# PIONEER RESIDENT EXPECT TO FINISH OF CLARENDON DIES PROJECT BY SPRING CONTRACTORS SAY

IS LONGEST ONE-STRETCH PAVING JOB IN HISTORY OF HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT.

(Wednesday's Amarillo News.) The longest "one-stretch" payng project in the history of the Texas Highway Department is now under way across Donley and of No. 5 from Memphis to Claude, a distance of nearly 60 miles.

Taking advantage of ideal weather for the past month the approximately 20 miles of the road is nearing completion and should be thrown open to traffic within two or three weeks. The first portion of the road to be opened will be from Goodnight to Clarendon.

Barring abnormally bad weather it is believed that the entire new highway will be completed by early spring. It will be opened soned and is ready for the asphalt topping that will be applied in warm weather.

Plans of the highway department are for completion of the entire route by early summer, including the 15 miles west of Claude as well as the rebuilding When finished, No. 5 will provide tance of almost 90 miles beand tween Memphis and Amarillo.

The road being constructed in will be 20 feet in width.

The same dimensions will be followed to a point six miles east of Amarillo when the road will be widened to a 30-foot, three-way poulevard similar to the new road-way just east of Amarillo on the Panhandle-Pampa highway.

## IS THERE A SANTA CLAUS?

(Editor's note: No Christmas editorial has ever been so widely quoted, or reprinted, as the one below, the classic answer to the question, "Is There a Santa Claus?" The editorial was written by Richard Henry Dana, and first appeared in the New York Sun, September 21, 1897. The editorial was inspired by the letter of Virginia O'Hanlon.)

Dear Editor-I am eight years old. Some of my little friends say there is no SANTA

Papa says, "If you see it in the Sun it's so." Please tell me the truth, is there a SANTA CLAUS? VIRGINIA O'HANLON, 115 West Ninety-fifth street.

"Virginia, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, VIRGINIA, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole truth and knowledge.

"Yes, Virginia there is a SANTA CLAUS. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! how dreary would be the world if there were no SANTA CLAUS! It would be as dreary as if there were no Virginias. There would be no childlike faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence. We should have no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The eternal light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.

"Not believe in Santa Claus! You might as well not believe in fairies! You might get your papa to hire men to watch in all the chimneys on Christmas eve to catch SANTA CLAUS, but even if they did not see SANTA CLAUS coming down, what would that prove? Nobody sees Santa Claus, but that is no sign that there is no SANTA CLAUS. The most real things in the world are those that neither children nor men can see. Did you ever see fairies dancing on the lawn? Of course not, but that's no proof that they are not there. Nobody can concieve or imagine all the wonders there are unseen and unseeable in the world.

"You may tear apart the baby's rattle and see what makes the noise inside, but there is a veil covering the unseen world which not the strongest man, nor even the united strength of all the strongest men that ever lived, could tear apart. Only faith, fancy, poetry, love, romance, can push aside that curtain and view and picture the supernatural beauty and glory beyond. Is it real? Ah, Virginia, in all this world there is nothing else real and abiding.

"No SANTA CLAUS? Thank God! he lives forever. A thousand years from now, Virginia, nay, ten itmes ten thousand years from now, he will continue to make glad the heart of childhood.






