"If enemies of our farm cooperatives can raise \$500,000 to fight us," said Mr. Crofford, "we can surely raise \$50,000 in our defense. It's time for us farmers to find out who is farming us."

Mr. Crofford's comments were made in reference to recent Congressional investigations of farm cooperatives brought about by big business pressure groups.

This is the first county-wide Farmers Union meeting and will be the first step toward a countywide organization. Everybody is welcome.

Treatments

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9 - For the first time, war veterans will be afforded out-patient treatment by osteopathic physicians WANTED - To do washing and under an order issued Monday by ironing, also I do quilting. Mrs. Dr. Paul B. Magnuson, chief medical director of the Veterans Administration.

Although osteopathic treatments have been available for sometime in Veterans Administration hospitals, there has been no previous authorization for direct treatments for veterans with service-connected disabilities at or near homes.

In announcing the new authorization, Dr. Magnuson said:

"Within the limits of practice of the healing art imposed by their respective states licenses, osteopathic physicians, when their services are requested by veterans, may be designated to provide out-patient treatment, on a fee basis, for service-connected ing, Machine Button Holes, and and regulations as govern such also all types of sewing. Under Texas law, osteopathic (2-p) physicians are licensed just as doctors of medicine.



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

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
