the minimum weight and size limitations and the weekly quota of deliveries in the area has not been exhausted. The reason, it was explained by ODT, is that it would result in unfair practice to stores handling those extra items but not handling medicine.

It was pointed out that, despite all efforts to replenish the nation's rubber supply by the manufacture of synthetic rubber, the rubber situation is acute. Paramount among the reasons for this is the fact that such synthetic tires as are being turned out are, to a large extent, going for military purposes. In addition to the rubber shortage, there is the increasing problem of replacement parts for motor trucks and other vehicles, as well as the vehicles themselves. With the manufacture of commercial vehicles at a standstill, those now operating must be made to last for two, three or maybe four years. The big problem is to keep the nation's equipment in running order for the duration.

The Friday date will end a month's mailing of hundreds of packages from Clarendon to those who will appreciate gifts most—the men overseas.

### Teachers Meeting Held Saturday

Application blanks for War Ration Book IV are being placed in all Grocery Stores, both in Clarendon and in the rural districts; all applicants are asked to obtain these blanks either at stores or at the Rationing Office and have them completely filled in when they appear at the schools October 21st, 22nd and 23rd to obtain their new War Ration Books. Applicants must bring Ration Book III with them in order to receive Book IV.

### Canned Foods Wanted For Worthy Cause

Simmons Powell, Potentate's Aide of Khiva Temple A.A.O.N. M.S., for Donley County, has just received letters from the Shriner's Hospital for Crippled Children in Shreveport, Louisiana; St. Louis, Missouri, and the Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for Crippled Children at Dallas.

They are all in need of canned fruits, vegetables, jellies, and jams. Everyone can have a part in this worthwhile humanitarian enterprise by bringing just one can, jar, or glass from their shelf at home, either home canned or store purchased to Mr. Powell.

"Let us help and do our part in Donley County and see that these poor unfortunate children have the things so essential to their health," said Mr. Powell.

Dr. Keith Lowell, Donley County Health Officer, outlined the health program that will be added to the curriculum in the schools of Donley County at the teachers meeting held by the County Superintendent Saturday, October 9.

Clarendon Lions Club is sponsoring the health program, and will award Health Certificates to the pupil having the highest health record during the year. In case of ties, duplicate certificates will be awarded.

Health educational work in the schools is the major responsibility of the educational authorities. The health officer can supply current information regarding health conditions, and aid in the discussion of available services for health education of teachers and pupils.

Increasing responsibility is being placed on the family physician and private dentist for cooperation in the health education of the school child and his parents as cases are referred for professional attention. It should be noted that a practical program of health education in the schools forms a part of the regular school curriculum, as an all-day influence, with healthful living stressed in relation to all activities and equipment.

Health education in schools has been defined as the training and instruction of pupils leading to the development of right attitudes and habits as well as sound knowledge in the field of health. In a school health education program, teachers, parents, and children must understand certain fundamentals.

"No longer do we attempt to teach structural physiology nor the detailed pathology of disease, but rather to emphasize body structure as related to function," Dr. Lowell said. "We now stress health and those factors which make for completeness of body, mind, and of character. In teaching health we must have certain goals: (1) to establish health habits and standards, emphasizing acts rather than knowledge; (2) to instill a working knowledge of practical facts relating to cleanliness and sanitation, food, fresh air, exercise, rest, sleep, and the causes of and means of checking the preventable diseases; (3) to build ideals regarding health, beauty and service for self, school and community that will result in better living; (4) to develop the individual's sense of his personal responsibility, not only for his own health, but for that of the community in which he resides, and to set for the community standards of health; (5) to provide a perspective regarding personal and community health."

The teacher of each grade has a large chart in their room where she will record health activities each day. A committee of the Clarendon Lions Club will use this as the basis of judging who will earn Health Certificates.

The Texas State Department of Health has made the following rules to be followed by schools. Quarantinable for school purposes—persons suffering from measles, whooping cough, mumps, German measles, (rotheln) and chickenpox, shall be required to be barred from school for twenty-one days (at the discretion of the local health officer) from date of onset of the disease, with such additional time as may be deemed necessary; and may be readmitted to a certificate by him attesting to their recovery and non-infectiousness.

Minor diseases to be excluded during illness.—Those actually suffering from tonsillitis, scabies (itch), impetigo contagiosa, favus, shall be excluded from school during such illness and be readmitted on the certificate of the attending physician attesting to their recovery and non-infectiousness.

