





With such a limited number of counties, any county that fails to muster enough interest among its farmers to qualify undoubtedly will be replaced by a county in which there is more interest in crop insurance.

Consequently, county cotton producers are actually deciding this year whether or not they want to build a crop insurance program in the county to provide protection against all unavoidable crop production risks.

Since Federal crop insurance premiums are used only to pay losses suffered by insured producers, it is pointed out that any diissatisfaction with the premium rates for 1948 should be tempered by the fact that producers can improve them by proving that they are out of line with actual loss experience under the program.
