### Mrs. Johnnie Blocker Appointed Chairman Donley County March of Dimes Campaign

Plans for the 1946 March of Dimes in the fight against infantile paralysis moved forward today, according to Mrs. Johnnie Blocker, chairman for the Appeal in Donley County.

The local campaign, which opens on January 14 and closes January 31, is part of the nationwide appeal of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis for funds to continue the fight against poliomyelitis.

George Norwood is Vice-Chairman for the drive; Mrs. Katherine Bugbee is in charge of women's affairs, Walter Knorpp is Treasurer and Frank Thomas is Secretary.

As in the past, March of Dimes collection boxes will be placed at convenient spots throughout the county. In the light of widespread public knowledge of the National Foundation's tremendous achievements in recent epidemic years, the local appeal committee is expecting a greater response this year than ever before.

Plans are under way for a dance on the night of the 30th of January. Details will be announced as soon as plans are completed. Make your plans now to join the March of Dimes.

### COUNTY PAYS BOUNTY ON 1,025 COYOTES IN 1945

County Judge R. Y. King, stated this week that after a final check had been made, county records revealed that a bounty had been paid on 1,025 coyotes that had been killed in Donley County during 1945.

The bounty for each set of ears brought in is \$2. This would place the total amount paid out for such bounties in this county at \$2,050.00.

"There were probably many more coyotes killed in the county than the amount reported as a number of farmers and ranchers used the poison method of getting rid of the coyotes and then there is a good number of them that is never reported after they have been killed" added Judge King.

The Judge also stated that he was in favor of raising the bounty to \$3 instead of the present price of \$2 in order to encourage more people to hunt and kill the coyotes which are steadily growing in number and are becoming a greater menace to farmers and ranchers stock and poultry.

### New Dry Goods Store To Open Here Soon

Clarendon is to have a new Dry Goods store in the name of The Brooks Dry Goods Company, and is expected to be open for business at the earliest possible date in February, according to a statement by the owners, H. W. Brooks of McLean and J. L. Brooks of Gonzales, here yesterday.

The new store will occupy the building which was formerly occupied by Mellinger & Rosenwasser and located across the street from the Post office.

J. L. Brooks will manage the store here, and his wife and son Jack are expected to arrive some time next week to make their permanent home here. Mr. Brooks has been the manager of a store at Gonzales for the past 14 years and is highly recommended for his ability in the drygoods business. Mr. Brooks stated that their opening date would depend on the arrival of merchandise and getting the building ready, but that they would open just as soon as they possibly could get everything lined up this next month.

The Leader force joins our neighbors in welcoming this new firm to Clarendon and know they will find our little city a mighty fine place to live.

### Surface Burial Vault Co. Making Improvements

L. L. Wallace, owner of the Surface Burial Vault Co., is progressing with the time and needs of his growing business by inaugurating a building program around his present set-up that will meet current demands.

Construction has already begun on a new tile Monument shop along the north side of his present building. This structure will house complete new monument equipment which will be capable of turning out a larger amount of finished material. In addition to this, the main building will be extended to include new floor space 62 x 42 feet. This structure will be the same as the original building, being constructed in an oval shape, using sheet iron.

At a later date Mr. Wallace plans to construct an office building facing the highway on the south side of his lot just west of the Gulf station. The new buildings are estimated to cost several thousand dollars and will certainly be a credit to our little city.

It is such business firms as this that will build a steady payroll income due to the expansion of business and a greater demand. The Surface Burial Vault Co. covers 20 counties in this area and the monument work done here reaches a wider territory than that.

### Noted Columnist Spoke Here Monday

The public schools of Texas lost \$58,000,000 during the war because of the price of crude oil, declared Boyce House, Fort Worth newspaper-radio columnist, who spoke to the Clarendon Lions at noon Monday. The average price of Texas crude was \$1.18 while economists say that, if it had been on a par with other commodities, it should have been \$1.96, the speaker said, adding that the price per barrel was the basis on which the tax was collected.

"That \$58,000,000 of lost tax revenue for our schools could have been used to raise the salaries of teachers, provide better

equipment, lengthen the school term in rural districts and, in other ways, give the boys and girls of Texas better training for life."

House was introduced by Principal R. E. Drennan of the High School.

