COUNTY AND COMMUNITY ELECTIONS

Each Community is required to elect annually a Community Committee of three regular members and two alternates.

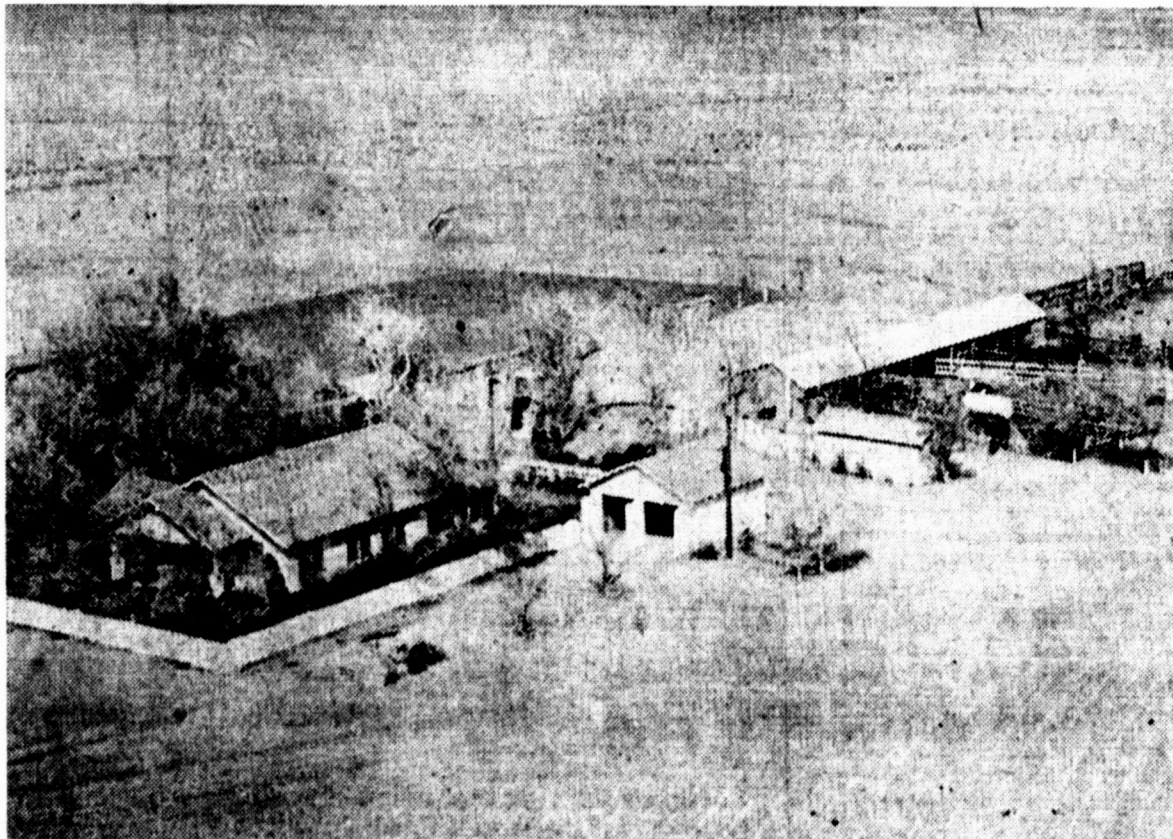
The ballots will be mailed on August 11, 1955. If you mail your ballots to the County ASC office be sure to have them in the mail in time to reach this office by the 19th of August. Everyone who receives a ballot be sure to vote. The man receiving the highest votes in each community will be the delegates to the County Convention to elect to County Committee. Farmers and ranchers eligible to vote in the community election who do not receive ballots may obtain ballots at the County Office, which is located at Clarendon, Texas.

COTTON

If your measured acreage exceeds your allotment, you will be allowed twenty days after the date of the notice of measured cotton acreage to dispose of the excess cotton acreage. Be sure and notify the County Office when you have disposed of the excess acreage. A charge of \$2.00 per farm plus \$1.00 per plot over one will be made for checking acreage of Cotton disposed of. The penalty rate for harvesting excess Cotton has been set at 17.7 cents per pound.

