FOOTBALL LIGHTING

Kerby, local high school coach, has been appearing in The News. We understand this project was taken up last year, but that it came up too late to be accomplished in time for the football season. Paradoxical as is the statement in that headline, it is true nevertheless. Advertising is information and as such it is a kind of news. Business information is business news and people subscribe for newspapers to get that business news as well as to get other kinds of news.

An advertisement which contains no news isn't much of an advertisement. Even if it contains nothing more than the name of the advertiser and the location of his place of business, that will be news to someone. If the advertisement speaks specifically of certain goods and tells the reader where those goods may be obtained, that certainly is news, and if it names an attractive price, then it is interesting news indeed.

There is the classic story of the merchant who didn't believe in advertising until a resourceful advertising man prevailed upon him to try an experiment. The merchant had a large supply of brooms which had cost him \$3.00 a dozen. The advertising man told him that it would be good business to advertise a special offer of one broom at nine cents to each of the first 100 customers entering the store.

The merchant was dubious but agreed to try it. When he opened his store the next morning he found several hundred women waiting to get a nine-cent broom. He not only sold the 100 brooms at that price in record time but the women had been made "broom minded" enough so that most of his stock was sold at the regular price. Besides that they bought many other articles before they left the store-all because of the "news" of the nine-cent brooms in that merchant's ad.

P. S. After that the merchant was a believer in advertising-advertising which is "news."

NEW LAW ON VOTING

Absentee votes may be cast in the election on Texas the polling place because of sickness or physical disability.

The last legislature changed the absentee voting law to this effect. It now reads: "Any qualified elector of this state who, through the nature of his business is absent from the county of his residence or who because of sickless, cause his vote to be cast at such election in the pre-

Heretofore, only absence from the county gave the right of an absentee vote.

In order to seure this privilege the voter must make an application in writing to the county clerk, sending the poll tax receipt or exemption or in lieu thereof, his affidavit in writing that the receipt or exemption has been lost or

Absentee voting must be done not more than 15 days nor less than three prior to the election and will be at the office of the county clerk .-- Cleburne Times-Review.
