Lady Bulldogs Best SNU JV Team

A tenacious pressure defense got the best of the Southern Nazarene junior varsity squad Thursday as the home team Clarendon College Lady Bulldogs blasted the visitors, 65-44, in front of a partisan homecoming crowd.

"It was great," head coach Joel Zehr said of the fans. "It was the largest crowd we've had in 8 years. It gave us the home court advantage getting that community support."

The Lady Bulldogs didn't disappoint the crowd, running away to a 30-16 halftime advantage.

Zehr used an even scoring attack in the first half as five players scored at least 5 points apiece.

"I think we just picked up our intensity level," Zehr said. "We started playing well as a team instead of individually. I really believe this is the strongest start we've had."

Lori Hurst and Deborah York scored 6 points apiece while Kristy Parada, Sally Bradshaw and Angie Kopley contributed 5 points apiece.

"We ran really good pressure defense, and we just forced the turnovers. We ran our offense really well

and set good screens and things."

Clarendon stole the ball 10 times in the first half, exposing Southern Nazarene to physical pressure that they've been unaccustomed to, Zehr said.

The Lady Bulldogs went to the charity stripe 17 times in the second half, compared to four trips in the opening period.

Kopley continued her offensive assault scoring 6 points, while Moni Hernandez, Brandy Thomas and Parada had 5 points apiece.

Clarendon scored 35 and held Southern Nazarene to 16 points.

Scoring for the Lady Bulldogs were Kopley, 11; York, 10; Parada, 10; Hurst, 9; Thomas, 8; Bradshaw, 7; Hernandez, 5; Lori Neish, 3; Monica Jalomo, 2.

Next up for Clarendon College is a Tuesday tip-off at 6 p.m. in El Reno, Okla., against Redlands College.

Redlands College beat Southern Nazarene J.V. in overtime, Zehr said. "It's a hard place to win."

CC Stomps Southern Nazarene Jr. Varsity In Homecoming Game

Southern Nazarene's junior varsity nipped at the heels of the Clarendon College Bulldogs on several occasions Thursday, but Clarendon relied on its speed and inside play to run away with a 111-78 homecoming win in front of a packed house.

Clarendon started its assault with a 9-point lead, but the ever-persistent Southern Nazarene went on a 10-point run and were ahead by 1.

The Bulldogs stepped it up and put away the contest midway through the first half.

Randy Williams chipped in 15 points, and Angel Gutierrez dished in 10 points as Clarendon raced to a 56-42 halftime lead.

Freshman forward Tony Clark of Schertz drained two treys in the opening period.

"We say 56 points is a lot of points (for us), but 42 is too many (for them)," Clarendon College head coach Joe Mondragon said. "I don't think we had too good a first half. When our opponent has 42 points, that's scary."

The Bulldogs did a better job of containing pesky Southern Nazarene, holding them to 36 points in the second half and reeling off 55 points of their own.

Jason Kinney led the pack with 10 points in the second half.

Mondragon was pleased with the play of his second string which came

off the bench in the second half.

"They had a good game," Mondragon said. "I was really happy with the guys who came off the bench. The starters in the second half only played about 6 or 7 minutes. The guys came off and kept on playing."

Scoring for the Bulldogs were Randy Williams, 21; Gutierrez, 14; Eric Brown, 12; Chuncey Williams, 11; Jason Kinney, 10; Tony Clark, 9; Marty Hardy, 9; Marlon Green, 6; Bryan Shed, 6; Josh Wright, 6; Marlon Green, 6; Weston White, 5; and Jamie Carter, 2.

The standing-room only crowd at the homecoming game gave the Bulldogs an edge over Southern Nazarene, Mondragon said.

"We really appreciate the support from the townspeople because it just gives us a better atmosphere to play in," he said.

The Bulldogs travel to Colorado Springs Friday and Saturday for match-ups with Air Force Prep and Air Force J.V.

Air Force J.V. topped the Bulldogs in Clarendon after the Christmas break.

They continue their trip on the road with a Tuesday contest at 8 p.m. in El Reno, Okla., with Redlands College. The Lady Bulldogs open the double-header with a 6 p.m. tip-off.

Pepsi To Be Official Soft Drink Of Thunder Junction, McClendon Says

Thunder Junction has signed a \$40,000/year deal with Pepsi Cola to be the official soft drink provider for the local theme park.

