

The question is frequently asked and seldom answered correctly as to the speed at which telephone and telegraph messages travel over long circuits such as that between New York and San Francisco or a submarine cable crossing the Atlantic

Measurements made by the Bell telephone engineers show that on the average about 1-3 of a second is required for a telegraph sounder in San Francisco to operate after the key is closed to New York although key is closed to New York although the initial electrical impulse travels across the continent at the rate of 186,000 miles a second, this being the speed of light. The propagation of telephone currents, on the other of telephone currents, on the other hand, is much more rapid. Were State taxes levied uniformly all counties of Texas, the present unjust distribution of the burden of government could not occur. Uninst treatment of West Texas will continue until there is such uniformity of taxation as compels East Texas to pay its proper share for the main-
