## Bronchos Grab Two Victories

The Bronchos notched two victories last week against previously unbeaten White Deer and Groom as Clarendon improved their record to 9-2.

They meet Lockney Thursday at 8 p.m. in Longhorn country before next week's Canyon Rotary Tournament on Dec. 27-29.

Clarendon meets Dumas at 2 p.m. and Canyon at 4 p.m. Wednesday at Canyon High School in the tournament's opening round.

Clarendon buried White Deer in the first quarter, outscoring the hometown Bucks, 24-9, Dec. 12. Kareem Abdullah busted a three-pointer and a bucket, Roy Williams scored three baskets, and Chris Brown scored two buckets to open the game.

"We rattled them early and the intensity was really good on defense," head coach Jimmy Avery said. "It was 19-1 halfway through the first quarter. Everything happened right the first quarter."

White Deer cut into the Broncho lead in the second quarter but still trailed 35-24 at halftime.

"We put our second bunch in, and they (White Deer) kind of caught up. We lost a little intensity and got a little sloppy. I'm not interested in beating people 40 points. I want to get the whole team ready for district play."

Brown, Williams and Moore scored a combined 13 points as the Bronchos led 52-42 at the end of the third quarter.

The Bucks outscored Clarendon in the final period 17-16, but it wasn't enough.

Scoring for the Bronchos were Williams, 14; Moore, 14; Clemmie Smith, 10; Brown, 9; Abdullah, 8; Drew Jeffers, 8; and Ebony Butler, 5.

Roy Williams went on an 8-point scoring burst in the first quarter of the Bronchos Friday match-up with Groom, giving the Bronchos a 12-5 first quarter lead.

The Broncho defense held Groom to 6 points in the second quar-

ter and scored 16 for a 28-11 halftime lead.

Assistant Coach Joe Sexton filled in for head coach Avery, who was called out of town on a last-minute emergency.

In reviewing the game's videotape, Avery said he was pleased with the job Sexton did and the way the players responded in his absence.

"I was really pleased how the kids carried on," Avery said. "They did everything like I wanted them to do - even down to their warm-up routine - and I really appreciate that."

They were real patient on offense. They made a lot of passes before they shot the ball."

Clarendon continued to roll in the third quarter, rattling off 18 points to Groom's 19. The Bronchos scored 16 in the fourth quarter - 6 from Moore - as Groom continued to attempt a comeback with a 20-point effort, but it was too late for the Tigers.

"We played a lot of people and we lost some of our intensity, fluidity," Avery said. "We're just trying to give people experience."

Scoring for the Bronchos were Moore, 14; Williams, 12; Brown, 9; Jeffers, 6; Butler, 6; Smith, 6; Abdullah, 5; Dean Stanzione, 2; and Mark Barefield, 2.

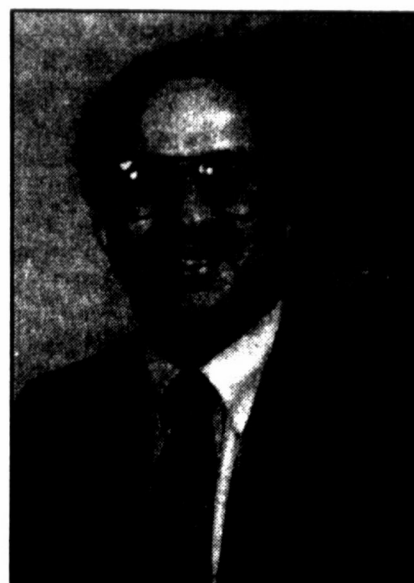

## Regents Award Extended Contract To College President Scott Elliott

Six months into his tenure as Clarendon College's new president, Dr. Scott Elliott has been awarded a new contract by the college's Board of Regents.

Regents unanimously approved a four-year rollover contract for Elliott at last Thursday's monthly board meeting, according to Bright Newhouse, Board Chairman.

"We are very proud of the job Dr. Elliott has done," Newhouse said. "The board is convinced Dr. Elliott is the right man to lead Clarendon College into the next century. We're 100 percent behind him. This new contract is a demonstration of the confidence we have in him and in his vision for the college."

Elliott, who came to Clarendon after an eight-year stint as a vice president at Central Florida Community College, was originally awarded a two-year contract by the board. He began his tenure at Clarendon on July 1, 1995.

Newhouse said Elliott "hit the ground running in July" and has moved quickly to define a new direction for the college.

That new direction has included the implementation of a contemporary institutional effectiveness pro-

gram; the formulation of a master plan for renovation and new construction; and the resolution of some major issues that had long-range implications for the college, Newhouse noted.

