### FARM INCOME GAINS

The use of tractors on farms is almost entirely an American institution. Recent reports of industrial exports show that practically all the foreign demand for American farm machinery is for horse-drawn types. However, the report shows that for the past two years the demand for our farm machinery has been on the upgrade, most of the exports going to the Argentine, Chile, South Africa, Ausralia, Cuba and the Scandinavian countries. The level of arm machinery exports is still well below that of 1929 and 930, but the manufacturers say the increase is steady and ncouraging.

The increase in demand for farm machinery at home is fast taking on the aspects of a spurt, and the industry as a whole is now on the highest level since 1930. One of the reasons given is the increase in the farmer's cash income. This income, as shown by a study by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, during April of this yeas, totaled \$507,000,000. In March the total was \$466,000,000. In April a year ago the total farm income was \$387,000,000.

Increase in the farm income can largely be attributed to the fact that the farmer, principally through AAA operation, is now receiving a larger share of the retail prices than he has for some years. The manufacturer members of industrial organizations now attacking the New Deal would have difficulty in getting the makers of farm machinery and other articles sold to farmers to join them.

The whole situation plainly indicates that much of the prosperity of the United States depends on the domestic markets. With the farmers receiving a higher ratio of cash for his products, he is buying more agricultural machinery and other things—and the city man gets the benefit in proportion through the natural hannels of traade. -Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

Officials of the Clarendon High School and Clarendon Junior College stated this week that many improvements have been made in the building prior to the opening date of school, the most outstanding being the change of library.

Upon recommendation of the state supervisor, the college and high school library was moved this summer from its location in the basement to the southeast room on the first floor. The text book and stack room was moved to the former location of the library and the text book room joins with the southeast room in making the library. The change was made due to the fact that the basement library rendered inadequate reading room and poor lighting facilities. Many new books have been added to the library, already the most complete of any public school library due to the fact that it was retained after the old college had been moved.

A new study hall has been equipped to acommodate the enrollment which will be greatly in creased by the bus routes from rural schools. The northeast corner room first floor has beer reserved for this purpose.

A class room has been equipped in the southwest corner basemen oom formerly occupied by the Palo Duro Literary Society, and new steps have been made for the south entrance.

No changes have been made in the chemistry and biology de partments except replenishing of the store of chemicals. One of large gas furnaces formerly used in the lower hall has been moved to the new study hall, and shower and dressing room for boys has been moved to the basement in the northwest wing of the girls dormitory.

For the past three weeks several men have been employed to clean the building thoroughly and refinish the blackboards.






