ATTENTION VETERANS!

Outpatient treatment for service connected disabilities is furnished by the Veterans Administration through the employment of salaried physicians and dentists, fee basis physicians and dentists, and designated physicians and dentists. The necessary treatment to keep individuals receiving educational and rehabilitation training under the provisions of Public Law No. 16, physically fit to pursue such educational or vocational training can also be provided by the Veterans Administration, regardless of whether or not the disability in question, is service connected. Benefits under the provisions of Public Law No. 16, do not include hospitalization for non-service connected disabilities and are limited to the "necessary" treatment required to keep the individual physically able to pursue the program of vocational or educational treatment. Emergency hospitalization in private non-contract hospitals can be authorized only for service-connected disabilities and only if the condition of the patient is such that he cannot safely be transported to a Veterans Administration Hospital or a hospital having a contract with the Veterans Administration. The law makes an exception in the case of female veterans who, in case of emergency, may be hospitalized in private, non-contract hospitals, regardless of whether or not their disabilities are service connected. However, female veterans cannot be hospitalized by the Veterans Administration, for pregnancy, or any complications thereof. Authorization for emergency hospitalization in any case, should be secured at the earliest possible moment, and in any event not more than five days after such hospitalization has been made, or charges for such hospitalization cannot be made.

It is the intent of the law, that treatment, or hospitalization for service connected disabilities will not be rendered by private physicians, dentists, or hospitals without prior authorization for such treatment. If such treatment or hospitalization is rendered in an emergency, authorization therefor, should be secured immediately. PHYSICIANS CAN NOT RENDER UN-AUTHORIZED TREATMENT OR EXTEND UN-AUTHORIZED HOSPITALIZATION FOR SERVICE CONNECTED DISABILITIES, UNLESS A DIRE EMERGENCY EXISTS, and the authorization for such treatment or hospitalization should be secured at the earliest possible time. If a veteran has a claim pending, but his claim has not been adjudicated, the Chief Medical Officer, Regional Office No. 65, Veterans Administration, Lubbock, Texas, has the authority to make a prima facie determination of eligibility for treatment and/or hospitalization, and to extend authority for emergency treatment and/or hospitalization upon the basis of such a determination. Authorization for emergency treatment and/or hospitalization can be extended only by the Chief Medical Officer, Regional Office No. 65, Veterans Administration, Lubbock, Texas, telephone 4770, or by his designate. The Chief Medical Officer, Sub-Regional Office, Veterans Administration, 317 First National Bank Building, El Paso, Texas, is designated by the Chief Medical Officer, Regional Office, to authorize emergency treatment and/or hospitalization for service connected disabilities in the territory served by the El Paso Sub-Regional Office.

Arrangements have been made with all Contact Officers of the Veterans Administration in this territory, with County Service Officers, with the American Red Cross, and with Representatives of the American Legion and the VFW, in this area, to expedite all requests for connected disabilities. Sugar Stamp Number 12 Now Good

WASHINGTON, May 26—The Agriculture Department announced today that a third 1947 sugar rationing stamp good for 10 pounds will be validated "not later" than August 1st.

It announced also that spare stamp No. 12 in consumer ration books may be used immediately, instead of June 1st as announced two weeks ago. This stamp, good for 10 pounds, was originally intended to become valid July 1st.

The department said today's action assures household consumers of the full 35 pounds of sugar promised under the Sugar Control Extension Act of 1947.

It said in a statement that if improvement in sugar supplies continues, additional sugar above the 35 pounds will be made available to consumers.

Spare stamp No. 53, good for 5 pounds, was made valid on Jan. 1, and expired March 31. On April 1, spare stamp No. 11 was validated for 10 pounds. It will expire on October 31 as will stamp No. 12.

ans Administration in the territory served by Regional Office No. 65, are located at Abilene, Odessa, Amarillo, Big Spring, San Angelo, and Lubbock, Texas. Emergency hospitalization for non-service connected disabilities can be arranged for in hospitals under the control of, or under contract by the Veterans Administration through the same contact points listed above. Such cases cannot, however, be hospitalized in private hospitals, except as already noted for the case of female veterans.