**THE UNBEATABLE SECRET WEAPON**

If there is an unbeatable secret weapon, it is the press. Had you ever thought about that? Americans have so long been used to a free press—directed by individual free enterprise—that we haven't thought of it as a powerful, deadly weapon which can sweep away democracy, human rights and even life itself. You don't think so? Look what the club-footed, evil little Dr. Paul Joseph Goebbels has done with the power of the press in Germany. He has swept away the last vestiges of democracy. He has used the press to help his Nazi overlord, Adolf Hit-

ler, snatch away the last shred of human rights and liberties—and even impose death when the whim suited him. Not only that, but Goebbels through a "kept" press—one that is in the hands of the government—has even controlled German thinking. He has made them automatons who "heil Hitler" like so many PUNCHES and JUDYS. Through clever half-truths, or neatly veiled lies, he had persuaded them in any direction der fueshrer indicated. So, there are some lessons to draw from Germany. A "kept" press, like a "kept" woman must do her master's bidding. Thus, a press in the hands of individual free enterprise, kept robust by

vigorous competition, is the best guarantee that it shall continue to be the shield of the people and not become the blood-stained sword of some power-mad man or group.

Another lesson. If a press can enslave a people, and keep them enslaved, why isn't it still more important as an instrument of liberty and freedom?

But the press in America is not only a champion of the people's rights, it is a friend, a conveyor of information, a cheerer-upper. We see someone pointing to a newspaper, or perhaps several, that have not been friends of the people. That is true. In every field—even in the purest of all fields, the clergy—there are a few who do not measure up.

The press should, and most of it does, carry news of friends to you, its readers. It, therefore, is a friend that visits you daily or weekly, as the case may be. It has carried untold millions of words about rationing, and other rules that otherwise would have been distributed with much greater difficulty, if at all.

And when things look blackest the newspapers that measure up have hunted for the candle of hope under the bushel of despair and held it up as high as they could until that darkest hour before the dawn was past.—Ed Bishop, Editor Dalhart Texan.

**Farmers Spending Income Soberly**

Bountiful crops and good prices in 1942 increased the United States farmers' net income \$3,650,000,000 over 1941—the farmers' largest cash income in history. For the most part, the increased farm income is being spent soberly. The farmers remember what happened during the prosperous period after the first World War and are not throwing their money away.

In a study made by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics of the Department of Agriculture in 35 representative counties, farmers commonly reported that one of the first things they did with last year's income was to take care of "a little item up at the courthouse." By the spring of 1943, most farmers had caught up with their back taxes, and over 90 percent of the farmers in most of the counties studied had paid current taxes two months ahead of the penalty date.

Old debts, current obligations, and even payments not yet due are being cleared up. Nearly all delinquent Federal Land Bank loans have been paid, as have current maturities, with considerable amounts of money deposited with the bank for future payments. In

a county in east Nebraska, payments amounted to five times the 1942 maturities.

Many farmers bought land, but usually not at highly inflated prices. Real estate agents in Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, and other southern states report that a majority of the farm real estate purchases are being made by farm tenants, or small farmers who want a larger acreage. During the past year, the majority of land buyers have been farmers, rather than investors. Many factory workers in the smaller towns have been buying extra plots to keep a cow and pig, and grow a Victory Garden.

Farmers were freest with their money in buying livestock and second-hand farm machinery, for which they often paid inflationary prices. Good prices and demand for meat and dairy products have encouraged farmers to increase their livestock numbers. The boom on farm machinery resulted because many farmers had made their old machines "do" during the depression years and now need new ones.

**CIVIL SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT**

Stenographer and typist jobs in local rationing and selective service boards and in local offices of the U. S. Employment Service will be filled with persons who pass the current Civil Service examination for these positions, Elmer G. Hayes, local civil service secretary, said today.

"Salaries for these jobs range from \$900 to \$1440 a year plus overtime," Mr. Hayes said.

Persons, not engaged in war work of equal skill, and interested in this federal employment, should file an application with Mr. Hayes, at the post office for the next test.

Federal appointments are made according to War Manpower Commission regulations.

