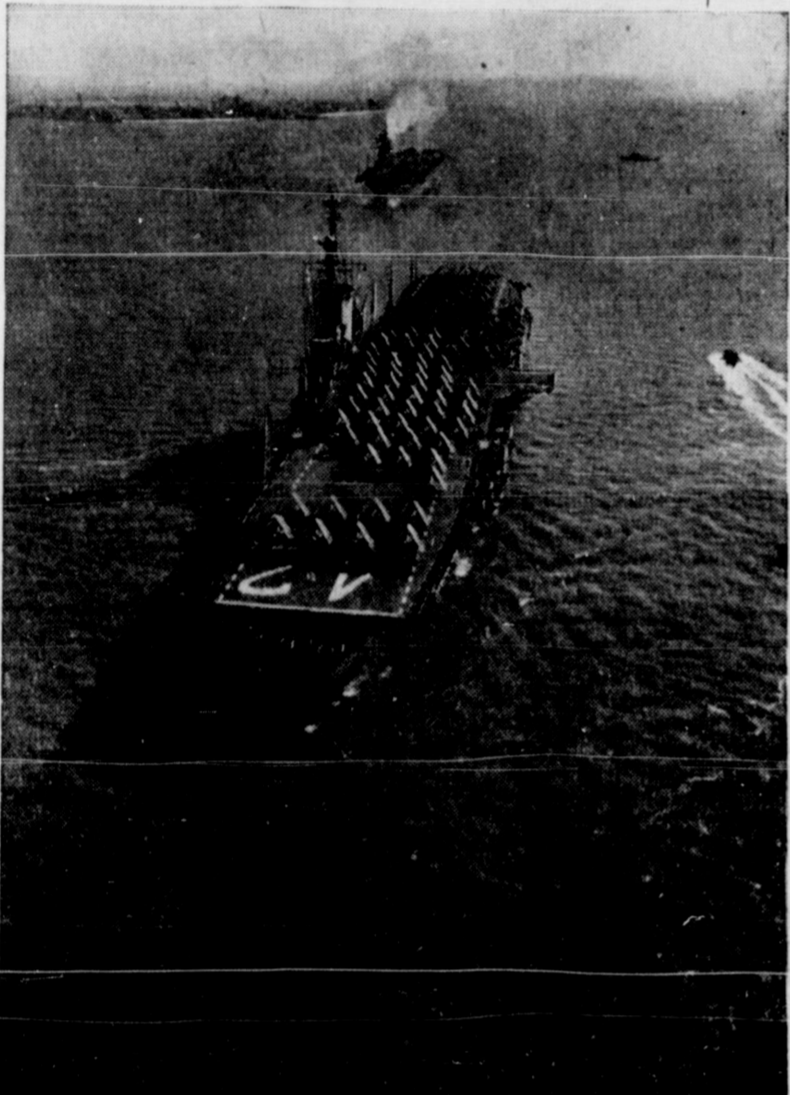

WORLD'S LARGEST CARRIERS SAIL TOGETHER AS EIGHTH FLEET MANEUVERS



The USS Franklin D. Roosevelt (foreground) and the USS Midway (astern) take part in maneuvers of the U. S. Eighth Fleet, which is under the command of Admiral Marc A. Mitscher, USN. Both 45,000-tonners they are two of the three largest carriers in the world, the other one being the USS Coral Sea. The present maneuvers will extend into the summer.

Leathers lacked only a very few days having served four years in the Navy and Marine Corps. For the past several months, he has been in Tientsin, China. He plans to enter Texas Tech in the fall where he likes one year of college work in order to receive his degree in animal husbandry.

Rain Boosts Crop Prospects

A completely unexpected rain by many local weather prophets fell last Thursday morning drenching Clarendon with approximately .44 of an inch.

Cotton planting was, in general, in full swing last week, and probably the rain damaged much of newly planted seed. Winds which followed the shower tended to dry out the surface moisture very quickly thus baking the surface making it impossible to save seed without breaking the crust with scratchers. Many farmers over the county have planted cotton their third time to date, and possibly more in some cases.

Wheat was probably the crop which profited most by the recent moisture. There is said to be more wheat in Donley County right now than there has ever been. Some of it is good and some too far gone for the rain to do it much good, but the shower is going to fill out the grains a whole lot in the better wheat, and greatly improve the yield.

