Boys Ranch Sponsor Speaks To Lions Club

Members and guests of the Lions Club Tuesday were given a treat in a talk by that affable gentleman, Cal Farley, of Amarillo and chief sponsor in establishing and maintaining Boys Ranch up on the Canadian at Old Tascosa.

Mr. Farley, a professional baseball player as well as wrestler many years ago, was one of the reporters selected by a national news gathering organization to report the recent world series of baseball. The speaker gave the highlights on the ball contest which was most interesting in that he gave the off record information that is lacking in a newspaper report.

The principal subject of the speaker and nearest his heart, was that of Boys Ranch. He explained the merit system in vogue in the home for the boys, there being ninety-one enrolled at present.

A School meeting all state requirements is the one important subject, but so is character building. In this matter Mr. Farley went deeply into the subject and stated that out of some four hundred boys who have been enrolled, only nine had refused to make the grade to good citizenship.

Beginning with a mere few dollars in equipment donated by Cal Farley and Dutch Mantell years ago, other donors have joined in the wonderful work and today the plant at Tascosa and near Muleshoe, is valued at more than a half million dollars. Mr. Farley is rightfully given the credit for the most of the effort that has meant success to this institution of nation-wide reputation.

Saturday Is Poppy Day

On Saturday, Nov. 8, all of us will be asked to wear a little red poppy on our coats or dresses. In this way, we of America pay tribute to those who gave their lives in the service of America during both World Wars. As we receive our poppy from the women of the American Legion Auxiliary, who will distribute the flowers on the streets, we will be aiding the war's living victims by the contribution we make for the flower.

The poppy comes to us from the fields of France and Belgium where the war obliterated all touches of beauty except its brave, red blooms. There it was nature's tribute to the heroic dead, and here, in America, it is the tribute of patriots to those who made patriotism's highest sacrifice.

The poppies which we will wear have been made in hospitals and workrooms where the war's suffering is still going on. The disabled veteran who makes the poppies derives double benefit from the work. First, it gives him employment—his only chance to help support himself and family. Second, the work is of real value in aiding his recovery, occupying hands and mind, breaking the tedium of long idleness, and restoring spirits crushed by hopelessness.

The money dropped into the coin boxes in exchange for the poppies goes entirely to the welfare activities of the American Legion and Auxiliary, supporting the work which these service organizations do for the disabled veterans, the families of the disabled and the families left in need by the death of veterans.

TIME TO TREAT TREES FOR BORERS SAYS COUNTY AGENT

Now is the time to treat trees for borers and county agent H. M. Breech recommends the use of ethylene dichloride emulsion. The emulsion is applied on

the ground around the tree. It takes about a half pint per tree for trees over two years of age. After application of the ethylene dichloride emulsion, several shovels of dirt are used to cover the emulsion around the tree to keep the fumigant from evaporating. The ethylene dichloride can be

bought at the local drug stores. This treatment has been found by the experiment stations to be one of the most efficient in control of borers in fruit trees.