"The Board is also pleased that Dr. Elliott has taken a leadership role in rejuvenating our fine arts program," Newhouse said. "Making our fine arts program stronger is something both Dr. Elliott and the Board know is important to the community."

"Also, Dr. Elliott has targeted improving our college library as a major goal, which is something we must do to better serve our students and meet the expectations of our accrediting agency."

Elliott said he is "very appreciative" of the board's support.

"Clarendon College, like all colleges, faces some crucial challenges in the months and years ahead, not the least of which is the continued decline of state financial support. That lack of state support in tandem with a declining population base in our eight-county service area will not benefit growth. Yet, growth must be one of our most fundamental goals."

Successfully addressing such challenges, Elliott said, will not be the

product of any individual, rather of the Board of Regents, the president, and the college's faculty and staff working together as a unit.

"I am privileged to work for a strong Board of Regents," Elliott said. "They are all dedicated men and women who love the college and the community. They have been very supportive, and I hope that I can be worthy of the trust they've placed in me."

## CC Plans For Homecoming Celebration

Clarendon College has planned a gala homecoming celebration the week of Jan. 22-25, according to Michelle Schmidt, Activities Director.

The Bulldog women's and men's basketball teams will host Southern Nazarene for a doubleheader beginning at 6 p.m. on Jan. 25 to top off the week's activities.

The week will kick off with a community talent show Monday, Jan. 22, at 7 p.m. in the Harned Sisters Auditorium. Schmidt will be working with the college's fine arts staff, headed by Jim Stewart, to coordinate the show.

## Thornberry To Run For Second Term

Mac Thornberry announced last week that he has filed for reelection as the U.S. Representative in the 13th Congressional District of Texas.

"With the budget negotiations underway, this obviously is not a good time to be talking about political campaigns and next year's election," Thornberry said, "but with the January 2 filing deadline approaching, I wanted to let people know that I do plan to run for reelection and will be laying out my thoughts on a second term in the next few months."

The freshman congressman expressed satisfaction with the job that the Republican majority in Congress has done so far, but he added that there is still much that needs to be done.

Thornberry said that he intends to travel around the district to talk with his constituents after the holidays and after a seven-year budget plan is passed.

Thornberry is a rancher and attorney who was born and raised in Clarendon. He and his wife Sally have been married since 1986 and have two children - Will, age 6, and Mary Kemp, age 4.

## GTE Plans To Digitally Upgrade Local Office

SAN ANGELO — GTE announced Friday plans to provide digital telephone service to all of its Texas customers by the end of 1997. Clarendon's office will be updated in 1996.

According to a press release, this is an accelerated update plan, and GTE claims they will average one office replacement per week in 1996. The upgrades will cost more than \$37 million.

GTE says they already serve 95 percent of its Texas customers with

the modern digital technology. The newer technology provides added service capabilities, such as the basic call waiting, call transfer, and call forwarding, as well as the more advanced services, such as call return, busy number redial, call block, and VIP alert.

"To provide the on-ramp to the information superhighway for this large number of customers through office replacements is high priority at

Guest Editorial:

### "A Perspective From Afar"

Yesterday morning, I had the opportunity to attend a joint session of Congress to hear a speech by the Prime Minister of Israel, Shimon Peres.

It was only the second or third such session I have attended since taking office in January, and I must confess that I left stacks of mail on my desk and went, in part, because I was afraid few other Members would be back in town in time to hear him speak.

This was the Prime Minister's first visit to the United States since the assassination of his predecessor, Yitzhak Rabin, in November. As you might imagine, it was a very moving occasion. Peres spoke of his work with Rabin over their many years together and the ultimate price his slain friend and colleague paid in the effort to bring peace to the Middle East.

Perhaps the most moving moment came when Peres noted that while he has held virtually all of the titles and all of the offices his country could offer, the only one he now truly cared about was peacemaker. He also called upon all of the countries in the Middle East to declare an end to war and violence, "thereby carrying the message to our forefathers and to our grandchildren, that we are again, all of us, the sons and daughters of Abraham, living in a tent of peace."

As much as what he said, however, I was struck by how he said it. The Prime Minister spoke slowly, thoughtfully, and in measured tones. It was the way statesmen talk - a way that goes beyond momentary political advantage, to the next generation. As I listened to him, I couldn't help but wish that some in our country would follow his example in the way they talk and in the way they approach certain issues.

We are now engaged in two great debates of the year - the budget and Bosnia. The one will define the role of the federal government in our society. The other could define the role of the United States in the world. On these and so many other issues, if Members of Congress, the Administration, and the media, and even those who write letters to the newspaper, were more careful in what they say and less personal in their attacks, wouldn't the debate be more constructive and the nation better off?

