Atomic bomb saved lives of Americans

United States dent Harry Truman delivered a "rain of ruin" upon Hiroshima, Japan, with Nagasaki hit three days later, killing 100,000 to 200,000 .
Truman's objective was to compel surrender from an intransigent enemy that refused to halt its naked aggression. The barbarous mentality of 1940s Japan was beyond belief. An entire nation lost its mind, consumed by a ferocious militarism and hell-bent on suicide. Facing such fanaticism, Truman felt no alternative but to use the bomb. As George C. Marshall put it, the Allies needed something extraordinary "to
shock [the Japanese] into action." Nothing else was hock fhe Japanese) into action. Nohing else was spiral, with no end in sight.
thad to end the war," said a desperate Marhall later. "We had to save American lives."
Evidence shows the bomb achieved that, saving millions of lives, not merely Americans but Japanese. The Japanese themselves acknowledged his, from the likes of Toshikazu Kase to Emperor Hirohito himself. Kase was among the high-level officials representing Japan at its formal surrender aboard he USS Missouri. "The capitulation of Japan," Kase said definitively, "saved the lives of several million men."

## Judge Bean a historic Texas figure

Nearly 130 years ago this month,
a larger than life figure with a colorful past and an unorthodox set of principles
became the first justice of the peace to became the first justice of the peace to
serve in the lawless country between the Pecos and Rio Grande. Dubbing him-
self the "Liw West Bean was appointed as justice of Pecos Bean was appointed as justice of Pecos
County on August 2, 1882, leaving a trail of questionable encounters and his own
narrow escapes from the law behind him. To this day, the line between fact
and fiction in the life of Roy Bean remains blurred. According to mos accounts, Roy was born in Mason Country, Kentucky in 1825 to Francis and Anna Bean. He left home as a teenager
to join his brother Samuel driving oxen down the Santa Fe Trail to Chihuahua, Mexico. The Bean brothers began working as traders in Chihuahua, but Roy soon got into trouble and fled to
San Diego, where his brother Joshua served as mayor and was well respected among the residents. In 1851, Joshua was appointed major general of the star militia and relocated to San Gabriel. In February 1852 , Roy was throw
into jail after a duel, but he managed to escape and moved swiftly to join his broterer in San Gabriel. Joshuq owned
a general store and the Headquarters Saloon there, which Roy inherited after his brother's murder in November 185 With jet black hair and a fair complexion, Roy was considered attractive
and well-dressed, once even described and well-dressed, once even described

He eventually made his way to Vinegarroon, just west of the

On one occasion, when a man fell off a bridge and died, Roy fined the corpse for he same amount he had been carrying when he was found - $\$ 40$. Roy figured hat money would cover the funeral expenses. While he was known to intimi went, he never hanged anyone dusine enure. Roy passed away in his saring his on March 16, 1903. He is interred at the Whitehead Memorial Museum in Del
Today Judge Roy Bean remains fixture in Texas and American folklore, even serving as the subject of the Oscar-nominated 1970s film, The Life and Times of Judge Roy Bean, starring Paul Newman as Bean. While billed as a fictitious account, the film was fitted with a tagline that probably best summa-
rizes the colorful life and legacy of Roy Bean: "If this story ain"t true it should Bean: "If this story ain't true... it shoulda