Church of Christ Prepares For Summer Revival

Plans are being completed this week at the Church of Christ for their summer revival meeting which is to begin this Friday night, August 12. Bro. J. D. Rothwell, of Bakersfield, California, is to be the speaker in the meeting. At present he is conducting revivals in areas of the Oklahoma and Texas Panhandle. "He is a well-known evangelist, and is reported to be an outstanding preacher," stated Bert Wells, local minister with the church. "The public will do well to come out and hear him through Sunday night, August 21." Bro. Wells emphasized.

The Church of Christ is located just two blocks south of the Ford Garage, at 3rd & Carhart Streets. The church building is undergoing a gleaming white paint. The interior of the building was redecorated several months ago, and now the entire outside is being repainted, in preparation for this ten-day gospel revival meeting. Members of the church have been very busy the past several weeks getting the building and grounds in tiptop condition, advertising the meeting by personal invitations to their friends, and neighbors by word of mouth. The church expects to have everything completed by Friday of this week, in time for the arrival of the visiting evangelist, and the beginning of the meeting at 8 p. m. Services will be conducted daily at 10 a. m. and 8 p. m.

Bro. Wells is inviting and urging the public at large to come to every service, and enjoy good spiritual gospel singing and preaching.

It appears that a good majority of people here in Clarendon are eager to have a hospital in operation as evidenced by the good turnout of voters in the election last Saturday and the fact that the issue carried almost seven to one. A total of three hundred and seventy-two ballots were counted with 325 in favor of the hospital tax and only 47 against.

This is considered an exceptionally large vote in a City election, especially on an off year when so many did not pay their poll tax. A steady stream of voters climbed the City Hall steps all day Saturday to voice their opinion and according to the total vote, that voice was quite loud.

It will take some time and considerable planning before the hospital can be put into operation but for the sake of all those folks expressing themselves through their vote, we hope the time will be limited and everyone will be happy with the outcome.

The first thing to be done will be the appointment of a Board of Managers, seven in number of which three will be appointed by the city, three by the county commissioners and one by both the city and county combined.

Before turning the hospital over to the City and County, the old Adair Hospital board will spend the cash they now have on hand, in repairing and modernizing the hospital building and an application will be made for matching funds from the Federal and State government. We should have a hospital in first class repair and one of the nicest in this part of the country when all work is completed. It will take time for all of this to be completed. By that time, taxes will be levied and money should be on hand to start operation of the hospital.

There are always a number of pit-falls, worries, etc., connected with a project of this nature, but as always, we believe Donley County residents, doing without a hospital so long, will see it through to the better satisfaction of everyone.

