G. I. Flight Training Approved Here

J. Fred Smith, local flying instructor, announced this week that G. I. Flight Training had been approved here and that the ground school had already started.

To be approved to give the training, Mr. Smith had to have certain qualifications and has met all the government regulations. He now has four training planes which will carry the boys through a complete training program.

Any G. I. who has had 90 days active duty and an honorable discharge is eligible for the training free of charge and should contact Mr. Smith right away in order to get started with the first class. The G. I. has to be approved before he can start the training and it usually takes about two weeks for this procedure. Mr. Smith stated. Civilians can also take the course along with the G. I. by paying a small fee.

The night ground school started Monday night and meets each Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights at 8 p. m. at the College building. The student will receive credit for 30 hours work. There will be 10 hours of Meteorology, 10 hours of Navigation, 5 hours Civil Air regulations and 5 hours general maintenance.

There are two instructors who will be on the job and the actual flight training is started just as soon as the G. I. is approved.

If you are interested in flying, this is your best opportunity to learn and you will benefit by getting all the details from Mr. Smith right away. He can be contacted at the airport at most any hour of the day or at his home at night and he will be glad to explain the entire set-up.

Proposed Changes in Constitution Will Be Voted On In November

AUSTIN, August 14. — Three proposed changes in the constitution of Texas will be voted upon in November.

Due to an error in the legislature's resolution calling for a vote on one of the amendments, two separate elections will have to be held—one two days after the other.

On Nov. 5 — general election day—voters' approval will be asked for an amendment to freeze road-use taxes for road construction, maintenance and patrolling. On the same day, the voters will be asked to authorize state and county pension and retirement systems.

On Nov. 7, the vote will be taken on a proposal to set up a veterans land board to buy \$25,000,000 worth of Texas land and sell the land to Texas veterans of World War II. State bonds would be issued to provide the \$25,000,000.

The proposed freezing of road use taxes to road purposes is intended to prevent diversion of such taxes to other uses, thus permitting long range road planning and full claim for federally distributed road funds that are issued to states on a matching basis.

Road-Use Tax
The road-use taxes that would be frozen are, principally, the gasoline tax and registration fees. Under the proposed amendment the receipts could be used for acquiring road right-of-way, road construction, road maintenance and road patrolling.

The amendment would also freeze at existing status the proportion of registration fees that counties may retain from vehicle license fees and the portion of gasoline tax set aside to retire road bonds.

The existing status for county participation in registration fees is: The county retains all of the first \$50,000, above \$50,000 half is kept by the county and half paid to the state highway department

City Water Supply Still Critical

Mayor Morris is asking that everyone go ahead with the planned schedule with the residents of the East side of town watering on odd days of the month and the users on the West side on even days of the month. If sufficient rain falls soon there will be no necessity to water and the situation will adjust itself.

The purpose of the new schedule is to try to build the reserve up or at least keep everyone with a little water and at the same time let the city water wells and machinery rest some, as continual pumping is hard on the machinery and the wells also.

Mr. Morris stated that he wished to express the City's appreciation for the cooperation so far, and asks your continued cooperation until the situation is at ease again.

The airport weather station reported .19 inch Tuesday and .52 inch Wednesday. Here in town Joe Goldston's weather device recorded .30 inch Tuesday and .22 inch Wednesday. All together it brings the average to around ½ an inch, which is very welcome at this time and since it has started raining again our chances of receiving more is very promising.

A number of farmers have expressed the opinion that if we do receive more showers within the next few days that a big deep crop will still be raised despite the damage received from the blowing hot winds of the past several days. Maybe if we keep our hopes up, the entire county will receive plenty of moisture soon.

The elders will hear many of the old-time hymns that brought comfort to the mothers as they guarded the home and babies while the husband and father went out to work out a few dollars to keep the home fires burning. Mr. Waldron will be glad to see that the song service is a big item in the entertainment of the day.

Old timers like old-time music—music that has time, tune, melody and the kind of stuff that you can feel it in your bones. The old time fiddling with the other instruments will fill a long felt need on this score. You may have been deprived of "Snowbird-in-the-Ashbank" for years. You may have yearned for "Jack O' Diamonds." Many have. Then there is a long list of the good old fiddle tunes that will bring back happy memories of the old square dance days in pioneer Donley county days.

