#### KOREAN REHABILITATION PROGRESSES UNDER U. S.

One of the least known of the lands into which American occupation soldiers have gone to uphold what was won in the holocaust of World War II. Korea today is a country of contrasts and contradictions, full of the lore and traditions of the Orient and imbued with determination to rehabilitate itself and take its proper place in the world structure.

Korea recied before the full impact of Japanese imperialism at a time when it was beginning to make strides toward modernization after virtually hibernating for three centuries as a passive defense against recurrent economic and political oppression by

One of the earliest victims of Japanese aggression, Korea was under Japan's control from 1905—and direct rule from 1910—until Nipponese dreams of world conquest went up in a cloud of atomic vapor. Today, its political status stems from agreements made by Allied powers during the war. The Cairo Declaration provides that in due course Korea is to become free and independprovides that in due course Korea is to become free and independent, and plans for carrying out this aim were elaborated on in the Moscow Decision in December 1945. After the surrender of Japan, Soviet Russia assumed control of the area of Korea north of the 38th parallel, United States forces the area to the south of that dividing line, and in September 1945 the United States Military Government in Korea was established in South Korea. A proclamation issued by General of the Army Douglas MacArthur, as Commander-in-Chief. U. S. Army Forces in the Pacific, provided the basis on which military government was organized. Lieutenant General John R. Hodge was named Commanding General, U. S. Army forces in Korea, and responsibility for fulfillment of American occupation duties was vested in him.

A look at ancient Korea and her people serves to point up

A look at ancient Korea and her people serves to point up the strides made since the war's end, and at the same time the distance which remains to be covered in the march toward re-covery from the steady drain of the country's resources by the Japanese during World War II.

Under U. S. military government. Koreans have been urged to gain governmental experience through active participation in government at all administrative levels. The policy has been to gradually turn over to Koreans the actual responsibilities of government, and they have assumed operation of all but a few departments of the administration in South Korea. Further, an interim Korean legislative assembly was established pending consummation of the terms of the Moscow Decision. The police system has been reorganized, a modest constabulary established and a beginning made toward establishment of a Coast Guard.

Koreans have been quick to seize on the privileges provided. Exercise of their new political liberties has resulted in the organization of numerous political parties running the gamut of

It is not strange that Koreans should react in this manner, for they are experiencing a degree of freedom not known in their country during 40 years of Japanese domination. Its lands felt no bombs or shells during the war years, but the conditions prevalent in the country are such as might have been caused by actual war damage: There is pressing need for clothing and housing: agriculture suffers from four decades of exploitation for the benefit of Japan and from a serious lack of fertilizers to replenish wasted lands; industries and mines labor under shortages of materials and manpower; communications and transportation systems combat overloading and obsolescence; food is in short supply, and inflation has worked its evils.

Should it again spread to this country, it could cost multiplied millions of dollars in losses to both our livestock and farming

So serious is the threat of this disease that the House Committee on Agriculture last week promptly reported to Congress measures which would provide full cooperation between this country and Mexico in taking any steps necessary to completely eradicate the disease. We hope to have immediate and full approval of the Congress and President in order to begin a quick attack on the human beings and other carriers of the dread disease. Especially i this true of buzzards and other birds which are probable carriers The foot and mouth virus is so tiny it can hardly be seen under a microscope and to date no quick and positive remedy except prompt slaughter and burial of infected livestock is known. Since this virus has no respect for international state lines it is imperative this country fight it where it exists and not wait until it reaches our own animals.


In the proposed legislation Congress has asked for thirty day progress reports from the Department of Agriculture so we may be kept informed as to exactly what is being done to exterminate and prevent the spread of this disease.




