



Sano petition must be signed by the supplicant for lic-me, stating that he is a master of his trade and will be governed in all respects by the rules and regulations which are, or may be, adopted by this city. Each applicant for a license shall execute and deposit in the office of the City Servetary with his abolitation a Surery Bond, executed by him as principal with ratisfactory security, payable to the Mayor of the City of Clarendon from all accidents and damages caused by neglect in protecting his work, or by any unfaithful, imperfect or inadequate work done by virtue of his license, and that he will also replace and restore sidewalk, pavement or street surface over any opening he may have made to as good state and condition as he found than keep and maintain the same in exadorder, to the satisfaction of the city to: the period of six months next thereafter, that he will pay all fines imposed upon him for a violation of any of these rules or regulations. On receiving his license he shall have recorded in the office of the City Clerk his actual place of business, the name ander which the business is transacted, and shall immediately notify the City Secretary of any change in either thereafter. No license will be granted for more than one rear and the first year said applicant applicant of reach year therefore, and for each year therefore for a license, a fee of \$50.00 shall be caid by said applicant to the City of Clarendon for said year's license or for any fractional part thereof, and for each year therefore or effect.

The City Inspector is to be given notice when any work is ready for inspection and all work must be left uncovered for examination until inspected and approved, and for which inspection a fee of \$1.00 will be charged for one fixture and a fee of \$0.25 will be charged for each and every additional fixture in and about said premises. Such inspection shall be made within stwenty-four hours after notification has been made. If required to do so, the plumber shall apply either ether, peppermint, water or smoke test, in the presence of the plumbing inspector and the plumber shall repair or remove any defective material or labor when so ordered by the City Inspector. And that old Section 7 as written in the original ordinance hereinabove mentioned and declare null and void and of no further force or effect where the same is in conflict with Section 7 as hereinabove written.


