New city secretary at **Hedley** resigns

The City of Hedley hired and lost a new city secretary in less than a week as officials there continue the search for Randy Shaw's successor. The Board of Aldermen met in a called session Tuesday, July 20, and hired Bill Farris to replace Shaw, who is leaving the city July 31 after 19 years. Farris began work the next day, but City Hall reports that he quit two days later on Friday. "I guess it was more than he could handle or expected," Mayor Dusty Wilkinson told the Enterprise. Hedley Aldermen are scheduled to meet this Thursday night, July 29, at 7 p.m. for the purpose of hiring someone. Wilkinson said it is very important a decision be made and that someone is hired who has a commercial driver's license (CDL). "Randy's last day is Friday," the mayor said. "We have to have someone who can drive the trash truck on Monday." Wilkinson said if no one is hired this week, the city will make arrangements to make sure the trash is picked up. Hedley does have two new employees this week. Holly McCleskey and Jason Conatser began work this week as the incoming city clerk and maintenance worker. They will replace Rhonda Shaw and Roger Hager, who are following Randy Shaw's exit.

dies after truck rolls

A single-vehicle accident in Collingsworth County claimed the life of a local man Friday afternoon.

Sean P. Campbell, a 22-year-old ranch hand from Clarendon, died at the scene of the accident, according Texas Department of Public Safety Trooper Daniel Hawthorne.

Campbell was westbound on FM 1056 at 3:18 p.m. eight miles west of Wellington approaching FM 1547 and was entering a curve in a 2000 Chevrolet pickup when he crossed the center line and left the roadway. The DPS said Campbell overcorrected, which caused the pickup to roll, partially ejecting the driver. He was not wearing a seatbelt.

Collingsworth County Justice of the Peace Jo Rita Henard pronounced Campbell dead at 3:59.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at the Church of the Nazarene in Clarendon. Graveside services were held at 2 p.m. Tuesday in Citizens Cemetery.

Survivors include his mother LaDonna Campbell of Farmers Branch, his father and step-mother Ed and Marsha Campbell of Wellington; grandparents Barbara Hewett of Clarendon, and Jack and Dana Campbell of Farmington, NM.; aunts, uncles, cousins, and friends. History can tell the outcome of Obamanomics

The grand lesson of the 20th century is that Big Government retards economic progress.

The evidence of this lesson goes beyond the socialist countries and their dramatic economic failures. Several decades ago, as a young economist, I encountered repeated studies that showed a high correlation between two macroeconomic phenomena: The larger the government's share of a country's GDP, the slower the rate of economic growth tended to be. Conversely, economic growth flourished where government was relatively small.

Many Americans seemed, and still seem, impervious to this lesson despite our own history. The same correlation was evident in the 1920s, when President Harding cut the size of federal spending in half, leading to a decade of prosperity, and in the 1930s, when the economy tanked under Presidents Hoover and Roosevelt and their huge expansions of government. Despite this clear historical evidence, President Obama is committed to growing government. He has increased federal spending to over 27 percent of GDP, up from 20.5 percent when George W. Bush left office. Obama indisputably favors the public sector over the private. When Michelle Obama gave her famous speech a couple of years ago, urging young people to avoid working for profit-seeking (i.e., private) companies, she was doing more than simply expressing an opinion: She articulated her husband's agenda. It started on day one, when Obama staffed his cabinet and other top positions in his administration with a record-low percentage of people with privatesector experience-fewer than 10 percent (the historical average is near 40 percent). Since then, he has consistently worked to bring more and more people onto the government payroll. He increased the number of paid positions in Americorps by 224 percent; Teach for America by 94 percent; Peace Corps, 24 percent. The health-insurance bill created dozens of new agencies. The just-passed financial reform bill creates a new bureaucracy with an initial budget of nearly a billion dollars per year. One source recently reported that Team Obama is revoking contracts with private firms and transferring the work to government employees. The government even hires former employees of the private contractors, giving them significant pay-and-benefit hikes. That may be good for them, but at a time of record budget deficits, finding ways to increase the costs of government doesn't make economic sense.



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In his compact 1944 classic, Bureaucracy, economist Ludwig von Mises explained why bureaucracies are inherently uneconomical. Whether under socialist or democratic governments, bureaucracies are not disciplined by the profit-loss calculus. Insulated from the competitive marketplace, they become bloated and inefficient. When private businesses serve customers poorly, their revenues decline. If their losses are severeenough, they fold. Exactly the opposite happens with bureaucracies. If they fail to get the job done, Congress typically appropriates more funds for them. We saw this with FEMA after Hurricane Katrina, and the same dynamic will play out with Obamacare, too, unless it is repealed. It's the nature of the beast.

No society can afford to bear the costs of many bureaucracies. As much as Obama prefers government workers, most people need to be in the private sector generating the wealth that government appropriates for bureaucratic functions.

This implies that Obama has veered down a dead-end detour. He wants government agencies to be in charge of this, that, and the other thing, but how can we pay for it all? A bureau-centric policy agenda inevitably impedes economic growth.