Dr. W. J. Walker has been designated by the Veterans Administration to serve Clarendon and the surrounding territory. In the very near future, he will be supplied with the necessary forms for making application for outpatient treatment. The Veterans Administration has set up the most efficient means possible of securing Prior Authority, and no physician is allowed to proceed with treatment and/or hospitalization until the veteran has this authority. Cases of dire emergency are excepted, but it will be necessary then to secure authority by telephone or telegraph. Dr. H. R. Beck has been designated as fee-basis dentist for the above mentioned area.

The following letter will explain several questions in fellow Veterans' minds in regard to the Bonus Bill in Texas. It was received the past week end by the local commander from Rep. R. L. Templeton.

Commander V.F.W. Post Clarendon, Texas

Dear Sir:

I am sure you get lots of inquiries about the Veterans' Bonus. I want to tell you what the score is on that so you can tell the boys why they won't get a bonus out of this Session of the Legislature. You can tell them about this or post this letter in a conspicuous place in your office.

Four Members of the Legislature introduced Veterans' Bonus Bills, Gordon Davis, Roger Q. Evans, James Spencer, and myself. The big boys who run this State didn't want the Bonus Bills to pass so they put the squeeze on and succeeded in preventing us from ever getting a vote on any of the four bonus bills that were introduced.

There won't be any bonus this Session and there won't be a bonus any Session unless the Veterans all over the State of Texas demand that one be passed and elect men who promise to vote for a bonus bill. I had a good Bonus Bill that would have paid each Veteran an average bonus of \$1,000; some would have gotten more and some would have gotten less, but if my bill had passed the Veterans would have gotten enough to buy a new car, pay down on a home, or done something constructive. But the Veterans of this State did not demand such a bill; at least they did not demand it enough to get it passed. For that reason, I am calling on you to start right now to see that the man who takes my place in the House of Representatives will be in favor of a Veterans' Bonus. If you start right now you can see that he is elected and see that he keeps his promises.

Brrr! All Kinds Of Weather

The month of May, 1947, has had plenty in store as far as the weather has been concerned. The month started out with several days registering around 100 degrees temperature, then the rains started and we received around 9 inches of that wonderful stuff and now as a climax on the 29th day of the month we have a fast, breezy norther tumbling the temperature to a low of 38 degrees Wednesday night after throwing dust and sand in our face all Wednesday afternoon. The only moisture recorded for the week since last Thursday was .10 inch on the 23rd, according to the weather station at the depot.

In spite of our varied weather there are always bright spots and right at the present the brightest is with the wheat growers and the ranchers. Compared with other sections around us the wheat has done right well. There is a total acreage of around 19,000 and there has been little damage other than a light rust in spots and the total yield is estimated at 475,000 bushels at 25 bushels per acre average.

In general, farmers over the area have been plenty busy planting and replanting and it is hoped that the wind experienced yesterday will not cause them additional work.

Demonstration On Spraying Dairy Cattle Held

Fifty farmers and veterans of the Vocational class at Hedley attended a demonstration on spraying dairy cattle and barns held on the Royce Hall farm five miles north of Hedley.

The demonstration was held at nine thirty o'clock on the morning of May 22nd. County agent H. M. Breedlove held the demonstration and explained to the group the method to use in spraying with DDT and the value to the farmer, dairyman and rancher.

Several more demonstrations will be held this coming week at dairies over the county so that farmers in all communities will have a chance to attend.

Ranchers have also begun to see the value of controlling horn flies on range cattle. Mr. C. T. McMurtry sprayed a thousand head of steers this past week. Ranchers report that the horn fly stays off cattle for four or five weeks after spraying, regardless of rains.

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LIBRARY NOTES

The children's Spring Book Festival number of the New York Herald Tribune is a perfect treasure trove of books for children—hundreds of them that look so attractive. But they cost money! Books like everything else are more expensive than they once were.

The Book Club sent me a check for \$10 last week. I have a feeling that every dollar of it will go into horse stories tomorrow—

there are such lovely ones. I don't know where to begin in describing the children's books—I will probably be keeping it up.