**News For Cotton Growers**

College Station, Oct. 8.—While most farmers are receiving more, some are getting less than the support price for cottonseed from buyers, according to reports reaching the state AAA office here. Consequently, officials urge farmers to report such violations of government regulations to their county AAA committees.

Unless processors pay farmers the support price for cottonseed, the government is under no obligation to re-purchase the cottonseed products from them at support prices. This price "floor" is assured producers only if their seed is sold in lots of 10 tons or more on basis of grade, so small producers can profit by pooling seed with their neighbors, says B. F. Vance, state AAA administrator.

Currently, the support price allows the grower about \$53 a ton

for average quality cottonseed. This allows for an average grower's margin not to exceed \$3 a ton.

This Central Agency has been able to notify as many as 6000 families in one day of the fate of relatives of all nations taken prisoner. The information about American prisoners gathered by the protecting Power and the Central Agency comes to the next of kin in the U. S. thru the Prisoners of War Information Bureau, Provost Marshall, General's Office, War Department, Washington, D. C.

Visits to the camps by representatives of the protecting Power are provided for in the Geneva Convention and the right of Delegates of the I.R.C.C., to visit camps and supervise the distribution of relief supplies is generally recognized, as is also the right of neutral representatives of relief agencies approved by the belligerents. According to latest reports, there are 73 I.R.C.C. Delegates of Swiss nationality scattered over the world according to need. These delegates make reports on conditions and usually any failure to meet standards is corrected.

The carrying out of the provisions for sending parcels and relief to camps, and for exchanging information between prisoners of war and their own countries, is now a tremendous task. In Switzerland there are between 5,000 and 6,000 people employed by International Red Cross, most of them working as volunteers. The mail averages over 60,000 pieces daily.

**Drivers' Licenses Begin Expiring**

State Police Director Homer Garrison today asked Texas drivers to take a look at the dates on their operator's licenses. The first group of the new type licenses, which are good for two years from the date of issue, begin expiring this month.

Renewal forms are available at drivers license offices in all court houses, and in some localities at other places.

"Texas people are bothered with so much red tape now that we are especially anxious to carry out the renewal program with a minimum of inconvenience to them," Garrison said. "It will help the people and the Department of Public Safety a great deal if applicants for renewal will be careful to observe the following points:

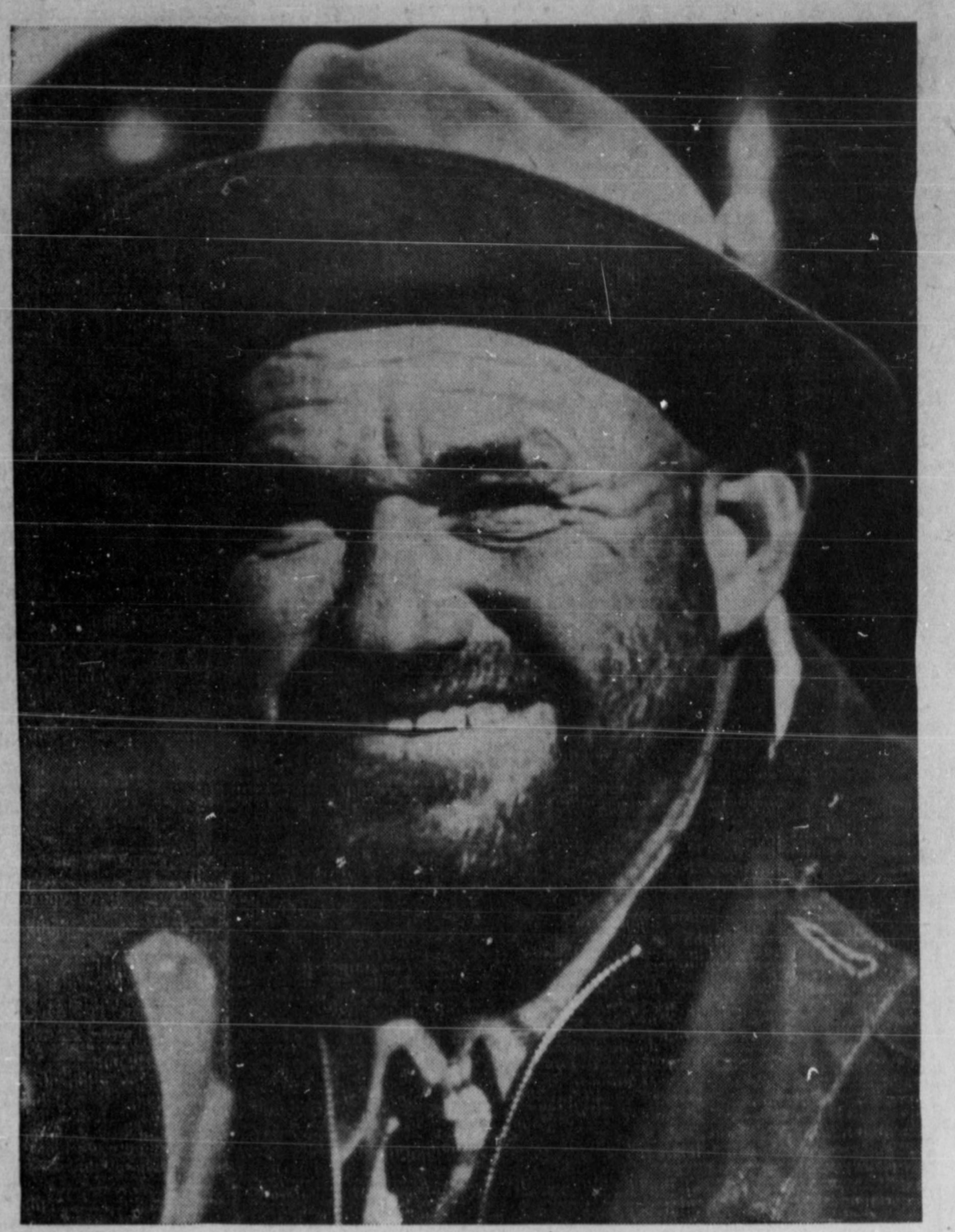
"Be sure the application is properly filled out. It has been necessary in the past to reject many applications because of insufficient or incorrect information.