The old fiddlers will contest for real money at the finish. The prizes will be ten, seven-fifty and five dollars for the three grades of elbow expansion. Joe David of Clarendon, Will (Bill) Walling of Lelia Lake and Walter Johnson of Hedley will be in charge of the contest. These three experts will have a bunch of fiddlers on hand to render all kinds of stringed instrument music. The contest entrants will be limited to old Donley County only, it is announced.

Tate Grove northeast of Hedley is the old stomping ground. Seats, water and shade have been provided. There will be free coffee and ice water, but you will have to bring in the chuck. Tubs, buckets, baskets, cans and what have you will do. That is your affair. Pioneer folks always managed to find some way to get by.

LIBRARY NOTES

Again a few new books. To head the list is "Maverick Town—The Story of Old Tascosa" by John L. McCarty, illustrated by Harold Bugbee. The public has been looking forward to this story of the west for some time—and now it is here. Both author and illustrator are too well known to need any introduction—Mr. McCarty, assistant publisher of the Amarillo Globe and News and Harold who belongs to us and of whom we are very proud. So we are glad to have the new book on our shelves.

Mystery stories form the escape reading for a great many people, and none are more popular than those of Ellery Queen. "The Door Between" will prove up to the standard. Perhaps few people know that "Ellery Queen" is the pseudonym of two cousins who were born in Brooklyn in 1905. The announcement of a detective

story prize caused them to try writing a story and to their surprise "The Roman Hat Mystery" won, and became the hit of 1929. Since then they have written on an average of two books every year. Quite a few of these are on our shelves.

Westerns are another source of escape for a great many readers, particularly among men, and James B. Hendryx always pleases. So his "Blood of the North" is one of our new purchases.

No author of light fiction is better known than Faith Baldwin and "That Man Is Mine" promises to be as entertaining as her others.

Our friends often remember us with books. Tommie Lee Leek brought us several Spanish books recently.

It is easy to see why "This Side of Innocence" by Taylor Caldwell became a best seller. It is a story of unusual interest—of passionate, conflicting temperaments—of temptations met and sometimes conquered, sometimes not, but with a wonderful philo-

sophy of life underlying it all. The author, Taylor Caldwell, was born in England of Scottish parents—intellectual people. The family came to America in 1907 where her education was completed and where she married a gifted linguist who was in the intelligence service during the first World War. Mrs. Reback—her married name—has written much and successfully. "Dynasty of Death" and "The Eagles Gather" are the best known of her books until this—which still leads the best sellers.

A lovely horse story, "Justin Morgan Had a Horse" by Marguerite Henry, tells the story of a little pint-sized cob that nobody wanted but which grows up to run faster, trot faster, and pull heavier logs than any horse in Vermont,—and becomes the father of the famous family of Morgan horses. Nobody knew whether the parents of this little horse were British, French, or Dutch. But as Joel said, "Come to think of it, he's like us. He's American. That's what he is, American."

is an additional requirement before such county funds can be established. They must first be approved by majority vote in county elections.

The proposal to aid war veterans in obtaining land on easy terms will depend in actual operation largely upon what sort of a law is passed if the constitutional amendment to permit such action gets voters' approval in November.

Eight-Year Administration
Generally, it authorizes an eight-year administration of a \$25,000,000 fund to be supplied by a state bond issue bearing not in excess of three per cent interest.

Administration is given to a three-member board to be composed of the governor, attorney general and general land commissioner. They can decide what amount of bonds are to be marketed, up to the maximum of \$25,000,000. They will decide also what land is to be purchased to be resold to veterans.

If all of the land purchased for resale has not been claimed by veterans at the end of eight years, the remainder may be sold to any one.

It probably will be up to the attorney general to decide the

exact meaning of a provision that sales during the eight years shall be to "Texas veterans." The amendment, itself, does not indicate whether the term means persons who were Texans when they entered military service or if it means persons who were in military service by entry from other states, but residents of Texas when the proposed amendment becomes effective. The effective date of the amendment is specified to be the day the governor issues a proclamation declaring that it has received a majority vote.

Veterans' payments on their land purchases will go to meet interest charges on the bonds first.