BOB WORD RELEASED FROM ACTIVE DUTY

Bob Word, Y 2/c, son of Mr. and Mrs. Millard Word, was released from active duty on May 16th after 27 months service in the Navy at San Pedro, Calif. He served 14 months on an LCI (g), during which he made the initial landing at Leyte. In July he joined the staff of Rear Admiral Reiffingizer, commander of amphibious group Four on board the USS Mt. McKinley. In the latter part of Sept. he had the initial occupation of Kyushu, Japan in the Nagasaki area. In the first part of October, they had the initial occupation of the Kure area. In December of 1945 he returned to the States and in January he was stationed at Camp Elliott in California with the Legal Office until his discharge.

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Pioneer Lady Dies Here Friday

Funeral services were conducted by Rev. E. D. Landreth at the First Methodist Church here at three o'clock Sunday afternoon for Mrs. Fannie Elizabeth Ballew, widow of the late Len Ballew who passed away in December of 1935.

Mrs. Ballew had been ill for a long time, the past several weeks having been a patient at Adair hospital where skill and loving care were ever present.

She was a native of Tennessee where she was born September 15, 1868. She moved to Texas settling near Pilot Point where she grew to womanhood and married Len Ballew in 1889. They moved to Donley County in 1903 and were always numbered among the most highly respected of Donley's citizens.

Her's was a most useful life, she having taken a particular interest in her work in the Methodist Church of which she had been a member since early childhood. She will be remembered for her many good deeds and social interest in the Friendship Club here through the many years.

To her were born six sons and a daughter, a son dying in infancy. Surviving are Earl and Wilson Ballew of Amarillo, Elba S. and Donald of Clarendon, Fred of Plainview. Mrs. C. F. Gilliam of Lubbock is the only daughter. Mrs. Nathan H. Erwin of Pilot Point, Texas is the sister of the deceased.

The special songs sung by Mary Roberts at the service were most touching and appropriate. These were "We Shall Sleep But Not Forever", "Does Jesus Care?" and "When They Ring the Golden Bells." The sons and son-in-law were the pallbearers.

The loving care she received during her life and especially during her long illness, and the beautiful tributes paid her memory attest the fine christian character and the esteem in which she was held by a wide circle of friends, the summons coming to her May 31, 1946.

Interment was made in Citizens Cemetery under the direction of Womack Funeral Home.

DR. KEITH LOWELL ATTENDING MEETING OF OSTEOPATHS

Dr. Keith S. Lowell is attending an Osteopathic Clinic which opened this week in Amarillo, where he is a member of the faculty of 10 doctors. The post-graduate courses offered annually by Dr. L. V. Cradit and Dr. L. J. Vick, will be taught at the Amarillo Osteopathic Hospital.

More than 500 doctors have studied with the Amarillo physicians in the 13 years the clinic has been held. The naming of the grand champion Jersey and Holstein cows and bulls Saturday morning climaxed Donley County's Annual Dairy Show and Show.

The winners were selected from approximately seventy top dairy cattle of Donley County by E. R. Eudaly, Dairy Specialist with the Universal Mills, of Ft. Worth, Texas. Ed Hawley's senior bull calf was named grand champion Holstein bull, and J. R. Gillham's junior heifer was selected as grand champion Holstein female. Gillham's aged Jersey bull, Hallmark's Royal Design, bred by Hallmark Jersey Farm of Kansas City, Mo., was named grand champion Jersey male, and Gillham's aged cow entry, Jolly Donkey Design was named grand champion Jersey female.

Ross Darby's aged Holstein cow was senior Holstein female champion and the senior champion Holstein bull was exhibited by Floyd Crofford. Gillham exhibited the Junior champion Jersey bull and Jersey female. The two Holstein junior champions were grand champion Holsteins, and the two senior Jersey champions were the grand champion Jerseys.

A feature of the show was the exhibition of outstanding young Jersey females by Ray Morris, Loyd Mays, and Junior Bulman. Their three entries were heifers they had won in Sears Swine Program in this region.

Approximately one hundred people made the annual dairy tour Friday. The group visited the dairies owned and operated by A. P. Thomason, Ed Hawley, Charlie and William Sullivan, J. A. Read, Winfield Moseley, J. R. Hall, and Les Bowling. The group gathered at the Hedley High School for lunch where they were served by members of the Clarendon and Hedley Lions Clubs and by the Borden Milk Company. The Clarendon High School Band, under the direction of J. G. Stanley, presented a short program to the group.

E. R. Eudaly and County Agent H. M. Breedlove presented timely and up to date information on feeding problems to the dairymen at a short program in the Hedley School Auditorium immediately following the lunch hour.

Hornfly Control Demonstration Saturday, June 8

A demonstration on the control of horn flies on livestock by using DDT will be held on the Joe McMurry ranch this Saturday at 2:30 p. m., June 8th. The cattle will be sprayed with a portable spray.