"The application must be accompanied by the renewal stub, which is to be torn off the present license.

"The application must be mailed prior to the expiration date of the current license. If this is not done, the law provides that the applicant must be treated as a new driver and subjected to an examination.

"The application must be mailed to the Department of Public Safety in Austin. Each application must be processed in the headquarters office so that remedial action may be taken with drivers who have been involved in numerous accidents or traffic violations.

"The application should be accompanied by a money order or cashier's check for \$5.00, the fee for a two-year license. Personal checks cannot be accepted, and it is unsafe to send uninsured cash through the mails."

Every employee should carefully protect his social security account number card and make sure that each employer for whom he works has a record of the number that is on that card, said Dewey Reed, manager of the Social Security Board office in Amarillo. "The money that his survivors will receive in the event of his death, or the money that he and his wife will be paid when they are old and have retired from work," Reed said, "is insurance which is earned through employment and which is paid for by the small deductions from his wages each payday and added to an

**Feed Situation Outlined**

The Texas corn crop was indicated in mid-September as being larger than either last year or the ten-year, 1932-41, average. According to a report from V. C. Childs, principal agricultural statistician for the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, USDA, Austin, the indicated 1943 yield is 83,979,000 bushels, compared with 78,561,000 in 1942, and 77,609,000 for the 10-year average. Summarizing the feed outlook the report says that sorghums for grain, the principal production of which is in areas affected by drought, declined sharply during August and the total production now is indicated less than last year even though a much larger acreage was planted. Production of alfalfa hay, as well as all tame hay including alfalfa, is estimated at less than last year's production, but above the 10-year average. Texas peanut production is estimated at 423,000,000 pounds compared with 430,000,000 pounds in 1942. Estimates of the current year's cottonseed are not made on September 1, but with lint production approximately five and nine per cent less than last year for Texas and the United States, respectively, the reports say that the seed output can be expected to be correspondingly less. Of interest to Texas feeders also is the indicated production of 208,763,000 bushels of soybeans in the United States this year. This is slightly less than last year but several times larger than production for years prior to 1942. According to the report, production of oats in Texas is indicated as slightly above that of last year, but less than half of the 10-year average. On the other hand, the 1943 barley crop exceeds the 10-year average, but is less than the 1942 production.

