TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

This is to notify the Clarendon Roping Club, officers and members, the ranchers and all others, that it is our intention to ask the District Court to grant an injunction to prevent any Rodeo, roping, or riding contest, or any housing of live-stock, night or day on any date, in the football park (College Stadium) in the West residential district of Clarendon. Damage caused us by horse manure, cow manure, lack of sanitary toilets, dust, noise, and millions of flies, together with the threat of Polio, damage to trees, shrubs, flowers, grass, and all drapes, carpets, furniture, as well as damage to us personally by incessant bawling of cattle several days and nights, is sufficient cause for such action.

The city, or school have taken no action in this matter, although the threat of Polio is positive and fences are no good, being full of holes and cracks, and a big section already has fallen down—all of which is very dangerous to children; and these fences should be condemned.

In our opinion, this Rodeo, held under existing conditions, is a violation of the sanitary laws of Texas as well as a sufficient cause for our recourse to the

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Texas State Teachers Association To Sponsor 5-Point Legislative Program Aimed At Improving Public Schools

AUSTIN — A tentative five-point legislative program aimed at improving public schools will be sponsored by the Texas State Teachers Association in the next legislature.

The program was set out in a letter mailed last week by the association to the 41,000 members of the organization. It was signed by Miss Emma Mae Brotze, presi-

dent; B. B. Cobb, secretary, and Charles H. Tennyson, public relations director.

The letter called attention to the needs of the public school system, as seen by the teachers association, as follows:

An extension of the equalization, or rural aid law, to allow a greater number of poorly financ-

ed schools to qualify, thus enabling them to pay the minimum salary of \$2,000 for teachers with BA degrees, as provided by the last legislature, and maintain modern school systems.

Increasing the total appropriation for schools receiving equalization aid.

Increasing pay for all teachers on a basis yet to be determined.

Passage of a law providing better teacher certification standards, and teacher tenure.

A mandatory minimum cumulative sick leave law.

It is also possible the association will push for legislation by which schools could receive aid

in providing more classroom space and modern, adequate equipment.

The state teachers' organization was successful during the last session of the legislature in its campaign for passage of measures which increased equalization aid by \$4,000,000 annually, for a minimum salary law and for raising the per capita apportionment to \$55.

Teachers' salaries, due to the high cost of living, are still not high enough to make the profession attractive, according to Miss Brotze.

A recent survey, she said, disclosed that Texas is short more than 2,000 qualified teachers and that replacements for persons leaving the schools this year will be difficult to obtain especially in the primary and elementary grades.

The association will seek the broadening of the equalization aid provisions of school laws so that all schools can meet the requirements of the minimum salary law.

Many school districts, according to President Brotze, need more state aid because they cannot pay the minimum teacher salary even though they are levying the maximum local tax rate permitted under the law.

Texas now has no mandatory

sick leave law to cover teachers and other school employees. Some cities, including Dallas, have regulations covering payments for sick leave. Many school systems allow no sick leave pay.

School people have long advocated a more strict system of certifying persons as to eligibility to teach. Even present regulations were eased during the war, when it was extremely difficult to obtain teachers.

The teachers association will also follow up on a measure already promised introduction by the joint legislative committee. It will be an emergency appropriation of from \$2,500,000 to \$3,000,000 to cover pay for teachers in equalization aid schools this year. Governor Beauford Jester has promised to submit the subject as emergency legislation.

In addition, because the schools all had a \$6 supplemental per capita payment this year, but for which funds will not be available for the next school year, the teachers association will seek an additional \$6,000,000 for rural aid schools for 1948-49.

That will be in addition to their contemplated expansion program of more schools being made eligible for rural aid and larger payments per school.