Stan McClendon made that announcement as part of the latest community update meeting held Monday night, Jan. 29, 1996, in Clarendon College's Bairfield Activity Center.

"Signing with Pepsi will help insure Thunder Junction does not fail," McClendon told the crowd of 62 people.

The five-year commitment from Pepsi Cola will bring Pepsi, Dr Pepper, Mountain Dew, and Lipton Teas into the park, and Pepsi hopes to make its Ocean Spray brand a part of the water park also.

McClendon reported that Pepsi will be altering the appearance of their 12-packs in the Panhandle region this summer to incorporate the Thunder Junction logo.

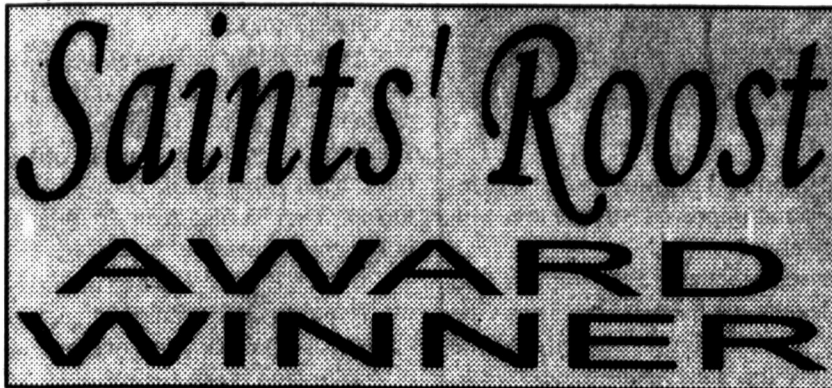
Pepsi will also be providing a quarter million cups for use in the park.

McClendon also reported that Roy Cooper intends to build a 48,000 square foot roping arena. The facil-

ity would cost an estimated \$1.25 million and will probably not be built for one or more years.

Planners say they intend to have the park open by Memorial Day weekend of this year, but concrete work under the water slides still needs to be completed. Also, vendors have to build their facilities, and track for the go-carts must be constructed. A fence also needs to be constructed around the site.

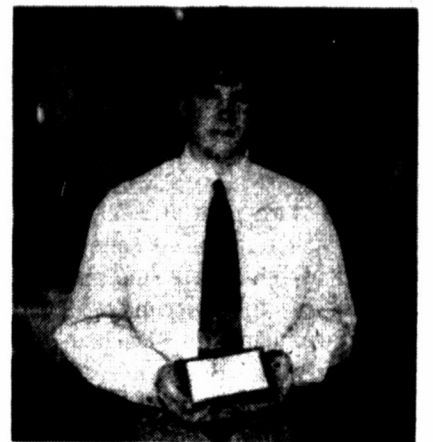

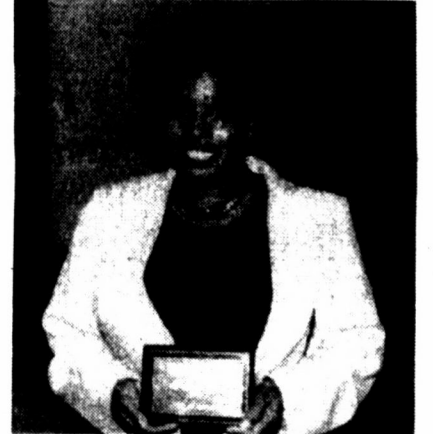
The game begins at 8:00 p.m. at the Bulldog gym. Everyone is invited and encouraged to come.

Also returning is Cory Williams, the young fiddler from Kress. This young man, along with his father Gary Williams and other family members, will be sure to please the audience.

