## Junior Class To Present 3-Act Play, "Shrubbery Hill" Thurs. & Fri. Nites

The three act comedy, "Shrubbery Hill," to be presented by the High School Juniors, under the direction of Miss Wilma D. Smith, Thursday and Friday nights, opens in a mid-morning in December as the Pendletons are about to evacuate their ancestral home, Shrubbery Hill, where they have lived for more than 200 years.

Mrs. Emily Pendleton, the owner of the southern plantation, is a widow of fifty. She is a typical lady of old Virginia, proud beyond all measure and reason but has little practical sense. This aristocratic character of the old South is played by Dorothy Tankersley.

Randy Pendleton is devoted to his mother and loyal to the traditions of the South, but at the same time, he looks to the future rather than the past. He loves automobiles and delights in working on them. Gene Bryan plays the part of Randy.

Cynthia Pendleton, the attractive young daughter, too, is loyal to the old Order, but she likes to be liked, and finds admiration pleasant even when it comes from a young man born north of the Mason and Dixon line. Joveta Maxey plays Cynthia in an admirable way.

The collateral cousin is also represented in the person of Larrabee Randolph, played by Bob Clifford. He is seventy years of age and deaf as a post, but he is able to get about alone with the aid of his cane and an occasional hot toddy.

The Pendleton servants—Mammy, Joshua, and Lilly Belle, played respectively by Mae Morris, Tommy Gattis and Patsy Blair—furnish plenty of laughter and merriment throughout the performance. Mammy is the one person in the family who has never conceded the victory of the Union. At times her mind is a trifle unhinged and on one topic—the mystery of the jewels—her memory seems to fail her completely. Joshua has lived his entire life at Shrubbery Hill and almost equals Mammy in his loyalty. He has one failing—that of being shy of hard work. Joshua's sister, Lilly Belle, is a quiet, retiring Negro girl. Her main duties are collecting eggs at the end of the day and helping Mrs. Pendleton dress.

Mr. Henry Smith, a rich New Yorker, who is buying Shrubbery Hill as a country home for his family, is played by Jerry LaGrone.

Mrs. Smith, played by Ladelle Cox, has an amateur love of antiques. Shrubbery Hill to her is an exquisite piece of craftsmanship. To the Pendletons, however, it is home.

Edward Smith, a pleasant looking chap of twenty-one, is well educated and, like his mother, has a love of beauty. Joe Wayne Dill plays Edward.

Joan Smith, played by Jeanine Waldrop, is somewhat critical of the sentimentality of the Virginians, but when she takes a favor to a Virginian boy, she doesn't beat around the bush.

Charles Wiggin, another New Yorker, played by Vernon Goldston, represents the city "slick" out to capitalize on those he considers "hicks."

An air of mystery centering around an emerald necklace, lost for years, runs throughout the play. Intertwined with this theme is one of romance and loyalty to southern traditions.

Speech pupils of Mrs. Curtis Mears and Rev. and Mrs. Bolton will furnish special numbers between acts. A full evening of fun awaits you. Don't miss it.

This coming year should be one of the best since the war and three shows are held in the county each year. The Donley county fat stock show is held each February; the Dairy show and tour each May, and the Fall Fair and horse show in September.

## To Hold Pruning Demonstrations

February the Second will be the day in Donley county when farmers and club boys will have the chance to learn all about pruning an orchard and orchard management.

H. M. Breedlove, local county agent, stated this morning that Mr. Roseborough, Extension Horticulturist for the A&M College of Texas will be in Donley county to conduct the demonstrations.

One demonstration will be held in the afternoon on the day mentioned on the Ollie Hommel farm south of Alanreed. The other demonstration will be held in the Hedley community and the place will be announced at a later date in your Leader.

Breedlove says that farmers in Donley county have shown much interest in orchard improvement and management in the last few years and also have planted new orchards over the county. It is necessary that orchards be pruned each year in order to have a good orchard. Disease control in orchards will also be discussed.

During the demonstrations those attending will have the opportunity to actually see the pruning of trees and that is the reason for holding the demonstrations on farms with large orchards.

Further details will be announced later but remember that February the Second will be "Orchard Management Day" in Donley County.

## Local Youths To Compete In Calf Scrambles

Lloyd Mays, Vernon Goldston, and Bob Clifford, local F.F.A. members, have been selected to compete in the Calf Scrambles of the 1948 Houston Fat Stock Show and Livestock Exposition, which opens January 31st and continues through February 15th.

These Future Farmers of America were selected by their local Agricultural teacher, the Area Supervisor, and finally passed by Lloyd V. Holbrooks, Associate Professor of the State Department of Agricultural Education, as being eligible to participate in the Scramble.

Some 322 farm boys from all over the state of Texas will gather at the sixteenth annual stock show to compete for 161 fine beef calves which will be given to the boys who catch them.

