Geology of This Area Supplies Local Well Driller Interesting Study

Tapping his second artesian water strata in Mulberry canyon, some four miles above the JA ranch bridge a few days ago, was the second time that well driller A. H. Moore found the same strata that flowed out on top. The flowing strata is found at a depth of around 140 feet. It was in 1938 that he found the same strata on the upper Mulberry canyon area on the old Goodnight ranch. Some weeks ago he encountered the same strata on a hill southwest of the JA ranch headquarters, but being on a hill, the water did not flow out on top. Mr. Moore says that the strata may be easily identified by the markings of a fine, red sand that is different to that found elsewhere. Some years ago, while drilling northwest of Amarillo on the Bush estate holdings, Mr. Moore states that he drilled through three stratas of coal. This is the coal beds of the Triassic formation which are usually about three feet in thickness. It has been known for some time that the plains have a red foundation brought in from the Pacific ocean. Later this high

Memphis To Stage Colorful Rodeo July 24, 25, 26th

Among top-notch featured specialty acts are Vivian White, trick rider; Charlie Schultz and his "bucking Ford"; Clark Schultz, trick rope and whip artist, clowns, trick ropers and many other sideliights to complement the top cowboy talent to be on hand for the three-day event. Admission will be \$1.80 for reserved seats and \$1.50 for bleachers, with children to be admitted for 90 cents reserved and 60 cents bleacher.

A dairy industry approximating a one-half million dollar a year income to Donley County has been developed during the past four years; two years ago, the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce received the West Texas Chamber of Commerce award for having the best agricultural program of any of the chambers in West Texas; during the past twelve years, under sponsorship of chamber of commerce, the future farmer chapter of Clarendon and the Donley County 4-H club has produced more grand champion animals in the leading junior livestock shows of the state than has similar clubs in any other section. The chamber of commerce has actively sponsored the Clarendon High School Band contributing from \$750 to \$1200 per year toward the band master's salary; it has sponsored the high school vocational agriculture department and has paid one-fourth the salary of the high school vocational agriculture instructor; and has carried on many other worthwhile activities while operating on a part time basis. The chamber of commerce committees have contacted a major portion of the merchants of Clarendon and prospects are good for a full time chamber of commerce manager to help further Clarendon's claim to being the garden spot of the Panhandle. Weekly SURPLUS NEWS WAA

Employing "cash and carry" sales tactics to surplus Texas real property for the first time, War Assets Administration will offer 100 buildings of the Dalhart Army Air Field on a spot bid basis July 15. The streamlined type of sale was adopted as the most expedient means of provid-

ing additional storage facilities to wheat growers in the Panhandle area. The buildings will be sold at Dalhart singly with bids acceptable from any one present, and awards announced as fast as bids are sorted.

War Assets Administration has decided to donate several thousand surplus dynamotors to schools and other public institutions. Approximately 2,000 institutions in the Grand Prairie region are eligible, it is estimated. The inventory is located at the Belmont Radio Corporation, Lock-

land, Ohio, and inquiries should be directed to WAA officials there or to Mr. Logan, care State Educational Agency for Surplus Property, Austin, Texas. Dynamotors are commonly used as power sources for radio and communications equipment.
