

### **President Needs To Have Core Beliefs**

Last Tuesday's State of the Union address was another fine example of our president's oratorical skills. The speech was passionate and spoke of everything that the people wanted to hear. What was most striking was that President Clinton deeply believed every word of every sentence in his address. Nevermind that many of the sentences contradicted ones that he'd spoken mere seconds earlier.

"The era of big government is over!" the president proclaimed. And since the era of big government was over, he immediately saw fit to introduce half a dozen or so new federal programs.



This speech was Mr. Clinton's first national commercial for his re election campaign. It contained the new and improved Bill Clinton with the 1996 version of his core beliefs and values.

His supporters say that the president really believes everything he said in that speech. Government should be leaner, not meaner, etc. That's the whole problem with President Clinton. Yes, he deeply believed what he said last week. But he will equally believe the exact opposite next week, and a month from then he'll believe something else, in two months something else, ad nauseum.

He will say anything he thinks you want to hear, and that is not what the country needs in its Chief Executive. The president should stand for something... anything... even if it's wrong.

Whether you loved or hated Ronald Reagan, you have to admit that he stood by what he believed. If he called the Soviet Union the "Evil Empire," he meant it. When he promised to strengthen the national defense, he did it. When he promised to cut taxes, he did it.

Likewise, when John F. Kennedy said "We choose to go to the moon," then, by golly, water we were going to the moon.

Clinton wants desperately to be remembered as JFK is. He longs for the high approval ratings that Ronald Reagan had.

However, both of those presidents had solid principles that they stood upon in their fight for their agenda. Clinton does not. For that reason, second term or no, he will never be a great president.



## **President Should** Get A Grip On What People Want By Rep. Mac Thornberry

The President gave a good speech last week. But then, the President always gives good speeches. What the American people have to be careful about is looking beyond what he says to what he does.

From ending welfare as we know it to providing real tax relief for middle income families, the President's first three years in office have been a hallmark of promises unkept. They've also been a hallmark of big government.

In fact, if there was one underlying theme to the President's speech tonight, it was that big government in Washington is the answer to all of our problems. We all know this isn't true. Yet the President's speech was filled with references to new federal spending and new federal programs. If there is one message the American people sent in the last election, it was to balance the budget and begin returning government power to the states and local communities.

Until the President gets a grip on this message and what people really want, real change in Washington will remain blocked at the White House gate.

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



Initiative and Referendum would allow citizens to initiate new laws or constitutional amendments and/or refer a proposition to a statewide ballot for a vote without going through the current legislative process. Haywood was a co-sponsor of Senate Joint Resolution 34 during the last legislative session, which would have allowed this process in Texas.

"During my campaign for the Legislature, I vowed to cut bureaucracy and return government to the people every chance I got. Initiative and Referendum is a key way to further involve our citizens in their government, and I'm grateful to the Lt. Governor for this chance to make it happen for the state of Texas,' ywood stated.

Committee meetings are expected to begin right away, with a final report due no later than December 1, 1996.


### **Hedley Students Begin Garden**




