Contract To Be Let On South Highway

Climaxing several years of work on the part of Clarendon Chamber of Commerce and Donley County officials, information was received here this week by J. R. Gillham, chamber of commerce secretary, that the contract for paving of Highway 18 south to the paving running west of Memphis would be let either in January or February. This information was received from one of the district Highway offices connected with the road. All right of ways in both Donley and Hall County have been secured according to the highway officials.

The highway official indicated that the road would probably be completed by early fall.

This road should mean much to Clarendon and many Donley County citizens. Due to bad roads, for many years residents of southern Donley County, Brice and other points to the south have had to go by Memphis in order to reach Clarendon in bad weather.

The road north to Jericho is also included in this year's road program and it is thought that the contract on it will probably be let sometime this spring or summer. When this road and the one south is completed, all state highways in the county will be paved.

Farm Program Held In Goldston Community

On Friday night, December 20 farmers and their families gathered at the Goldston school house for a farm program sponsored by the Texas Farmers Union.

L. C. McDonald acted as temporary chairman. He introduced John B. Gordon, Farmers Union representative, who made a few remarks and in turn introduced W. F. Stubbs of the Alanreed Farmers Union Local and a State Director in Texas Farmers Union.

Mr. Stubbs gave a short talk on what farmers in the Alanreed community have accomplished through cooperation — how they have established themselves in business by organizing a cooperative food and general merchandise store, a service station and how they have worked to establish a cooperative hospital at McLean. He explained how these and many other benefits have come to the farmers in the Alanreed Community and assured his listeners that similar benefits may be realized by the farmers in any other community who choose to work together.

Frank Overturf, State Secretary of Texas Farmers Union, made a talk on the over-all picture of Farmers Union and he expressed a desire to see the Goldston Community join with other communities, such as Alanreed, to establish security for on-the-farm-type families.

The Lela Farmers Union Co-op Band provided music. Gilbert Stewart recited a poem entitled, "Old Bill" and Carolyn McBrayer gave a reading, "Ten Ways to Kill an Organization." Group singing was also enjoyed by all present. Following the program refreshments were served.

Another meeting sponsored by Farmers Union will be held in this community in the near future.

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LIBRARY NOTES

To attempt to discuss the publisher's Christmas offerings of books would be a herculean task—so many and varied were they. A great number of old favorites were presented in attractive new forms—lovely illustrations.

For some time we have realized that war novels are out—but, now we are having them in a new way—histories of the war in every invaded section, and biographies of the leaders. And besides these, in increasing numbers, are biographies of the great and near great in all lines of activity. Books about Lincoln are being published in increasing numbers. Handsome sets of Gibbon's "Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire," of the "Sir Roger de Coverly Papers," of "The Rime of the Ancient Mariner," and of the "Canterbury Tales," all lavishly illustrated, have recently been issued.

"Cook Books" have enjoyed much popularity.

A book which has received an unusual amount of notice by the critics is "Thieves in the Night" by Arthur Koestler. It is a Jewish story of which the actual plot is short and relatively simple; the implications tremendous. Koestler recognizes the claims and counter-claims of his people. Readers may turn to it for a good story or for an interpretation of one of the great issues of our time.

The Literary Guild's choice for November, "B F's Daughter," by John P. Marquand is also getting much favorable mention.

Professor Simmons, one of the outstanding Russian scholars of his country, has written a monumental life of Leo Tolstoy—in which he says the figure of Tolstoy still bestrides our world like a colossus. Born in the shadow of the Napoleonic wars, he lived to use a dictaphone, to marvel at hearing Paderewski on a player piano and to dislike motion pictures. His "War and Peace," his

greatest novel, had some five hundred active characters—but Tolstoy's own life lists almost twice as many.

Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings has recently been in New York to work on a screen adaptation of her short story, "A Mother in Manville," and to see the movie version of her famous story, "The Yearling" which opened with much fanfare lately. Since her last novel, "Cross Creek," was published four years ago she is reported to have made seven starts on a new story, but none have satisfied her. She says she writes slowly and painfully.

Albert Idell of "Centennial Summer" has gone to Guatemala to finish a book on "The Great Blizzard"—why such a choice of locale, we wonder.

John Steinbeck has a new novel to be published early in 1947 called "The Wayward Bus." This will be his first full-length novel since "The Grapes of Wrath."

There are 170 known copies of John Wycliffe's handwritten Bibles.

Dr. G. M. Gilbert has completed his "Nuremberg Diary," to be published soon. He was psychologist of Nuremberg jail through the trial and execution of the Nazi leaders.

Betty MacDonald's "The Egg and I," continues to lead the best sellers in non-fiction, though why so classed is rather amusing.