John Erskine of Columbia University, N. Y., has a new book which is attracting a good deal of attention, the "Memory of Certain Persons." It is a sort of autobiography of a very full life of teaching, literature, writing, travel, music, religion. He became famous as far back as 1920 when he astonished the world with his "Private Life of Helen of Troy," "Sir Galahad," and "Adam and Eve," one following the other, each such a contrast to his scho-

larly writings up to this time, yet each winning his public—largely because they were something new in literature. "Helen of Troy" has sold more than 500,000 copies.

John Jennings who is remembered by his best seller, "Salem Frigate," has a new historical novel, "Boston: Cradle of Liberty 1630-1776." He has spent the past 20 years in extensive traveling and in writing.

F. Van Wyck Mason has completed his fourth and final novel of his Revolutionary war stories, which will be published soon. This last one is "Eagle in the Sky." The previous three were "Three Harbors," "Stars on the Sea" and "Rivers of Glory." We do not have the last one.

According to New York Public Library, an average of over three hundred persons a day have visited the exhibition of Thackeray's manuscripts, letters, and rare editions, put on display to celebrate the one-hundredth anniversary of "Vanity Fair." The record of visitors promised to be greater than that of the Browning papers—which totaled 66,725 in its six-months showing.

Steinbeck's "Red Pony," which is considered one of the best horse stories extant, is on the screen now.

Captain Harry Butcher, author of "My Three Years With Eisenhower," who is Eisenhower's personal aide, is to be in Amarillo in June—he is to be speaker for the Texas Press Association. It is said that Butcher is the first Navy man to be the confidential aide to a general.

John Gunther in his 1100 page "Inside U.S.A." does not mention Washington City because he plans an entire book on the capital city—his first "inside" to be given to a city.

Bartby Crum's "Behind the Silken Curtain" has already sold 30,000 copies.

Harnett T. Kane, author of "New Orleans Woman," is working on a novel about Varina Howell Davis, wife of Jeff Davis, president of the Confederacy.

It is said that both authors and publishers are glad to have a book banned because of the publicity, but seldom is a book of poetry banned—but that has recently happened to "The Blue

Hen's Chickens" by Vincent McHugh—who is considered a serious and sensitive poet.

LEGAL

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of two new sections to be known as Sections 17 and 18 providing a special fund for the payment of Confederate pensions and providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at state institutions of higher learning; providing for a five-cent reduction in the maximum allowable state tax on property; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Sections 17 and 18 which shall read as follows: "Section 17. In lieu of the state ad valorem tax on property of Seven (7c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 51 of Article 3, as amended, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Two (2c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations, and the militia of the State of Texas, and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies,

organizations or militia; provided that the Legislature may reduce the tax rate hereinabove levied.

"Also, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Five (5c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping such buildings or other permanent improvements at the designated institutions of higher learning; and the governing board of each of such institutions of higher learning is fully authorized to pledge all or any part of said fund; to issue bonds or notes in such amounts as may be determined by the governing boards of said respective institutions; provided, that the amount of such bonds or notes shall not exceed three (3%) per cent per annum and shall mature serially or otherwise not to exceed ten (10) years from the first (1st) day of January of each year in which such funds are allocated or re-allocated to said respective institutions; provided, the power to issue bonds or notes hereunder is expressly limited to a period of thirty (30) years from the date of the adoption of this amendment; and provided further, that the Five (5c) Cent tax hereby levied shall expire finally upon payment of all bonds hereby authorized; provided further, that the state tax on property as heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 9 of Article VIII, as amended, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty (30c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation. All bonds shall be examined and approved

by the Attorney General of the State of Texas, and when so approved shall be incontestable; and all approved bonds shall be registered in the office of the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas. Said bonds shall be sold only through competitive bids and shall never be sold for less than their par value and accrued interest.

