President Needs To Have Core Beliefs Last Tuessay's State of the Union address oratorical skills. The speech was passionate and spoke of everything that the people wanted to hear. What was mos striking was that President Clinton deeply believed every word of every sentence in his address. Nevermind that many of the sentences contradicted ones that he'd spoken mere seconds earlie
The era of big government is over!" the president proclaimed. And since the era of
big government was over he immediately saw fit to introduce half a dozen or so new federal
 programs.

This speech was Mr. Clinton's first national commercial for his reelection campaign. It contained the new and improved Bill Clinton with the 1996 version of his core beliefs and values.

His supporters say that the president really believes everything he said in that speech. Government should be leaner, not meaner, etc. That's the whole problem with President Clinton. Yes, he deeply believed what he said last week. But he will equally believe the exact opposite next week, and a month from then
thing else, ad nauseum.

He will say anything he thinks you want to hear, and that is not what the country needs in its Chief Executive. The president should stand for something... anything... even if it's wrong.

Whether you loved or hated Ronald Reagan, you have to admit that he stood by what he believed. If he called the Soviet Union the "Evil Empire," he meant it. When he promised to strengthen the national defense, he did it. When he promised to cut taxes, he did it.

Likewise, when John F. Kennedy said "We choose to go to the moon," then, by golly, water we were going to the moon.

Clinton wants desperately to be remembered as JFK is. He longs for the high approval ratings that Ronald Reagan had.

However, both of those presidents had solid principles that they stood upon in their fight for their agenda. Clinton does no
second term or no, he will never be a great president.

Defendant (72) became non-threat due to illness and died shortly after dismissal granted. Parents did not want Victim (8) to testify at trial.

Those familiar with the criminal justice system realize plea bargains are a necessity. Each case has its own merits, and I do not give "stock plea bargains." I am proud of the plea bargains obtained this past year and am satisfied appropriate punishments were assessed in each case.
In this past year, there have been more cases (199) sentenced to the penitentiary and probation than in any one of the three years previous to my taking office, and the backlog of stagnant cases has been reduced by $\mathbf{4 3 \%}$.