Obamanomics, in short, ignores two economic truths: Expanding government's share of GDP cripples economic growth. So does a proliferation of new government bureaucracies. From this we may predict that Obama's policies will saddle us with continuing economic sluggishness.

Given that Americans tend to replace presidents when the economy is struggling, can we predict that Obama will be a one-term president? I don't think so. The presidential campaign of 2012 could be a repeat of 1936 (FDR's first run for re-election). The historical record shows that many voters in 1936 were disappointed about the terrible shape of the overall economy after four years of New Deal programs. Many who were unhappy about the economy voted for Roosevelt anyhow. Why? Because they were benefiting personally from his massive spending programs. Obama's stimulus plan has been and will continue to be spent in ways that benefit targeted groups. His recent request for another \$50 billion to give to teachers, firefighters, and police (traditionally, these have been locally funded public employees, and therefore independent of Washington) is just one example of Obama's politically strategic spending. Obama has ignored the economic lessons of history, but he has taken to heart the political lesson of FDR's formula for electoral success. It would be prudent and timely for us citizens to grasp both the economic and political lessons of our history.

States and our neighbors. However, we must not overlook the critical importance of maritime ports to our nation's safety. Both because they serve as gateways into the United States and because they facilitate much of our nation's international trade, American ports are potentially vulnerable spots that must be carefully guarded.

The U.S. maritime transportation system is a vital asset to our national economy, and it employs over 13 million American workers. There are more than 300 ports dotted along the Atlantic, Pacific, and Gulf Coasts of the United States. Some 2 billion tons of domestic, import and export cargo pass along their docks and through their waterways each year. This commercial activity contributes to \$742 billion to the U.S. gross domestic product.

In Texas, there are 28 seaports from Houston and Galveston down to Brownsville, including three of the busiest ports in the United States. Our state's economy depends on the viability of this maritime transport system. Each year, over 500 million tons of cargo move through Texas seaports. This flow of commerce keeps more than a million Texans employed and accounts for over \$180 billion in revenue. The products of Texas farms and ranches pass through these portals as they are shipped to marketplaces across the globe. Ports also facilitate the import and export of many other products vital

One terrorist incident at a **Capitol**

of American life, impact surrounding coastal communities, and catastrophically affect our nation's economy. The Brookings Institution recently estimated that if terrorists detonated a weapon of mass destruction at an American port, besides the devastating loss of life, it would cost the U.S. economy a crippling \$1 trillion.

One important way we are working to keep seaports safe is through the Port Security Grant Program, which helps our nation's ports assess security risks and make preparations for emergencies or attacks. Since 2002, Texas has received over \$200 million in competitive Port Security Grants, primarily to secure petrochemical facilities.

In 2006, I cosponsored the SAFE Port Act, sweeping port security legislation that the full Senate passed and was signed into law. The bill authorized random inspection of containers, established minimum standards and procedures for security containers in transit to the United States, and implemented an improved container targeting system. I also added an amendment, which

On September 30, 2010, many of the critical provisions that have helped American ports operate safely for the past four years will expire. As the senior Republican on the Senate Commerce Committee, I have begun work with my colleagues to reauthorize those expiring provisions and explore new ways to bolster the security of our nation's seaports. As we undertake this critical task, I hope we can work cooperatively with the Department of Homeland Security, including the Coast Guard and Customs and Border Protection, with state and local governments, and with key industry stakeholders to put systems in place that will preserve ports' security and viability.

Some argue that U.S. presence overseas provides assurance to our allies and deterrence to our adversaries. History has shown otherwise. Russia did not hesitate to conduct military operations against Georgia in 2008. Having troops in South Korea did not deter North Korean aggression against a South Korean naval vessel last May. We should assure our allies and deter our enemies with strong military capabilities and sound policy, not merely by keeping our troops stationed overseas.

American seaports are essential to our long-term economic growth. We must ensure that they have the resources to meet the homeland security challenges of the 21st century.

Drugs in the News

Experimental Drug More Effective Against TB

The results of a small study published this month in the New England Journal of Medicine indicate that an experimental drug referred to as TMC207 was significantly more effective in treating drug-resistant tuberculosis (TB) than were conventional or routine drugs such as isoniazid and rifampin.

In fact, TMC207 is reported by researchers to be five times more effective against the TB bacteria. This experimental drug reportedly starves or cuts off the energy supply for the bacteria that causes TB. The study evaluated 47 individuals who had been newly diagnosed with multi-drug resistant TB. Half received TM207 and half received placebo (fake drug). After 8 weeks of treatment, almost 50% of those who received TM207 tested negative for TB, compared to only 9% of those who received placebo. One recent news report refers to TM207 as the "first new TB drug in 40 years." The World Health Organization reports that approximately 9 million new cases of TB occur each year around the world. Almost 500,000 of these new cases are resistant to standard, multiple drug therapy.