The 161 winners will manage and feed their animals during the next year and then bring them back to compete in the Fat Steer Contest of the 1949 Houston Fat Stock Show.

In addition to the calves they catch, the boys have an opportunity to win a share of the many prizes which are offered them each year, including a scholarship, cash prizes and free vacation trips.

The Calf Scrambles at the Houston show probably have done more toward encouraging scientific breeding and care of livestock than any major agricultural factor in the state.

The 1948 show at Houston, the longest and grandest in its history, will be produced at a cost of over \$375,000.

## Oil Well Drilling Going Slower, Now 3,600 Feet

According to the latest report Wednesday afternoon the Honolulu Oil Corp. No. 1 Ozier well is drilling at 3,620 feet and drilling was getting slower as the well progressed toward a greater depth.

The type of formation encountered during the past few hundred feet was not revealed due to certain protective reasons of the concern drilling the well, although it was stated by an informed source that this was not considered a "tight" well and the information would be released within a reasonable period of time.

A number of people visiting the drilling sight within the past week have acquired the impression that there had been a good showing or that something was about to happen out there since the public has been excluded from the drilling rig and encouraged to not use the road to the well. Signs have been placed at the gate and at the well to this effect. The new order was explained by a company employee as following: "The measures taken have been more as a precautionary measure than anything else." It is always dangerous around that much machinery and the public was getting too lax in their precautions, he stated. "We had to enforce the rule of keeping them away from the drilling rig to keep someone from getting hurt," he added.

"We have been more than happy to have visitors come out to the well sight as we know they are really interested if they take the trouble to drive out, but due to the above mentioned, we had rather they stay away from the rig than take a chance on getting seriously hurt," the official said.

As far as information regarding the well is concerned, we will give it to the public in a due course of time as our samples have to go to the company laboratory for final analysis much of the time before any authentic information can be released, he stated.

## Official Opening of New Gymnasium Slated For Next Tuesday Night

### QUAIL SEASON ENDS FRIDAY, JAN. 16

A goodly number of hunters are expected to drag out their shot guns tomorrow for the last chance at quail hunting for the current season as the season closes at that time.

According to the majority of hunters who have hunted the top sport bird for a number of successive years, the hunting this year has been the hardest yet with plenty of walking and fewer birds in the bag. Apparently the heavy rains received over most of the county last summer cut the crop down considerably everywhere and in some places only a trace of birds have been reported.

Anyway, although there are very few birds to be found, there will be quite a few hunters out for the much needed exercise and the thought of at least making a valiant try on the last day.

### 1948 Cotton Crop Insurance Program Announced

Cotton producers in Donley county will again have the opportunity of crop insurance protection in 1948. This county has been selected as one of 56 counties over the nation in which the cotton crop insurance program will operate. The county Agriculture conservation committee has been furnished the necessary applications and are launching a county-wide sales campaign to inform all cotton farmers of the provisions of the program and give them an opportunity to insure their cotton crop for 1948.

Crop Insurance is a farmers program—with each insured producer paying a small amount for protection against unavoidable production risks in order that none of them may suffer a complete loss. Since the cost of administering the program is paid from funds appropriated by Congress, the premiums charged farmers for crop insurance protection are used only to pay losses. These premiums represent the risk of loss of producing a cotton crop in the county.

No one knows better than farmers how uncertain is the production of a cotton crop. Although he may prepare his land in the best possible manner, plant the best seed, and give his crop the best of care, he still realizes that drought, winds, hail and other causes over which he has no control can quickly rob him of the results of his years work and his investment. Crop Insurance protects farmers against such losses and guarantees a fair return for his efforts.

The closing date for filing applications for cotton crop insurance for 1948 is January 31. Farmers are urged to contact a committeeman, an authorized crop insurance salesman or the county A.A.A. office to learn the details of the program and file the necessary application before the last day of January.

## Local Tax Office Looking Toward Poll Tax Rush

The personnel in the tax office located in the southwest corner of the court house are beginning to feel just a bit slighted at the present time in regard to issuing poll tax receipts, but have their fingers crossed in hopes that the mad rush will be stretched out over a couple of weeks instead of a couple of days.

Up through Wednesday, 1,052 poll tax receipts had been issued to potential voters in Donley county. This number is approximately 750 short of the usual number on a general election year.

One tax official made the remark that a number of people probably think they have already paid their poll tax along with their regular taxes as that was the usual procedure in past years, but now you have to ask to pay your poll tax as it is handled separately and is not compulsory. If you want to vote this year, you will have to have that little receipt, so have mercy on the tax officials by going by and paying up before the last two or three days and having to stand in line. It will be easier on you and them both. Just as sure as you fail to pay your poll tax, there will be some friend enter one of the races and you won't be able to help the candidate one bit. Pay your poll tax.