Previous experiments have shown that spraying with DDT several times during the summer has increased weights of cattle during the summer months as much as fifty to sixty pounds per head. The test was made on cattle under the same conditions and on the same type pasture.

County agent H. M. Breedlove is urging that all ranchers, dairymen and farmers attend this demonstration and see how easily this spray will work and how fast the cattle can be sprayed. This is certain ya coming thing for Donley County and talks on the importance of DDT and the handling of the spray will be discussed. The demonstration will start promptly at 2:30 p. m., so be on time to see the entire process.

Mr. Joe McMurry lives about 3 1/2 miles southwest of Clarendon on the JA road, on the Kent ranch.

Everyone is invited and urged to attend this demonstration.

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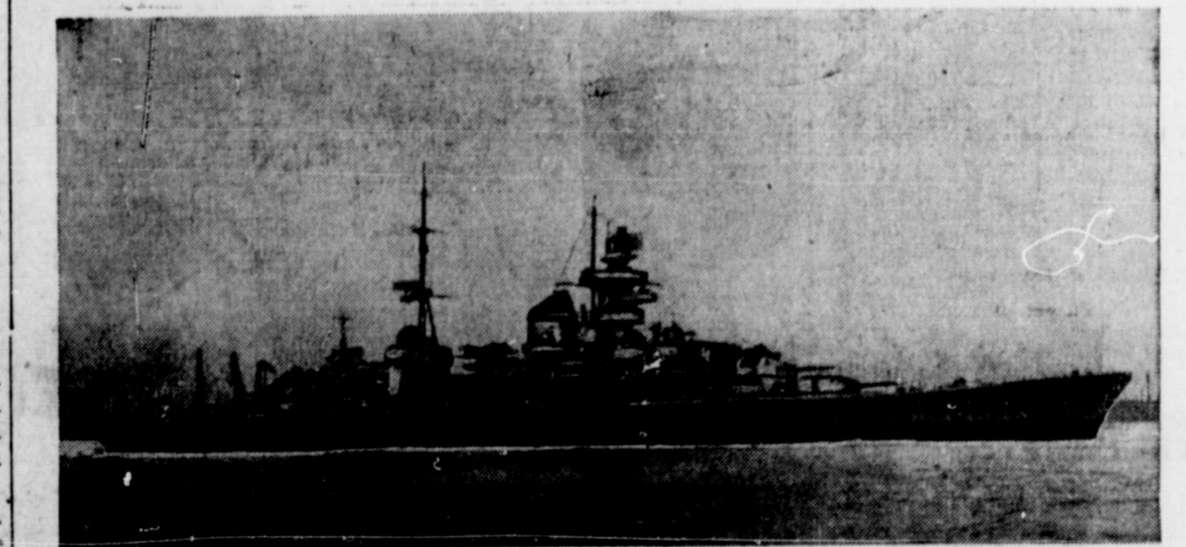