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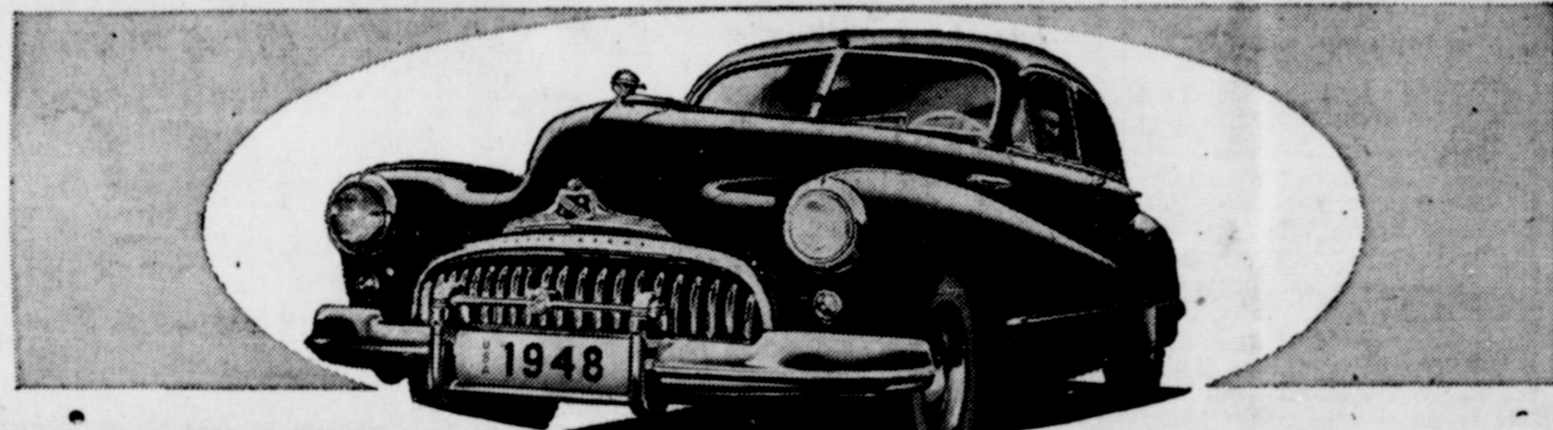

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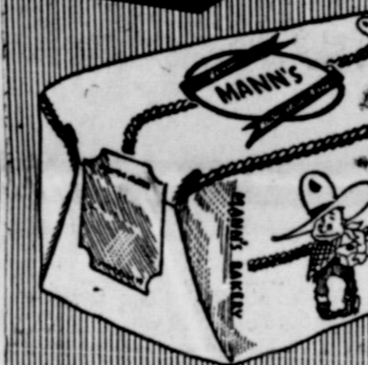

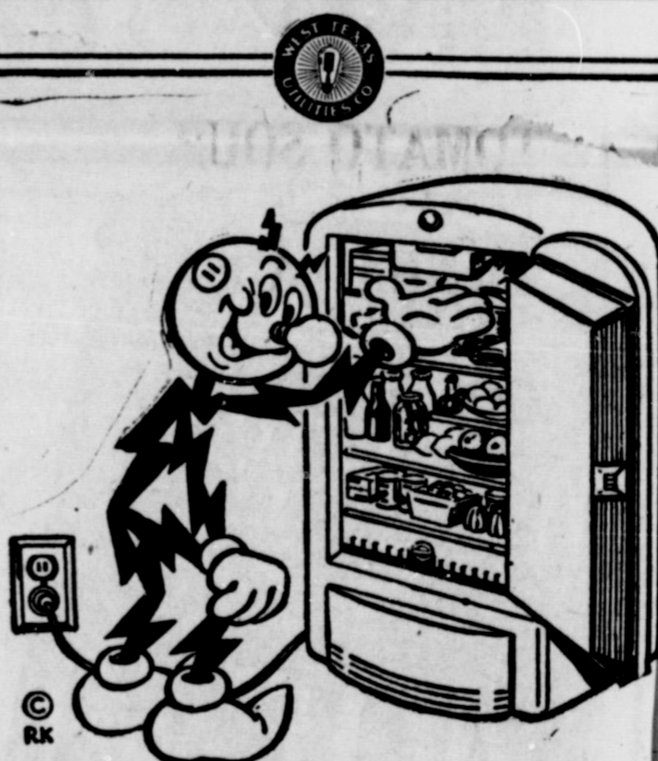