**Equal amount by his employer.**

"The amount of money that his survivors or that he and his wife will receive depends on the amount of wages paid to him by his employer. If the employer did not have his account number and had failed to report his wages, the amount of insurance to be paid to his survivors or to himself and wife in their old age will be less than it would have been if all his wages had been properly reported." "Employees should protect their survivors and retirement insurance by always making sure that their employers have accurate record of their social security numbers and of their names. They should always show their account number card to each employer for whom they work."

## Public Urged To Exercise Caution In Discussing Status of Soldiers

The War Department today urged families and friends of soldiers to exercise extreme caution in discussing the military status of an individual soldier lest by consolidation of information on individual Axis agents may determine plans of a regiment, a division or even an entire army.

Soldiers have been taught the prime necessity for military security. For them and through them it is hoped that relatives and friends of these soldiers back home will take their cue and provide civilian security for military matters.

"The element of surprise counts heavily in every military operation and Axis agents are working

desperately to learn when and where we will strike," Major General George V. Strong, Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2 (Military Intelligence) said in discussing the necessity for guarding military security.

The War Department has asked and again asks the public to follow three simple rules:

If you hear it from someone—don't repeat it.

If you see it yourself—don't repeat it.

If you read it in newspapers or magazines or hear it on the radio then it's public property—and you may talk about it. Of course you mustn't repeat information you read in personal letters.

Army intelligence officers and units report marked success in their efforts to obtain adherence to the first two rules. Rumors are being effectively quieted and there is less and less discussion of those things which are actually witnessed.

The War Department naturally doesn't concern itself with the first part of the third rule, but it now gives wide attention to the second part—the discussion of information revealed by a soldier in

a personal letter to a relative or friend.

"No matter how hard we try to stop it there will be soldiers who feel it incumbent on them to tell their relatives and friends the kind of training they are undergoing, the kind of clothing they are receiving, the type of medicine they are furnished," General Strong said in discussing this phase of the rule. "They just do not seem to realize that this type of information when repeated eventually falls on enemy ears."

The type of training a soldier is given often indicates the locale in which that training will be used. The kind of clothing he is issued indicates the climatic conditions he may encounter when he goes overseas. The medicine also may reveal his destination as different kinds of medicine are known to be used to combat diseases in particular countries.

"It is imperative that those persons receiving this personal mail keep all information contained therein to themselves," General Strong said. "Information gathered from a handful of soldiers' relatives or friends and it is natural for a father or a mother to want to

tell what their boy is doing. They just fail to realize that in telling they are jeopardizing not only the boy they love but thousands of other boys, too."

A few local newspapers, too, occasionally print information from personal letters of soldiers and often this information is furnished by the family of the soldier. Soldier letters are censored at their source, but only for home consumption—they are not censored for publication, as has been specifically pointed out to the press by the Office of Censorship in its "Code of Wartime Practices for the American Press."

Elimination of sabotage continues to be a paramount project of the Army's military intelligence units and in this connection the War Department admonishes war workers to be extremely careful in discussing their work. Detailed discussion of war plants is perilous. The dangers of such detailed discussion in print have been expressed to the press, local and metropolitan, by the "Code of Wartime Practices for the American Press."

It is the natural desire of every civilian war worker to let his fellow men and women know that he is doing his part in the war. Often in revealing the contribution he is making to the war effort that civilian oversteps the bounds of security and gives information which eventually becomes valuable to the enemy. At all war plants under the jurisdiction of the War Department employees are schooled in the importance of military security, but even this schooling does not eliminate talk of detailed operations of an arsenal or plant. The public itself, therefore, must join in the effort to eliminate discussion of these vital war agencies. All civilians, wittingly, must help stop discussions which some, unwittingly, start.

### GUN COVERS PROTECT BIBLES

Bibles which are placed on every life raft and life boat on army transport vessels are being protected from the effects of salt water by the same type of cover that protects pistols, rifles, and machine guns in landing operations. Curiously enough, the covers used for pistols are of exactly the right size for copies of the bible, and have been adopted by the Chaplains Corps as a standard protective covering for them. The covers were developed by the Quartermaster Corps from a pliable, transparent, waterproof film known as vinyl. They are buoyant enough to float the bibles if they are accidentally dropped overboard or washed out of the rafts in heavy seas.

