The obvious fact is that the UAW-CIO has gone beyond its rights under the law-and is reaching not for information but for new power-not for a look at past figures, but for the power to sit in on forecasting and planning the future.

'A "look at the books" is a clever catch phrase intended as an opening wedge whereby Unions hope to pry their way into the whole field of management.

It leads surely to the day when Union bosses, under threat of strike, will demand the right to tell what we can make, when we can make it, where we can make it, and how much we must charge you-all with an eye on what labor can take out of the business, rather than on the value that goes into the product.

# This Threatens All Business

If the Union can do this in the case of General Motors, it can do it to every business in this land of ours.

Is this just imagination? Union spokesmen have said, "The Union has stated time after time that this issue is bigger than just an ordinary wage argument, that it is bigger than the Corporation and bigger than the Union."

For Labor Unions to use the monopolistic power of their vast memsership to extend the scope of wage negotiations to include more then wages, hours and working conditions is the first step toward sending the management of business over to the Union bosses.



# A Satisfactory Feed For Fattening Cattle

LUBBOCK-Irish potato silage, composed of 80 per cent Irish is proving a satisfactory feed for fattening cattle in comparison with sumac sorghum silage and cotton seed hulls, according to W. L. Stangel, dean of the Division of Agriculture at Texas Technological College.

Thirty steer calves were purchased in November, 1944, and Mr. and Mrs. Elba Ballew and carried as stockers until placed in feed lots Sept. 27, 1945. On May 1, 1945 the steer calves. then yearlings, were given access to native grass pasture without a supplement until Sept. 1. They were then placed in dry lots and received daily rations of 50 pounds of raw Irish potatoes and six pounds alfalfa hay per head.





# Your **Income Taxes**

SALARIED WORKERS Often we are asked the ques-

salaried workers, even tho they house. may have no other income, are required under the law to file re-

The reasons for this are obvious and very sensible. Your withheld taxes were based on an Estimated Table, but naturally it is impossible to prepare your exact figures in advance. Then the chances are your withheld taxes are not quite correct. You file them, after your exact salary and withheld taxes are determined at the end of the year, and overpayment or underpayment is adjusted. That is what this report is for.

Again. One may work all year as a single person, then during the year become married. In that case you are entitled to a married per son's exemption, which probably will have you some taxes. Too, child may be born during the year to a worker, then you have one more surtax exemption which is to your advantage. Here is what you should do: Secure your Employer, which the law requires him to give you, a receipt of wages and taxes withheld, Form W-2, Revised, the pretty little yellow slip. Sign this up according to instructions thereon, then send to your Collector of Internal Revenue. He will calculate your taxes and notify you of the results; or if you prefer, take this receipt to your Income Tax Adviser and he will attend to it for you. DON'T FAIL TO FILE YOUR REPORT.
