

At a recent auction of rare books, the famous Rosebury Shakespeare was sold to an unnamed collector for the sum of \$50,000. This folio, one of the few perfect ones in existence, was printed in London in 1623, seven years after the death of Shakespeare, and originally cost one pound in English currency. The Library of Congress celebrated Shakespeare's birth date in April by using one of his early publications as the "Exhibit of the Week." Russia celebrated the Raleigh, North Carolina; after a with extensive ceremonies including performances of his plays, given in the 27 languages current in the Soviet Union.