## Red Cross Drives For Recruitment In Nurse Program

The battle to overcome the decrease of civilian doctors and nurses grows daily throughout the nation, as calls for more doctors and more nurses are issued by the Army and Navy. As new fronts are opened, these calls grow larger and more people have joined American Red Cross Home Nursing classes than ever before, while daily recruits are being enrolled

for duties as Nurse's Aides, which helps the professional nursing situation, allowing more of them to answer the call to colors. Many retired professional nurses are taking their places as full time Home Nursing instructors, which again relieves other instructors for duties with the colors.

Last year, 533,483 persons received certificates in Red Cross Home Nursing. Approximately one-third of these were issued to women in rural communities. Authorization to teach courses in Home Nursing are 26,558 instructors. In September, 1943, 94,700 girls and women had completed

their training as Volunteer Nurse's Aides. The quota for 1943 is 2,500 nurses monthly for the Army and Navy Nurse Corps. This is the minimum recruitment as set up by the heads of the two services.

Thousands of "hidden" nurses—women—who gave up their profession when they married, are taking refresher courses and entering hospitals again. These women are teaching classes in home nursing in addition to their other duties. Thousands more, homemakers, business girls, women with only a few hours of spare time are learning to be nurse's aides and are helping to alleviate

the shortage of professional nurses in hospitals.

## Fall And Winter Styles Forecast

Key words to describe new clothes for the fall and winter are "sleek, wearable, durable, and versatile," in the opinion of those who have been studying clothing styles for a long time.

For the duration, women can still be well dressed in simple clothing, but they needn't expect any extra frills, says Mrs. Dora R. Barnes, clothing specialist for the A&M College Extension Service. There are other changes to be expected besides reducing the amount of material in a dress.

Fabrics will be lighter in weight and less tightly woven. For instance, percale and other cottons which weigh four ounces to the yard with a thread count of 80 in the warp and 80 in the filling no longer are available for civilian use. These materials which are especially suitable for children's play clothes and house dresses now are being used by the armed forces. Culottes are gone of the duration, and so are reversible, lined, and quilted skirts.

New clothes also are showing military trends as well as the influence of the United Nations in their design and decoration. Straight-cut jackets and pencil-skirt skirts come from China, while trim, well-tailored suits show a British influence.

Coat dresses or button-down-the-front styles are favorites again this season, and "boat necks" are back again. So are high round necks, which provide a good background for costume jewelry. Because they save quantities of materials, short length evening dresses will be worn a great deal, Mrs. Barnes says.

## Texas Farmers And Ranchmen Offered \$19,000,000

Texas farmers who cooperate with the 1944 Triple-A program will have an opportunity to earn a State total of \$19,215,000 for carrying out approved practices. This was announced today by Fred Rennels, assistant administrative officer of the State AAA.

This is a considerable increase over the amount of money available to farmers for approved practices in the past and is intended to assist farmers in meeting increased war demands for food and fiber without additional cost and in most cases, with added profits for themselves.

The rates or payment for most of the practices have been substantially increased. Several much needed new practices have been added. A complete list of the practices, specifications and rates of pay will be available in the county A.C.A. office in the very near future.

The 1944 program year begins on December 1, 1943 in all counties in Texas except a small group in the extreme southern part of the state. Farmers have until that time to complete their 1943 production practice program. Many farmers throughout the State are completing their 1943 program by constructing terraces, and seeding winter cover crops.

Winter legumes have proved beneficial to Texas farmers in increased yield per acre of the crop seeded the following year and will assist the farmers in meeting

the heavy demands for food and feed. Rennels stated that if farmers are to produce the food and fiber soldiers and sailors, civilians and war workers need they must join the fight now, against uncontrolled erosion which, if left uncontrolled, may make it impossible to reach war crop goals. 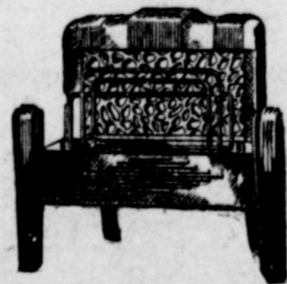