President Clinton made a similar appeal earlier this year. Within days, however, members of his own cabinet were out tossing rhetorical hand grenades. Obviously, this problem is not limited to one side of the aisle. Both parties engage in political grandstanding, and both parties share part of the blame. Indeed, it sometimes seems that a desire for rising poll numbers overcomes all other considerations. We all have strongly held beliefs, and, at times, we all try to score points with others in the hope we can convince them we are right. But there should also be a measure of respect in what we say and a realization that our words do have consequences beyond the next election.

My first year in Congress has been a true adventure. I believe we have made a good start in a number of areas, but that much more needs to be done. With the holiday season approaching, this probably is as good a time as any to recommit ourselves to the many challenges that lie ahead, while resolving to be passionate in our beliefs and respectful of those with whom we may disagree. After all, as Shimon Peres said, we all live under the same tent.

When one thinks of the troubles which have plagued the Middle East for centuries, the tragedy of Prime Minister Rabin's death, and yet the calm, measured confidence and resolve to carry on and do the right thing, I can't help but think there's a lesson to be learned there, as well.

this time under the legislation passed this year to make Texas a leader in telecommunications infrastructure," said Kathy Harless, Regional President for GTE.

As a part of the regulatory reform, GTE committed to accelerate the company's original plan for digital modernization in four years. That plan has now been accelerated into a three-year plan.

The accelerated schedule moves 23 locations from the 1997 schedule and 22 locations from the 1998 schedule into 1996, and 23 offices from the original 1999 schedule into 1997.

To benefit 32,000 customers in 44 locations, a compromise was reached between GTE and the Public Utility Commission of Texas to delay elimination of party-line service for 780 customers at a cost of almost \$11 million, allowing the company to accelerate the placement of the new switching equipment.

GTE will place digital switching equipment in 61 locations during 1996 and complete the program with the remaining 23 communities in 1997.

Yet, for all their noble efforts, success remains a nebulous concept. Perhaps that's because, in the end, success can only be defined by the individual. And the individual is the only one who really knows his or her own heart.

In everyone's existence, certain moments symbolize achievement. In my humble case, earning three college degrees might be deemed significant. Is that success?

Well, maybe. Except that the amount of calligraphy adorning a person's office wall undoubtedly has greater correlation with one's eligibility to lead, rather than with one's ability to do so. Some of the highest achievers I've known have had little formal education while I've encountered an impressive number of doctorates who couldn't find their rumps with both hands.

I'm prejudiced, to be sure, but Stacie was an All-American kid - class president, honor student, Miss Citrus County (Fla.), volleyball team captain, district tennis champion, homecoming queen, etc. Many good things came her way.

But that wasn't really success, either. Success, for me, was when Stacie walked in my office one mid-December afternoon, batted those beautiful brown eyes, and asked, "Dad, could you help me with a project I'm organizing at school?"

Of course, my first reaction was typical. "Okay, kid, what are you up to now?" I queried, fully expecting to be wrapped around her proverbial little finger for the umpteenth time.

"I want to organize a fundraising drive so that a little boy from a poor family can have a special Christmas," she answered, as I began to slide under my desk, red-faced.

Stacie went on to explain that she had come to know

of a needy youngster named Michael at a local elementary school. She told me the little boy was a product of a single-parent home and that he dressed every day like an urchin, in the same raggedy old clothes and coke-bottle glasses with one broken, scotch-taped stem.

She told me how she had bought Michael a McDonald's Happy Meal one day and that the kid "flipped out," as she put it. The little boy, who also lacked basic hygiene opportunities because of his family's financial condition, had confided to Stacie that he had no Christmas tree and that his mother had cautioned him that "Santa Claus might not be able to come this year."

"So, why are you telling me all this, Stacie?" I asked.

"Well, Dad, you always said if I ever needed your help to just ask," she countered. "So, I'd like to ask two things of you. First, would you be the first one to donate something for Michael? Second, would you help me get your college students behind this project, too?"

Bordering on getting a little teary-eyed, I whipped out my billfold and forked over ten bucks, then asked Stacie about her game plan. She told me she planned to mobilize her classmates to raise additional funds for Michael, then go Christmas shopping for him with the funds. I promised that I would try to get the word out among college students on my campus and provide a dropbox for donations in the lobby.

As it turned out, Stacie raised over \$200 with high school and college students coughing up a dollar here and 50 cents there. She was also successful in securing other in-kind donations of toys and clothes. The following week, Stacie and some of her friends went out and bought Michael's family a Christmas tree. Later on, they went shopping and presented Michael's mother with the gifts so that she could place them around the tree.

Needless to say, little Michael had a big Christmas. Probably the biggest and brightest of his life.

So, what is success?

I'm still not certain I can define it. But I know how it feels. Four Christmases ago, I felt like a giant success. My daughter, even more beautiful on the inside than the outside, made me feel that way.