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

Shortly before midnight of the following day, we left for Johnston Island, 743 miles distant, and just a pinpoint in the ocean. The actual area of the Pacific Ocean is tremendous. As Admiral Chester Nimitz remarked recently, "If there's any place in the world really bigger than Texas, it must be the Pacific," and it's more than amazing that a navigator can lead you to such a tiny pinpoint of coral and soil in such a vast expanse of water. Each man aboard of course was equipped with a life preserver and a parachute. In addition, in case of a forced landing in the water, we had a rubber life raft and had been briefed as to just what to do in case. Needless to say, none of us had any burning desire to be compelled to use these devices as Captain Eddie Rickenbacker and a number of others had to use them.

After an hour or so at Johnson, we left about 5 A.M. for Kwajalein but in the meantime had picked up a full day because we had crossed the International Date Line. From Johnston to Kwajalein was something over 1600 miles or about an eight hour

trip. As you recall, Kwajalein Island was being used as the main base for the Bikini Atomic Bomb operations. The Bikini lagoon is approximately 230 miles from Kwajalein and in approaching Kwajalein we radioed ahead for permission to fly over the target ships.

You have read enough descriptions of Bikini to justify my not describing it here but the ships themselves impress us as ghost ships. They were dispersed generally throughout the lagoon and deserted of all people except a few that were doing some last minute checking. This was on June 30 and the next day was July 1 or "Able Day" which was the scheduled date for the test to determine the effect of an atomic bomb in naval warfare as distinguished from land warfare. We circled the lagoon several times and then flew in at about 200 feet to get a closer view and then on into Kwajalein. There are lots of rain squalls in that area during the monsoon-typhoon season and we hit one when we came in. We were ordered to circle for about three-quarters of an hour because the landing field was being drenched with rain. After we landed, we learned the atomic bomb was already there and about 75 yards from where we landed, which was the reason for the precaution. The authorities were taking no chances that a skidding plane might skid the wrong way and naturally we were all in accord with the precaution. None of us had any idea of interfering with the regular scheduled operation because we understand these bombs are rather limited at the present time.

The question on everyone's lips was "What kind of weather will we have tomorrow?" While it was cloudy and rainy that night, the weather experts predicted

the target would be clear for July 1. The bomb was scheduled to be dropped at 8:30 the next morning and we were aroused at 3:30, although takeoff time wasn't scheduled until about 7:30.

After a hasty breakfast and steaming black coffee, we were at the landing strip and watched the B-29 ships engaged in the operation take off. "Dave's Dream," was the ship carrying the atomic bomb, was the last to take off and we followed it by about 1 minute in another airplane. I might add that as a further precautionary measure the officials had evacuated all military and naval personnel to the adjacent islands just in case of a accident. A special ramp had been built for installation of the bomb and most of the activity across the landing strip was hidden by an Army tent and no personnel except those actually engaged in the operation were permitted to go near, which gives an idea just how closely the atomic bomb secrets are being kept.

Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veteran's Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance by said Board of not to exceed Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as shall be prescribed by law, provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3 per cent) per annum."

after stated, situated in this State (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the State Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation.
"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veteran's Land Fund.
"The lands of the Veteran's Land Fund shall be sold by the State of Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and such rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by law; provided, however, that any such lands remaining unsold at the expiration of eight (8) years after the effective date of this Amendment may be sold to anyone as shall be prescribed by law.
"All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for re-purchase of land as provided herein by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments shall be credited to the Veteran's Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, in like manner as shall be provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period of eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on the bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment, all moneys received by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest of deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Thursday in November, 1946, a which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:
"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

Highway Hazards Hamper Health

AUSTIN, August 14—Approximately one out of every three cars on Texas' streets and highways is being operated with dangerous mechanical defects which are placing thousands of lives in jeopardy, it was announced today by the Texas Safety Association.

This condition was revealed by the Police Traffic Safety Check conducted from May 15 to June 30 under the direction of the International Association of Chiefs of Police. More than 38 thousand vehicles were examined by police in Texas. Of these, 37.2 per cent, more than one-third, had obvious and hazardous defects.

Faulty lights, both front and rear, accounted for approximately one-third of the total defects reported by type, and inadequate windshield wipers were the next commonest type.

A total of 38,565 vehicle checks, primarily of vehicles involved in traffic violations or accidents, were made. Of this number, 14,378 had one or more defects. The total number of defects reported by type was 29,249—almost one dangerous defect for every car examined.