In the afternoon, House spoke to the students of the junior and senior high schools and of the junior college. Known for "I Give You Texas" and other books of Texas humor, the speaker gave numerous amusing stories in both addresses. He praised Clarendon as a town rich in romantic history and as representing "the very spirit of the cattle country" and declared Harold Bugbee of Clarendon to be "the foremost artist in portraying the real Southwest."

Some of the practices were reported to the county office before the 15th of August, but those that have been completed since that date must be reported if payment is earned.

Applications for payment are now being submitted to the General Accounting Office, and producers may sign their application for payment when the performance report is made.

Fifth Air Force, Japan—Flight Officer Hayard Max Rhea, 21, whose wife Sara Beth Rhea and four months old son Don Michael are of Clarendon, is now seeing service with a squadron in the 348th Fighter Group of the Fifth Air Force which is performing occupational duties in Japan. Arriving overseas in June of 1945, he has since seen service in the Mariannas and in Japan. He wears the American Theatre Ribbon, the Asiatic-Pacific Theatre Ribbon, and the World War II Victory Medal.

Rhea attended Clarendon Junior College before he entered the Army in May of 1943. He received his wings and commission at Luke Field, Arizona in September of 1945. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John D. Rhea of Clarendon. He has two brothers in the service, Burrell in the Navy and Beverly, in the Air Corps. Rhea plans to return to college upon his release from the Army.

The county agent advised that all veterans go talk to Mr. Hicks and get information on the program. It is understood that all veterans moving on the farm are entitled to this compensation, according to their earnings.

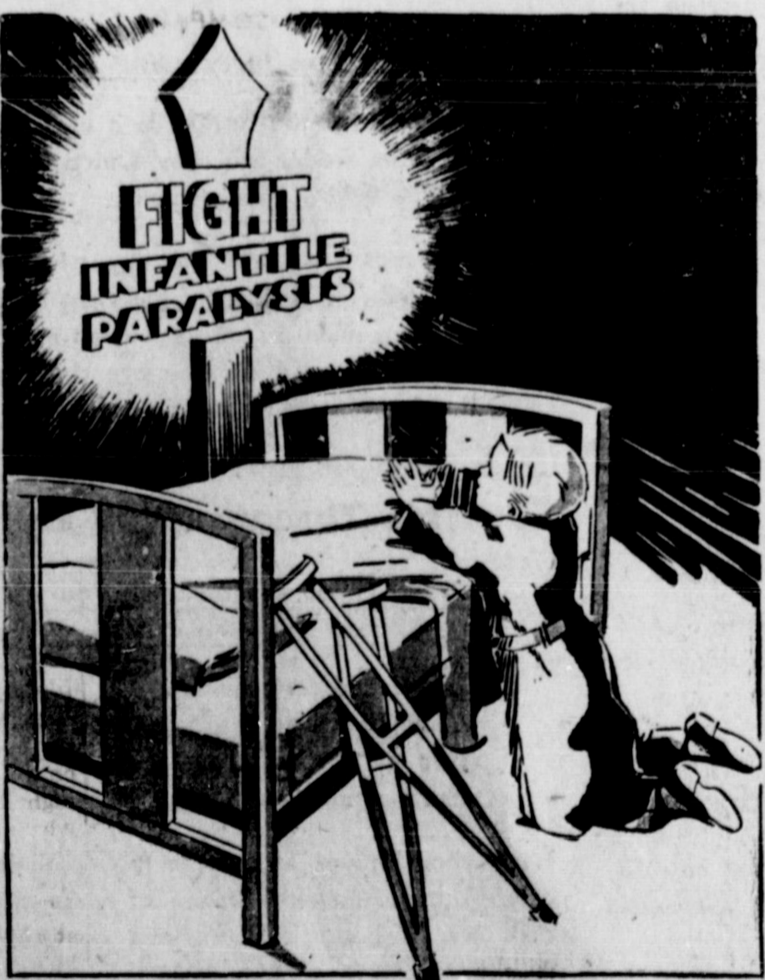
### Directors Elected For Chamber Of Commerce

Let the snow come. We are all happy to see any kind of moisture that will give us an underground season for spring planting and early pasture grasses.

Civilian life is again the pleasure of former T/5 Bill May, son of Mrs. Ira May, of Clarendon. Bill arrived home last night wearing a discharge button and carrying the document so that all could see. He got it at the separation center at San Antonio last Tuesday.

May enlisted in the Army on October 19, 1943. He received his basic training at Camp Wolters, Texas, and soon found himself in Italy serving with the Infantry. He was in that country twenty months, serving in the Trieste area since the end of the European War.