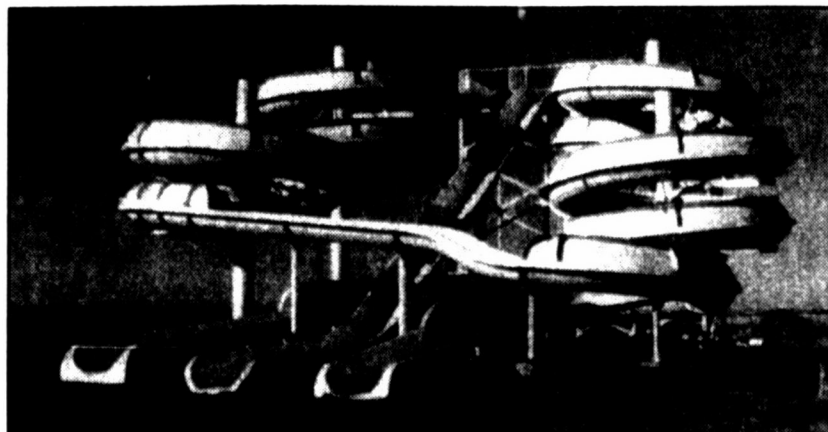
Don Willingham from Hedley, the son of "Dangerous" Don (known to many), will be making his debut at the jamboree.

Last Tuesday's State of the Union address was another fine example of our president's oratorical skills. The speech was passionate and spoke of everything that the people wanted to hear. What was most striking was that President Clinton deeply believed every word of every sentence in his address. Nevermind that many of the sentences contradicted ones that he'd spoken mere seconds earlier.

"The era of big government is over!" the president proclaimed. And since the era of big government was over, he immediately saw fit to introduce half a dozen or so new federal programs.

This speech was Mr. Clinton's first national commercial for his re-election campaign. It contained the new and improved Bill Clinton with the 1996 version of his core beliefs and values.

His supporters say that the president really believes everything he said in that speech. Government should be leaner, not meaner, etc. That's the whole problem with President Clinton. Yes, he deeply believed what he said last week. But he will equally believe the exact opposite next week, and a month from then he'll believe something else, in two months something else, ad nauseum.

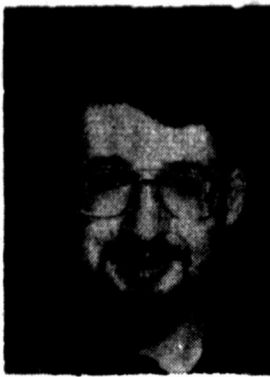
He will say anything he thinks you want to hear, and that is not what the country needs in its Chief Executive. The president should stand for something... anything... even if it's wrong.

Whether you loved or hated Ronald Reagan, you have to admit that he stood by what he believed. If he called the Soviet Union the "Evil Empire," he meant it. When he promised to strengthen the national defense, he did it. When he promised to cut taxes, he did it.

Likewise, when John F. Kennedy said "We choose to go to the moon," then, by golly, water we were going to the moon.

Clinton wants desperately to be remembered as JFK is. He longs for the high approval ratings that Ronald Reagan had.

However, both of those presidents had solid principles that they stood upon in their fight for their agenda. Clinton does not. For that reason, second term or no, he will never be a great president.



President Should Get A Grip On What People Want

The President gave a good speech last week. But then, the President always gives good speeches. What the American people have to be careful about is looking beyond what he says to what he does.

From ending welfare as we know it to providing real tax relief for middle income families, the President's first three years in office have been a hallmark of promises unkept. They've also been a hallmark of big government.

In fact, if there was one underlying theme to the President's speech tonight, it was that big government in Washington is the answer to all of our problems. We all know this isn't true. Yet the President's speech was filled with references to new federal spending and new federal programs. If there is one message the American people sent in the last election, it was to balance the budget and begin returning government power to the states and local communities.

Until the President gets a grip on this message and what people really want, real change in Washington will remain blocked at the White House gate.

Harrington Quartet To Host Guest Pianist From New York

The Harrington String Quartet will hold the second performance of their 1995-96 season on Saturday, February 3, 1996, at 8:00 p.m. at Northern Hall at West Texas A & M University. The distinguished New York pianist and teacher, Gilbert Kalish will join them in the Shostakovich Piano Quintet.

Mr. Kalish is internationally acclaimed for his sensitive interpretations of chamber and solo piano literature spanning the 18th century to the present. His concert tours have taken him across the United States and to many of the world's music capitals and university centers.