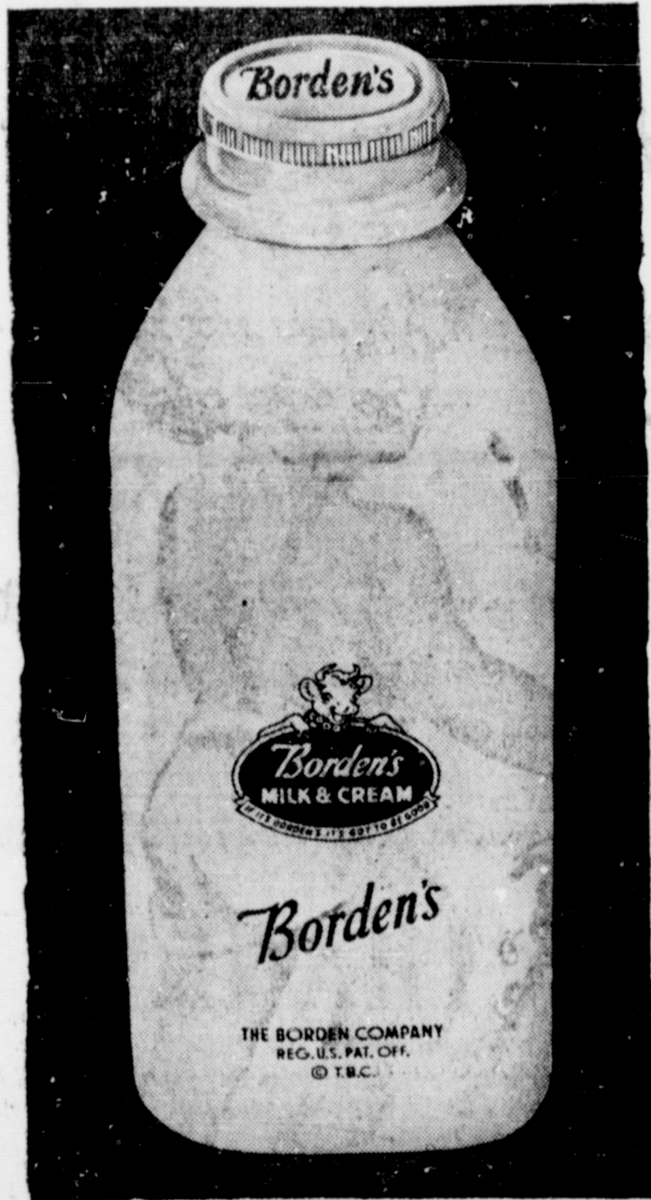

The clipping follows: F. P. Stevens of Coleman has received a copy of his old home paper printed in Cynthiana, Indiana, in which appears the following unique sale bill of the days of 1849 in old Kentucky:

A SALE
Having sold my farm and am leaving for "Oregon Territory" by ox team, will offer after March 1, 1849, all of my personal property, to-wit:

All ox teams, except two teams, Buck and Ben and Tom and Jerry; 2 milch cows; 1 gray mare and colt; 1 pair oxen and yoke; 1 baby yoke; 2 ox carts; 1 iron plow with wood mole board; 800 feet of poplar weather boards; 1,000 three-foot clapboards; 1,500 ten-foot fence rails; 1 60-gallon soap kettle; 85 sugar troughs, made of white ash timber; 10 gallons of maple syrup; 2 spinning wheels; 30 pounds of beef tallow; 1 large loom made by Jerry Wilson; 300 poles, 100 split hoops; 100 empty barrels; 1 32-gallon barrel of Johnson-Miller whiskey, 7 years old; 20 gallons apple brandy; 1 10-gallon copper still; 4 sides of oak tanned leather; 1 dozen real hooks; 2 handle hooks; 3 sythes and cradles; 1 dozen wooden pitchforks; one-half interest in tan yard; 1 32-calibre rifle; bullet molds and powder horn; rifle made by Ben Miller; 50 gallons of soft soap; hams, bacon and lard; 40 gallons of sorghum molasses; six head of fox hounds, all soft-mouthed except one.

Underground Water Proration Bill Merits Attention of Farmers

When the proposed underground water proration bill comes before the 50th session of the state legislature at Austin this spring, West Texas irrigation farmers will watch the legislative proceedings with keen interest.

A group of municipal and industrial water users headed by the Permian Basin Water Works Association have advocated statewide control and proration of Texas' underground water. A resolution along this line has been passed to several members of the state legislature calling for such a law in the interest of conserving the state's water supply.

Panhandle irrigation farmers in several West Texas counties have quickly organized to oppose the legislation and to devote their interests to conserving the water through private control.