May states that since the end of the war, things were not so bad. His greatest pleasure was an excursion trip through the beautiful Alps in the little country of Switzerland by train on furlough.

At Naples, Italy, from where May boarded ship for the United States, he ran into Billy Goodman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dewey Goodman, who came all the way home with him, making the entire trip enjoyable for both of them. They arrived here together last night with their discharges, and home seemed "mighty fine," May stated this morning.

The parlor of a Midwestern home during the years just before and just after the turn of the century could scarcely be considered well furnished without a copy of Will Carleton's poems. Recently Hillsdale College, Michigan, held special services commemorating the 100th anniversary of Carleton's birth. In 1871, two years after he finished college, he wrote "Betsy and I Are Out" and sent it to a Toledo newspaper. Within a few months it had been reprinted by almost every paper in the country. His poem "Over the Hill to the Poorhouse" brought about a certain reform in the treatment of aged poor.

Archibald Mac Leish, the poet, and former Librarian of Congress, is Chairman of the American delegation to the London Conference for drawing up the final continuations of the Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization of the United Nations.

Richard Tregaskis received only \$3,750 from the movie sale of his best-seller "Guadalcanal Diary"—the movie grossed millions.

Betty de Sherbinin's new novel of intrigue in a nameless South

American capital will be called "The Challenged Land."

Novels based on Bible characters have become very popular—for instance "The Robe" by Lloyd C. Douglas, and "The Apostle" by Scholem Asch. The Literary Guild has recently chosen for February "David the King" by Gladys Schmitt. It is said to be a "psychological portrait."

David Russell has been chosen Poet Laureate of Texas, but Grace Noll Crowell, continues to be one of Texas' favorites. Recently the Grace Noll Crowell Circle met in Dallas. Mrs. Crowell moved to Dallas from Wichita Falls in 1918.

E. Phillips Oppenheim, at 79, has returned to his prewar Channel Islands home. He has to his credit some 150 thrillers—many on international and grand larceny—and he is at work on a lively piece of World War II accessories.

Daphne Du Maurier, author of "Rebecca," has a new book, "The King's General." For two years Daphne du Maurier and her family have lived at Manderlay, which she made so famous in "Rebecca."

R. L. TEMPLETON ANNOUNCES CANDIDACY FOR REPRESENTATIVE 122ND DISTRICT

R. L. Templeton of Wellington announced his candidacy for Representative of the 122nd Legislative District this week. Templeton, who is a veteran of the early air battles in Europe, set forth his views in the following straightforward statement.

Most of the people of this District will remember my race for the office of Representative two years ago when I was defeated by a very narrow margin after being compelled to make the race on a "write-in." I made a valiant effort to win that race in spite of such a discouraging handicap because I felt that I had been unjustly handled and because I felt that this District needed an ex-serviceman in Austin. My feelings in this regard have not changed in the two years that have elapsed. We need a capable ex-serviceman for Representative because many of our greatest problems in these times concern ex-servicemen. We need a man who has been through the trials of war and who has made the adjustment to civil life, so that he will be able to understand and cope with problems of

this nature.

I believe that I will be able to understand the problems and attend to the Legislative needs of your sons, brothers, and husbands who have returned from the war because I have been through similar military experience. After the U. S. Army Air Corps discharged me in 1940 I enlisted in the RCAF and flew in the early part of the war until I was injured in a crash in England. After some time in the hospital I was sent home in Nov. 1942, and was given a medical discharge. The Canadian Government granted me a disability pension and later gave me the distinction of being the first American sent to college under the Canadian "G. I." Bill, which is very similar to the American G. I. Bill. I am a member of the Frank King American Legion Post at Wellington.

During the present war I had two brothers killed in action with the Air Forces. My younger brother, Pat Templeton, was killed in the Royal Air Force on September 7, 1942, while attempting to land a crippled bomber at

night in England, and my older brother, John Templeton, was killed on March 18, 1945, while flying as a gunner in a bomber over France.

At this point I would like to have it understood that I am not seeking this office on the strength of a military record. Instead, I am seeking this office because I feel that I am qualified to hold it. For several years I have studied law at the University of Texas in order to train and prepare myself for such an office. I come from a family of lawyers and legislators. My father, the late Judge R. H. Templeton, practiced law in this District for 35 years. My uncle and namesake, the late Judge R. L. Templeton, was the first Representative from this District. He served in the Legislature for four years, and was District Judge at the time of his death in 1927. My grandfather, Newton Gresham, a well-known newspaper editor at the turn of the century, was better known as the founder of the Farmers Union of America.