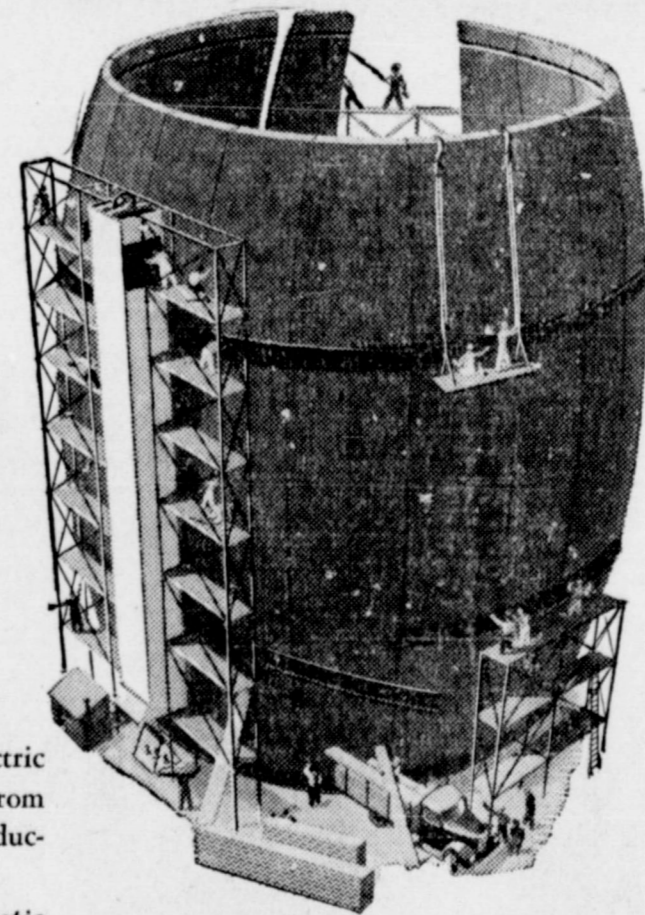

### WORLEY OFFERS BILL TO SPEED SOLDIER VOTE

Legislation aimed at speeding up voting by service men overseas and at home was introduced Tuesday in Congress.

The bill provides for transmission of secret ballots by air mail rather than V-mail and establishes a war ballot commission to relieve the army and navy of administrative work in handling the absentee ballots.

It was offered in the house by Chairman Gene Worley, Democrat, Texas, of the house elections committee and in the senate by Senators Green, Democrat, Rhode Island and Lucas, Democrat, Ill.

### ONE CORPORAL GETS FIVE JAPS

An army corporal, who failed to get the order to withdraw, recently killed five of an attacking eight-man Japanese patrol, then found to his astonishment that he had been left alone far in advance of his marine companions. Corporal Henderson, whose home is in Cannonville, Utah, explained: "I figured they were still with me, so when the Japs came in sight I opened up with my tommy." After he had killed five of the Japs, the other three ran. It was then Corporal Henderson discovered he was alone. He spent the night in the jungle and walked in for chow the next morning.

## Parents Favoring Aviation Cadet Training

Mothers and fathers of young Americans have come to realize the value of the training given Aviation Cadets in Uncle Sam's Army Air Forces, says Lieut. Col. Marvin B. Durette of the U. S. Army Recruiting and Induction Service.

"In the past, young men desiring to fly with Uncle Sam had to conduct a sales campaign to sell their parents on the idea," Col. Durette said, "but now many parents are actually urging their sons to apply for Aviation Cadet training."

"Young men selected for Aviation Cadet training continue with their education. After processing at a Basic Training Center, Cadets are sent to a selected college for a five-month course of preparatory pre-flight training. Studies are comprised of mathematics, physics, geography, modern history, and English. After pre-flight, Cadets are then trained at Primary, Basic and Advanced fields."

Col. Durette states that no finer training can be had than that given young men in the U. S. Army Air Corps.

SUGAR—Stamp 14 became valid August 16, expires Nov. 1st. No. 15 and 16, for canning, good for five pounds each through October 31.

SHOES—Stamp No. 18 good for 1 pair. Validity has been extended indefinitely.

MEATS, fats—Brown stamps C, D, and E good through October 30. Brown stamp F becomes good October 17 and remains good through October 30.

PROCESSED FOODS—Blue stamps U, V, and W expire October 20. Blue stamps X, Y, and Z are good through November 20. STOVES—Consumer purchases of rationed stoves must be made with a certificate obtained at local war price and rationing boards.

GASOLINE—A-8 coupons became valid September 22nd.

TIRE INSPECTION—"A" book holders must have second official inspection by September 30; "B" book holders, third inspection by October 31; and "C" book holders, third inspection by August 31; "T" book holders, second inspection within 6 months of last date of inspection or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first.