"Funds raised from said Five (5c) Cents tax levy for the ten (10) year period beginning January 1, 1948, are hereby allocated, the following in the following proportions, to wit:

"Not later than June 1st of the beginning year of each succeeding ten (10) year period, the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, based on the average long session full-time student enrollment for the preceding five (5) year period of time, shall re-allocate, to the above designated institutions of higher learning then in existence, all funds to be derived from said Five (5c) Cent ad valorem tax for said ten (10) year period; and such designated institutions of higher learning which participate in the allocation or re-allocation of such fund shall not thereafter receive any other state funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements for which said Five (5c) Cents ad valorem tax is herein provided, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of other state funds. This amendment shall be self-enacting. The State Comptroller of Public Accounts shall draw all necessary and proper warrants upon the State Treasury in order to carry out the purpose of this amendment; and the State Treasurer shall pay warrants so issued out of the special fund hereby created for said purpose."

"Section 18. For the purpose of constructing, equipping or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements, the Board of Directors of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of Five Million (\$5,000,000.00) Dollars, and the Board of Regents of The University of Texas is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of Ten Million (\$10,000,000.00) Dollars. Any bonds or notes more than twenty (20) years from their respective dates, and in no event later than twenty-five (25) years after the date of the adoption of this amendment. This amendment shall be self-enacting."

"Said Boards are severally authorized to pledge the whole or any part of the respective interests of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and The University of Texas in the income from the Permanent University Fund, as such interests are now apportioned by Chapter 42 of the Acts of the Regular Session of the 42nd Legislature of the State of Texas, for the purpose of securing the payment of the principal and interest of such bonds or notes. The Permanent University Fund may be invested in such bonds or notes. "All bonds or notes issued pursuant hereto shall be approved by the Attorney General of Texas and when so approved shall be incontestable."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at a special election to be held throughout the state on the fourth Saturday in August, A. D. 1947, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding Sections 17 and 18 providing for the levying of a state ad valorem tax on property in lieu of the present state ad valorem tax of Seven (7c) Cents for Confederate pensions in order to create special funds necessary for the payment of Confederate pensions and for the financing of the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at state institutions of higher learning in the amounts of Two (2c) Cents and Five (5c) Cents respectively; providing for a Five (5c) Cent reduction of the maximum allowable state tax on property, making such tax not to exceed Thirty (30c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation; providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of improvements and buildings at the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and The University of Texas."

"Against the amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding Sections 17 and 18 providing for the levying of a state ad valorem tax on property in lieu of the present state ad valorem tax of Seven (7c) Cents for Confederate pensions and for the financing of the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at state institutions of higher learning in the amounts of Two (2c) Cents and Five (5c) Cents respectively; providing for a Five (5c) Cent reduction of the maximum allowable state tax on property, making such tax not to exceed Thirty (30c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation; providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of improvements and buildings at the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and The University of Texas."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election. (16-c)

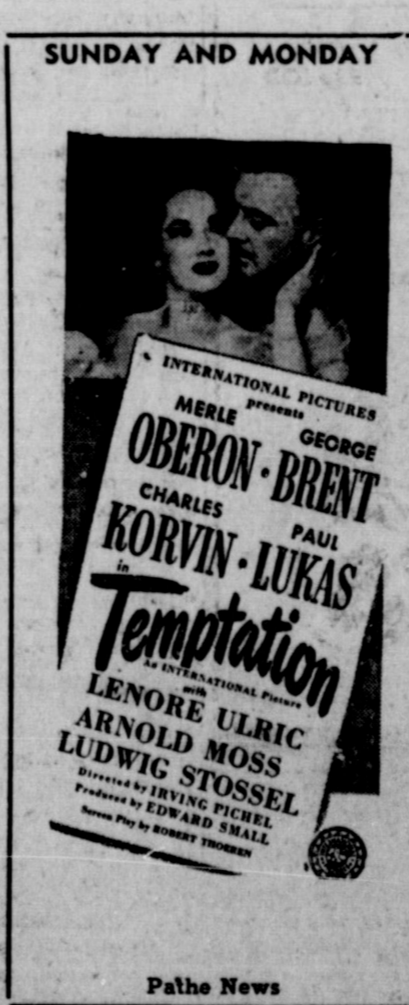