My platform remains the same as it was two years ago. Namely, if elected I will do my best to be a good Representative. Because I was born in this District and have made my home here during the 25 years of my life, I feel that I

will be able to handle the Legislative needs of any and every person in this District who calls on me.

I am married and have a son 18 months old. Before the election comes off I will have graduated from the University of Texas Law School and will be engaged in the practice of law in Wellington. My office will be open in the latter part of June—everyone who calls will find a "Welcome" mat spread before my door.

A diver here descends to inspect the Lake Pontchartrain crossing of United Gas Pipe Line Company's Lirette-Mobile pipe line. The 14-inch pipe, for approximately 25 miles, rests on the floor of the lake and recently was found to have been attacked at several points by barnacles. Protected by "somatic" (a coating composed mainly of asphalt and sand) the pipe was serving as an excellent anchorage for the small marine animals which for centuries have been a source of annoyance to seafarers. Chemical engineers of the company found that certain sections of the pipe which were covered with mud were relatively free of barnacles, indicating that submerging the entire line in mud might discourage any further attack by the crustaceans. The boat shown above is a part of the United Gas marine equipment which operates in the marshes, canals and lakes in the company's New Orleans district.

### Irish Potato Silage, A Satisfactory Feed For Fattening Cattle

LUBBOCK—Irish potato silage, composed of 80 per cent Irish potatoes and 20 per cent grain sorghum stover (de-horned butts), is proving a satisfactory feed for fattening cattle in comparison with sunac sorghum silage and cotton seed hulls, according to W. L. Stangel, dean of the Division of Agriculture at Texas Technological College.

Thirty steer calves were purchased in November, 1944, and carried as stockers until placed in feed lots Sept. 27, 1945. They were divided into three lots of ten head each. Lot I was wintered on sunac sorghum silage and Lot II on sunac sorghum fodder. Both lots received daily a supplement feed of one pound cotton seed meal and one pound alfalfa hay per head.

In Lot III calves were wintered on native grass pasture and received a daily supplement of one pound cotton seed cake and one pound alfalfa hay.

On May 1, 1945 the steer calves, then yearlings, were given access to native grass pasture without a supplement until Sept. 1. They were then placed in dry lots and received daily rations of 50 pounds of raw Irish potatoes and six pounds alfalfa hay per head.

The steers were again divided into their three original lots of ten each Sept. 27, 1945. All three lots received the same daily ration of milo chop, cotton seed meal and alfalfa hay. However, Lot I was fed sunac sorghum silage, Lot II Irish potato silage, and Lot III cotton seed hulls. Average gains for the first 56 days were: Lot I gained 2.83 pounds, Lot II 3.71 pounds, and Lot III 2.84 pounds. The difference between gains in Lots I and III were very slight, but Lot II, fed Irish potato silage, showed a remarkable gain for the period. "No conclusions are to be drawn until the feeding test is completed," Dean Stangel reminded. "The three Lots of steers will be carried to a marketable finish. It is assumed that this will be attained at the end of 100

days of feeding, at the conclusion of which a complete report will be published," he said.

**SALARIED WORKERS**  
Often we are asked the question if salaried workers, who have had taxes withheld from their wages, are required to file annual reports.

There are no exceptions. All salaried workers, even tho they may have no other income, are required under the law to file reports.

The reasons for this are obvious and very sensible. Your withheld taxes were based on an Estimated Table, but naturally it is impossible to prepare your exact figures in advance. Then the chances are your withheld taxes are not quite correct. You file them, after your exact salary and withheld taxes are determined at the end of the year, and overpayment or underpayment is adjusted. That is what this report is for.

Again, one may work all year as a single person, then during the year become married. In that case you are entitled to a married person's exemption, which probably will have you some taxes. Too, a child may be born during the year to a worker, then you have one more surtax exemption which is to your advantage. Here is what you should do: Secure your Employer, which the law requires him to give you, a receipt of wages and taxes withheld, Form W-2. Revised, the pretty little yellow slip. Sign this up according to instructions thereon, then send to your Collector of Internal Revenue. He will calculate your taxes and notify you of the results; or if you prefer, take this receipt to your Income Tax Adviser and he will attend to it for you. DON'T FAIL TO FILE YOUR REPORT.