Gilbert Kalish is a founding member of the Contemporary Chamber Ensemble and since 1969 he has also appeared with the Boston Symphony Chamber Players. He has taught at the Tanglewood Music Center for 25 years and has been Chairman of the Tanglewood faculty since 1985. His discography of over 80 records for solo piano, songs and diverse chamber music are contained on Arabesque, Bridge, CBS, CRI, Deutsche Gramophone, DEST, Folkways, New World, and Nonesuch recordings. Recently Gilbert Kalish was awarded the Paul Fromm Award for distinguished service to the music of our time.

Joining these Mr. Kalish will be the four permanent members of the Harrington String Quartet: Dawn Harms, violin, John Meisner, violin, Amy Brandfonbrener, viola and Emmanuel Lopez, cello. All four are

principal players in the Amarillo Symphony and faculty members at WTAMU. The Harrington Quartet won the prestigious national prize, the Fischhoff Competition in 1987 and recently played successful recitals in New York, Houston and fig. Last season the Chicago Tribune said, "[The quartet] ... presented it lithe Ravel Quartet in F major] live, breathing and memorable. [They] ... showed qualities well beyond an ability to win contests."

The concert will also include Haydn's String Quartet, Opus 64 and Schumann's String Quartet in A major, Opus 14. Single tickets are \$7 for adults and \$2 for students and senior citizens. Haywood Appointed To Special Interim Committee

State Senator Tom Haywood (R-District 30) was appointed by Lt. Governor Bob Bullock to serve on a special Senate Interim Committee on Initiative and Referendum.

"I have taken this issue very seriously because I know that my constituents take it seriously. Many citizens of District 30 have been very active in their support of enacting I & R in Texas. Therefore I consider it my duty to do all I can to see that it gets a fair shot in the Legislature," Haywood stated.

Initiative and Referendum would allow citizens to initiate new laws or constitutional amendments and/or refer a proposition to a statewide ballot for a vote without going through the current legislative process. Haywood was a co-sponsor of Senate Joint Resolution 34 during the last legislative session, which would have allowed this process in Texas.

"During my campaign for the Legislature, I vowed to cut bureaucracy and return government to the people every chance I got. Initiative and Referendum is a key way to further involve our citizens in their government, and I'm grateful to the Lt. Governor for this chance to make it happen for the state of Texas," Haywood stated.

Committee meetings are expected to begin right away, with a final report due no later than December 1, 1996.