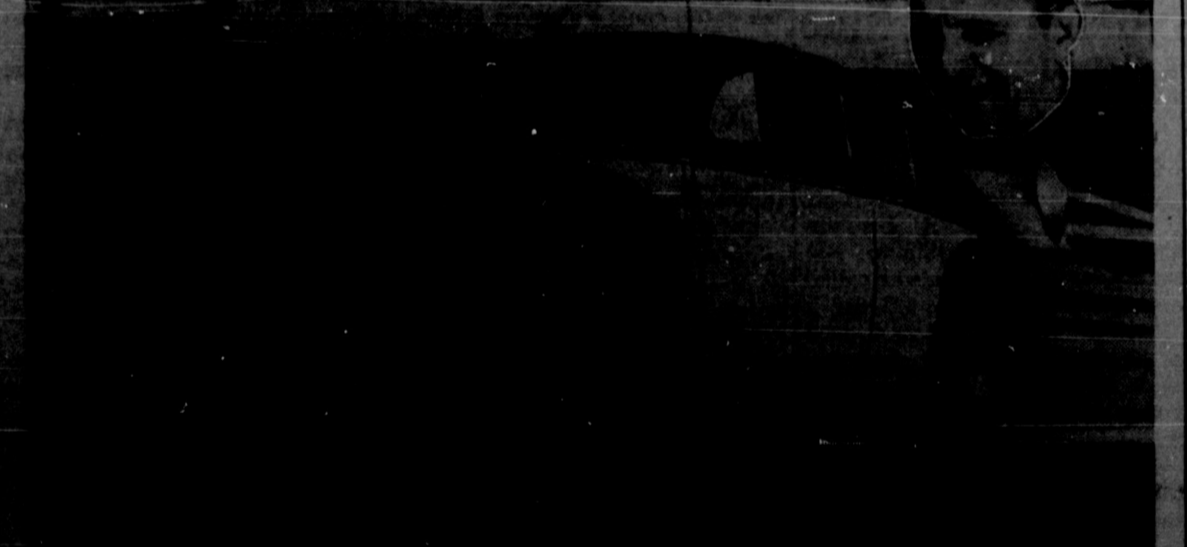

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

Early June To See Faster Train Time

Important changes in passenger train schedules, affording faster and better passenger train service over the Burlington Lines between Texas and Colorado to become effective Sunday, June 9, were announced today by D. F. Wadsworth, agent, Clarendon.

The departure times of several trains will be advanced in the speeding up of schedules and travelers are cautioned to inquire about these changes to avoid missing a train.

The West Texan, which formerly made a morning trip from Dallas and Fort Worth to Wichita Falls, will leave Dallas in the evening at 9:15 PM instead of 7:10 AM to provide a supporting service as far as Wichita Falls for the evening Gulf Coast Special from Dallas and Fort Worth to Colorado. Earlier arrivals will be made in Amarillo and Denver and at intermediate points.

An equalization of the evening departures from Dallas and Fort Worth for the Texas Panhandle and Colorado has been effected, providing a 9:15 PM schedule out of Dallas and a 9:25 PM schedule out of Fort Worth with an arrival in Amarillo for over-night Pullman passengers the following morning at 8:40 AM, 1'10" earlier than heretofore. This train will reach Denver at 10:00 PM the following evening after departure from North Texas, 1'30" earlier than the present time.

The southward Gulf Coast Special will leave Denver at 7:00 PM, the same as presently, but its arrival in Amarillo will be at 10:05 AM the following morning, 32" earlier, Fort Worth at 7:50 PM and Dallas at 9:10 PM, a full hour sooner than these cities now are reached.

The Texas Zephyr from Colorado will arrive in Fort Worth at 7:00 AM, 20" earlier, and Dallas at 8:25 AM, 10" earlier than presently. The departure of this train for Colorado will be set back 30" at Dallas, from 1:30 PM to 2:00 PM, and to 3:10 PM at Fort Worth, 25" later than its present schedule, with the same arrival in Denver at 8:15 AM.

Man Who Shot Black Jack Ketchum, Dies

Frank E. Harrington, former Burlington Lines conductor and widely-known in Dalhart, has succumbed at his home in Houston, according to word reaching friends.

He is probably best remembered for his intrepidity in challenging Black Jack Ketchum, North-eastern New Mexico train robber, back about 1909 or 1901.

Ketchum used to rob the Colorado & Southern Flyer between Folsom and Clayton, N. M. After Harrington's train fell victim two or three times, the conductor decided he or Black Jack would have to be stopped.

He loaded a shotgun with buckshot and kept it with him on all runs. Sure enough, a few nights later Harrington felt the flyer begin to slow down. He rushed to the baggage car, pulled the door open a crack and saw the outlaw standing near the locomotive directing crewmen to unhook the baggage car so it could be moved down the track away from the rest of the train.

The moon was bright and Harrington realized the moonlight would glint on his gun barrel, but nevertheless he shoved the shotgun out the crack and fired. Ketchum's right arm was nearly torn off, but the outlaw had seen the glint on the gun. A dead shot with either hand, he drew with his left hand and the lead slug smashed into the baggage car al-

most against Harrington's face. Splinters were driven into his flesh.

Ketchum was too badly hurt to get on his horse. Clayton was notified, and a posse sped northward on a flat car pulled by a big locomotive that had been ordered out of Texline. Ketchum was captured at daylight. He was not able to get far from the scene.

After being nursed back to health in a Trinidad, Colo. hospital he was taken to Clayton for trial, convicted and hanged. He still lies buried at Clayton.—Dalhart Texan.

Housewives Urged To Save Waste Fat

The Department of Agriculture is urging that all restaurants and housewives throughout the county save all fats and greases. Instead of throwing away waste grease, put it in a container and take it to your local butcher who will give you four cents per pound for this grease. The butcher in turn sells the grease to PMA, who comes to Donley County about once every three weeks to collect all fats and greases. This program is vitally important as many needed products are manufactured from fat greases.

Any person desiring additional information can contact Mr. Nolie Simmons, chairman of the Donley County war food program or county agent H. M. Breedlove. This is a worthwhile program and the fat greases are needed so why not get four cents per pound for all your waste fats and help out with the program. The United States Department of Agriculture asks the help of all individuals in the program.
