Workers of the Texas A&M Colreturned from a Victory garden expressed his appreciation this conference in New Orleans, point out that civilians will find on their grocers' shelves this year only about four-fifths of the canned fruits and vegetables they found last year. In addition, the army's requirements for vegetables wil be greater, and there will be more soldiers to feed in distant places.

The need for food by the United Nations will be increased in 1944 and there will be more liberated peoples to feed. Jennie Camp, Extension specialist in home production planning, suggests that civilians will need more home produced fruits and vegetables in 1944 to make up for decreased civilian supplies of some other foods.

For these reasons, Texas has a goal of one million Victory gardens "kept busy" during 1944. The objective is to produce 25 per cent more vegetables in home gardens during 1944 than last year. This does not include truck growers who have a goal of their own, Extension workers say.

They suggest as ways of meeting the goals: Increasing the number of gardens by 10 per cent, esthe vegetables produced.

The longest talking book for the olind ever made has just been prepared under the supervision of the Division of Books for the Adult Blind in the Library of Congress. The book is Tolstoy's famous novel "War and Peace," which despite general acclaim as one of the great novels of the world, has not hertofore been available in an edition for the blind. The talking book edition was made for the Library by the American Foundation for the Blind, New York City.

"Talking book" is the name given to slow-playing phonograph recordings of books prepared for the blind. The first were made in 1934. Congress made an annual When a talking book is made, duplicate copies are placed in 27 the U.S. These are lent to blind readers through 55 agencies. About 20,000 are now in use. The average talking book is estimated to contain between 15 and 20 records. "War and Peace" totals 119 records in eight containers.

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

# To Canning

Donley County Agent, Charles Reed, has received the following information:

Prospects for more and better home canning equipment are brighter for 1944 than they were last year, and if the home food preservation movement is successful this year the chief responsi bility will rest with homemakers to take care of cookers and sealers

A recent War Production Board

announcement that 400,000 new pressure canners will be manufactured in 1944 should be welome, but prospective buyers should take the long view and not invest too heavily unless they regard canning as a permanent part of their program. While pressure cookers are not rationed this year, equitable distribution will be necessary if all needs for equipment are met. This advice comes from Mrs. Winifred J. Leverenz, specialist in food preservation for the Texas A&M College Extension Service, who just has returned from food preservation conferences in Chicago and Peoria.

Mrs. Leverensz also brings the news that some cooker manufacturers will be able soon to provide dial gauges for valve-type wartime models produced last year, and most manufacturers now can supply necessary parts. She suggests that homemakers have their pressure cookers thoroughly checked before putting them into use during the coming months. This should be done immediately, Mrs. Leverenz says, for delay until the canning season opens may prove unfortunate.

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

Poultry husbandmen of the Texas A&M College Extension Service say that good management is the key to success - - And good management is nothing more than getting maximum production from each hen. They suggest that the most important things to do just now are to cull present flocks sharply and to prepare to buy replacement chicks early. A low producing hen eats as much feed as one which earns her way, and there is no profit in a loafer. The advantage in getting early hatched chicks is that they mature bet-

Be sure, too, to get chicks from proved laying strains and pullorum-tested parent stock.