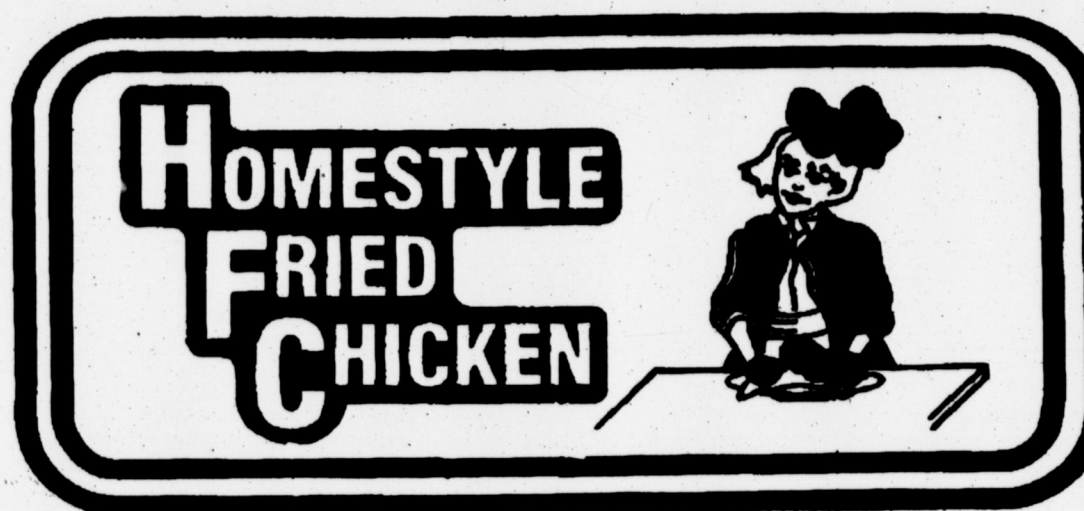

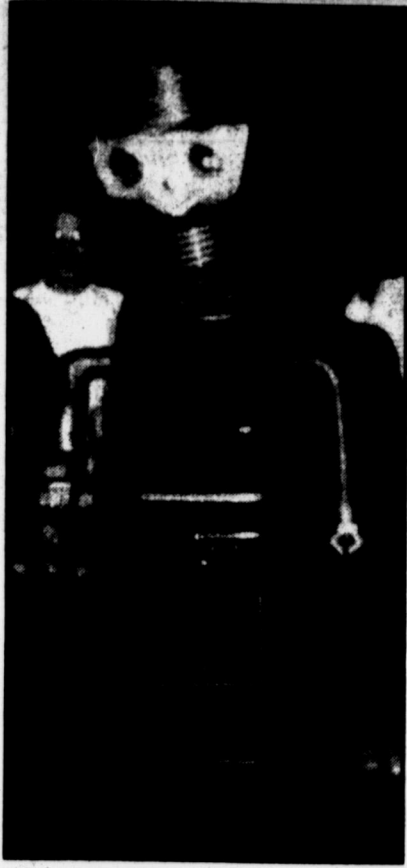

Bronchos Share First Half of District 2-2A Title

Clarendon's Bronchos ended the first half of District 2-2A action Jan. 23 with a 73-69 thriller over Amarillo Highland Park for a share of the first half district title with rival Panhandle.

Both teams finished 4-1 for the first half of district play. Clarendon fell to Panhandle, while Panhandle dropped their lone game to Highland Park.

The Bronchos Friday opened up the second half of district action with a bang, romping over Memphis, 69-48, in Memphis.

Clarendon's overall record improved to 18-5, and 5-1 in District 2-2A.

Panhandle travels to Clarendon Friday at 8 p.m. for a rematch of their earlier meeting Jan. 16 in Panhandle. The last time the two squads met, the Panthers prevailed, 69-59.

The Bronchos shared the 1994-95 District 2-2A championship with Panhandle and has lost to them four times in their last four meetings.

There's nothing that Coach Jimmy Avery's charges would like better than to thump Panhandle before a huge home crowd.

"We have got to stop (Chad) Bertrand and (Jason) Minter to win, and I think the crowd can help us with

their cheering," Avery said.

Bertrand scored 20 and was 8-for-10 from the free throw line, and Minter dropped in 19 points and was 5-for-5 from the charity stripe the last time the two teams met.

"We can't let them go to the free throw line as much as we did the last time. Panhandle shot 28 free throws and converted 20 of them."

Clarendon was 6-for-10 from the free throw line.

The Panthers have many other weapons, including a disciplined offense and defense, Avery said.

"We're going to have to play a lot better than we did last time," Avery said. "We didn't act as if we wanted it as bad as they did. We will be ready to play this time."

Clarendon's running game and pressure defense was alive during their Friday contest with Highway 287 rival Memphis, as the Bronchos stole the ball 24 times and grabbed 40 rebounds.

Five Bronchos scored in the opening quarter as they rolled to a 19-11 lead. Post Chris Brown was 3-for-3 from the field, scoring 6 points.

Drew Jeffers and Clemmie Smith dropped in two buckets apiece, and Dean Stanzione drained a trey.

Memphis, behind Kedrick

Monson's 7 points, continued to threaten the Bronchos, but Roy Williams connected on two field goals and two free throws, and Clarendon led, 33-22, at halftime.

During the last two minutes of the second quarter, Clarendon went into a crowd-pleasing four-corner stall. Memphis never came after the ball, and Lorenzo Moore stood at mid-court before driving in and drawing the foul with :08 remaining.

He converted both free throws to close out the half.

"It was kind of unusual," Avery said of Memphis' decision not to come after the ball. "I guess they didn't want us to extend the lead any further."

Smith, who grabbed 8 rebounds and dished out 4 assists, scored 6 points in the third quarter; and point guard Kareem Abdullah finally found his spot and hit a three-pointer and a field goal.

Clarendon extended the lead, 50-34, entering the final quarter.

The Bronchos outscored Memphis, 19-14, in the final period.

"We looked OK at times," Avery said. "We're going to have to step it up a notch for the remaining four games if we want to make sure we'll make the play-offs. We've got a tough schedule ahead of us."