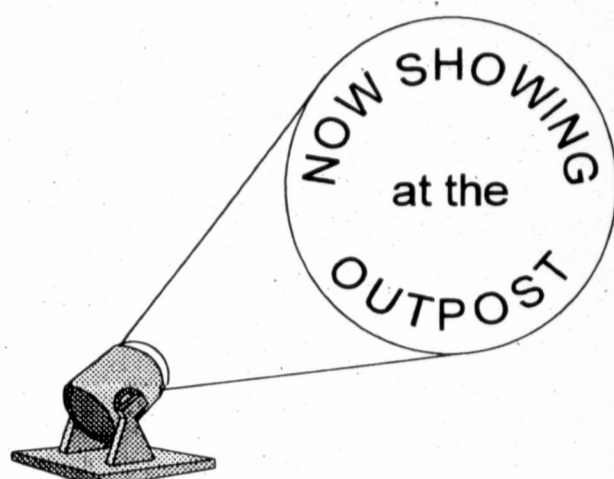

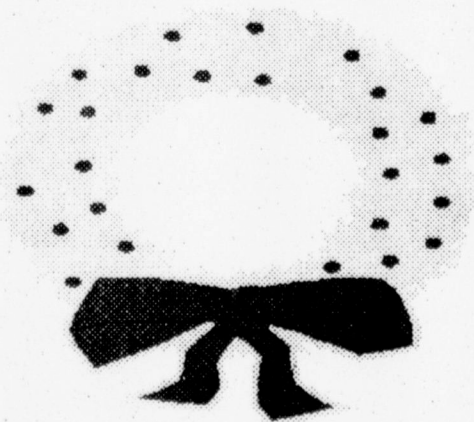

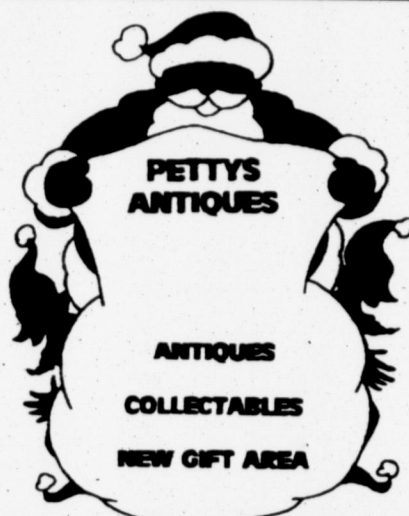

## Southwest Outdoors

By Mel Phillips

### "Power Plant Lakes"

Bass anglers looking for a new, hot fishing lake on a cold winter's day should consider a visit to a lake that is heated by the hot water discharge from an electric power plant.

LAKE GRAHAM is located northwest of Lake Possum Kingdom. Schools of black bass and sandbass congregate at the hot water discharge. This area is well marked by buoys and rising steam clouds. Best baits for long distance casting are Rat-L-Traps, Little Georges, and Hopkins jiggling spoons.

Expert bass anglers like Joe Mike Carter of Canyon prefer a Texas rigged worm or small white grub to duplicate the minnows that gather in the warmer waters.

LAKE OAK CREEK, located fifty miles southwest of Abilene, is another popular winter destination. the hot water discharge area is readily apparent and is a favorite gathering ground for anglers who want to catch crappie, sandbass, and largemouth bass. thanks to an abundance of redfin minnows, many successful anglers use a Marks-a-Lot to add a red slash on chrome Rat-L-Traps, Gay Blades, and jiggling spoons.

Expert anglers like Jerry Graves of Claude suggest using the old style six-inch worms in black with red tails or purple with red tails at Lake Oak Creek.

LAKE COLORADO CITY, locate seventy miles west of Abilene, is third on our tour of hot water lakes, but first in the hearts of anglers who prefer to catch only black bass. The discharge area is well marked and a buoy line defines the legal boating area.

Rusty Black of Lubbock has won several tournaments at Lake Colorado City by using a slow "yoyo" retrieve with a tequila Rat-L-Trap. Make a medium long cast, and when the lure hits the bottom, lift it with an upward jerk of the rod. Then permit the lure to slowly settle back to the bottom. Repeat this yoyo action all the way back to the boat. Occasional hang-ups are unavoidable, but this unique lure presentation can result in daily limits of three and four pound bass.

Reports from Lake Stamford, Lake White River, Lake MacKenzie, and Lake Greenbelt indicate that the fishing is very slow. Given the low water conditions at the West Texas lakes, anglers need to practice catch-and-release or risk destroying the brood stock of black bass that will be instrumental in a natural re-stocking when our rains finally come.

Good luck and good fishing. Merry Christmas, everybody.