A straw vote poll endorsed by the West Texas irrigation farmers is being conducted through the columns of Southwestern Crop and Stock, West Texas farm magazine published at Lubbock, to determine the opinion of as many West Texas farmers as possible on the water question. The ballots, when returned to the editorial offices of the magazine and tabulated, will be forwarded to Austin for the consideration of the state legislature, State Board of Water Engineers and other interested parties.

The water question is debated pro and con in the columns of the magazine by Judge J. E. Sturrock of Austin, Chairman of Texas State Water Conservation Association, who favors proration and W. O. Fortenberry of Monroe, President of Lubbock County Water Conservation Association, who opposes proration, on the same page as the ballot is carried.

Although the magazine operates on a paid circulation basis of \$2 per year with a present introductory offer of \$1.00, 25,000 complimentary copies of the January issue will be mailed to Southwestern farmers and ranchers on December 15 as a public service feature in the interests of getting a wide representative cross section of opinion in returned ballots. City residents who desire to vote on the water question may get a copy of Southwestern Crop and Stock from their news-

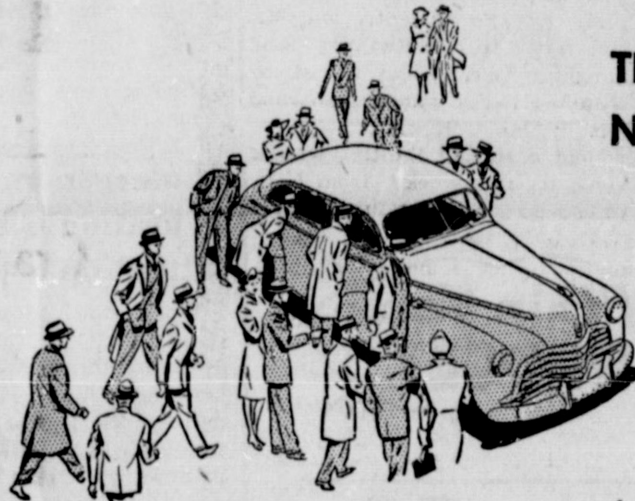

86 Persons Killed In Panhandle During 1946

Eighty-six persons have met death in the Panhandle during the past 12 months in accidents on highways, according to state highway patrol records.

Seventy-nine cars owned by Texas drivers figured in these fatal accidents. Seven automobiles with Oklahoma license plates were listed while Illinois cars were involved in four of the crashes.

New Mexico and California had three cars involved in highway deaths in the Panhandle during the past year.

Passengers in two Kansas cars met death on Panhandle highways while one car each carried a person who was killed in the Panhandle from the following states: Arizona, Tennessee, Louisiana, New York, Virginia and Minnesota.

Of the total of 104 vehicles involved in fatal accidents in 1946 in this area of the state 79 were driven by Texans.

Eliminate Peach Tree Borers

Peach tree borers have caused a great deal of damage to peach trees in Donley County in the past years. In order to have a healthy orchard it is necessary that this pest be eliminated as soon as possible to preserve the trees.

County agent H. M. Breedlove thinks the most effective treatment for peach tree borers is the use of Ethylene dichloride emulsion. It is applied around the base of the tree and covered with dirt. When covered with dirt there is no loss of the fumigant. Breedlove urges that any one having trouble with borers in peach trees to call by his office for detail information. The best time of the year for applying the fumigant is in late February.

Cash Farm Income

Texas cash farm income as estimated by the Bureau of Business Research of The University of Texas for the first ten months of 1946 totalled approximately \$1,018,980,000, an increase of 11 per cent over the same period of 1945. For the first seven months of 1946 the total of farm income was less than for the corresponding period of 1945, but for the past three months income has been substantially above 1945.

The increased flow of cash to the farmers of the State has been an important factor in maintaining the high level of sales in rural areas at a time when department and apparel store sales after adjustment for seasonal variation have declined in the larger cities of the State.

Five of the State's 12 crop-reporting districts doubled their

September income in October. Substantial gains ranging from 31 to 92 per cent were reported in 5 other districts. Lowest gains for the month occurred in the Edwards Plateau and the Southern Texas Prairies with 11 per cent and 3 per cent respectively.

Only the Lower Rio Grande Valley failed to show an increase in October this year over a year ago, although gains ranged from 11 per cent in the Southern Texas

Plains to 112 per cent in the Trans-Pecos. Valley income was held down in October by the late start in citrus shipments and the weak price situation.

Increases in income for the January-October 1946 period over the corresponding months of 1945 varied from 1 per cent in the Coastal Prairies to 47 per cent in the Trans-Pecos district. The only district in which farm income has lagged thus far this

year has been in the East Texas Timbered Plains where a decline of 8 per cent has been recorded.