Statistics for the Bronchos were Moore, 15 points, 9 rebounds, 5 steals, 4 assists and 1 block; Smith, 14 points, 8 rebounds, 4 assists, and 1 steal; Brown, 10 points, 6 rebounds, 2 steals; Williams, 10 points, 9 rebounds, 4 steals, 5 assists and 1 block; Abdullah, 5 points, 5 steals, 5 assists, and 3 rebounds; Jeffers, 6 points, 5 steals and 4 rebounds; and Stanzione, 5 points, 2 steals and 2 assists.

The Bronchos nearly blew a 57-46 third quarter cushion they had built for themselves in Amarillo as Highland Park outscored Clarendon, 25-16, in the final period Jan. 23.

Clarendon led 17-15 at the end of a fast-paced first quarter as Williams roled off three field goals and Brown added two of his own.

The Bronchos outscored Highland Park, 22-17, before halftime mainly behind Smith's and Moore's 8 points apiece.

"We pressed them the first half but then got into a little bit of foul trouble, so we had to abandon that in the second half," Avery said. "Highland Park really got after it in the second half, and their play worried me."

Jeffers, who usually plays inside, hit two treys, a field goal and two free throws in the third quarter to spark the Bronchos. Williams added two field goals, and Brown and Moore added a bucket apiece.

Highland Park pressed Clarendon in the fourth quarter forcing several Broncho turnovers. The Hornets scored 25 points compared to Clarendon's 16.

Stanzione hit a three-pointer, and Moore added 8 points in the final quarter. Jeffers continued to have the hot hand, putting in two more baskets.

Clarendon hung onto the lead and a first place tie for the District 2-2A race.

Scoring for the Bronchos were Moore, 20; Williams, 14; Jeffers, 14; Smith, 11; Stanzione, 7; Brown, 6; and Abdullah, 1.

Clarendon travels to Wellington Tuesday for an 8 p.m. start.

"It's always tough to play in Wellington," Avery said. "They'll be hard to beat over there. They're playing well, and just because we beat them once before doesn't mean we have the contest in our hands."

Lady Bronchos Blow Out Highland Park

The Lady Bronchos opened up the second half of District 2-2A action the same way they ended the first half - with a trouncing of the home team.

Clarendon blew out Amarillo Highland Park, 73-43, Jan. 23 in Amarillo to end the first half of district play with a 2-2 record and a third place finish behind Panhandle and Wellington.

They started fresh for the second half and a run at the District title with a 62-38 thumping of Memphis Friday in the Cyclone gym for a 1-0 record.

Their record improves to 16-8 for the season.

Four Lady Bronchos scored in the opening period as Clarendon held onto a 9-8 first quarter lead.

Kasi Ashcraft added two field goals and was 4-for-4 from the charity stripe in the second quarter. Stephanie Floyd, who had 8 rebounds, also added two baskets for a slight 24-18 halftime advantage.

"We played all right, but didn't shoot well in the first half," head coach Steve Schmidt said. "In the second half, we started hitting our shots, and the defensive pressure was more effective."

In addition to dishing off 8 assists, Corey Knorpp knocked in two from behind the arc, and Ashcraft hit two more baskets and a free throw.

Melisse Campbell hit a trey, and Kim Alexander and Lindsey Eads each contributed a bucket for a 42-30 lead heading into the final period.

The sophomore Ashcraft canned two field goals and was 3-for-6 from the free throw line in the fourth period as Clarendon outscored the Lady Cyclones, 20-8, for a strong finish.

Floyd and Knorpp each put in a field goal and two free throws.

"Kasi had 22 points, and she was 8 for 12 from the free throw line," Schmidt said. "That was a big help."

Their pressure defense held Highland Park to 9 points for the quarter.

Scoring for the Lady Bronchos were Ashcraft, 17; Campbell, 15; Alexander, 10; Wilson, 9; Knorpp, 8; Floyd, 8; Hearn, 4; and Eads, 2.

The Lady Bronchos are looking forward to entertaining district rival Panhandle Friday at 6:30 p.m. in the Clarendon gym, Schmidt said.

Clarendon controlled the contest for three quarters when the two teams met earlier this year, but they let it slip away in the fourth quarter as Panhandle repeatedly went to the free throw line.

"We're excited," Schmidt said. "We let them shoot 47 free throws over there. If we cut down on fouls, we'll have a much better chance. We'll have to handle their pressure. I just hope we get a big crowd. That always helps. I encourage it."