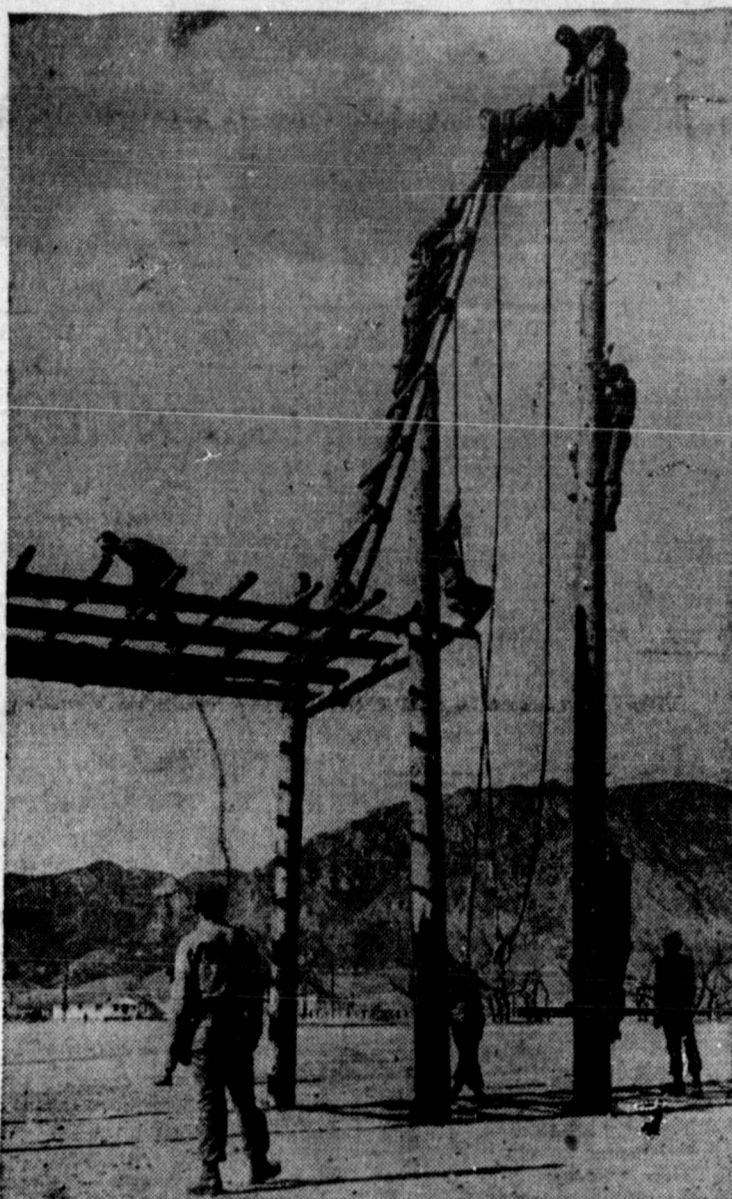
Research May Bring New Hope

Research which may lead to new hope for victims of polio, arthritis, and other joint-crippling diseases got a financial boost this week when Dr. G. W. N. Eggers of John Sealy hospital in Galveston received a \$2,000.00 grant from the Texas Society for Crippled Children. Presenting the check for the Easter Seal organization was Mrs. Thomas A. McCarthy, leader in its work in Galveston county.

"We are trying to find the best way to treat joint stiffness in human beings", is the simple description Dr. Eggers gives of the important work he and his staff are doing at the Galveston medical center.

Dr. Eggers is believed to be the first to study various ways of getting an immobilized joint back into use. He is unique in this respect, as earlier experimenters have studied only the immobilized joint, with no attempt to mobilize it.

Since 1953 the Galveston doctor and his research team have first made immovable, and then remobilized, the knee joints of scores of white rats. Following an operation in which a plastic strut

is fastened to the leg bone of a rat, causing its knee joint to stiffen, Dr. Eggers and his helpers experiment with different methods of re-mobilizing the joint. Observation of the rats' progress

and degrees of recovery in the laboratory is expected to lead to improved methods of treatment for crippled children and adults.

As an indication of the project's scope, and of the careful and detailed study involved, Dr. Eggers states that at least two more years will be required to complete his work.

The Texas Society for Crippled

Children is a non-profit statewide organization of affiliated county societies dedicated to the welfare and development of crippled children. Its work is supported by public contributions.

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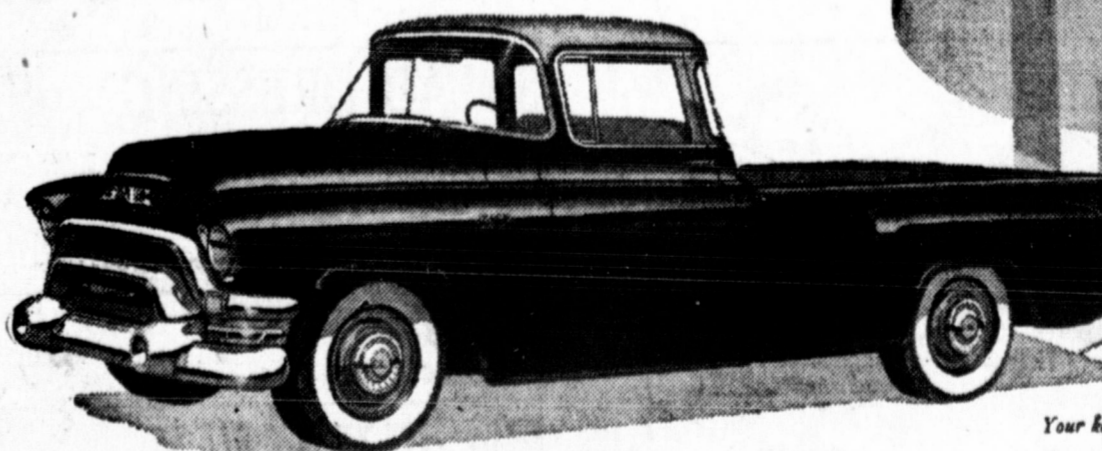

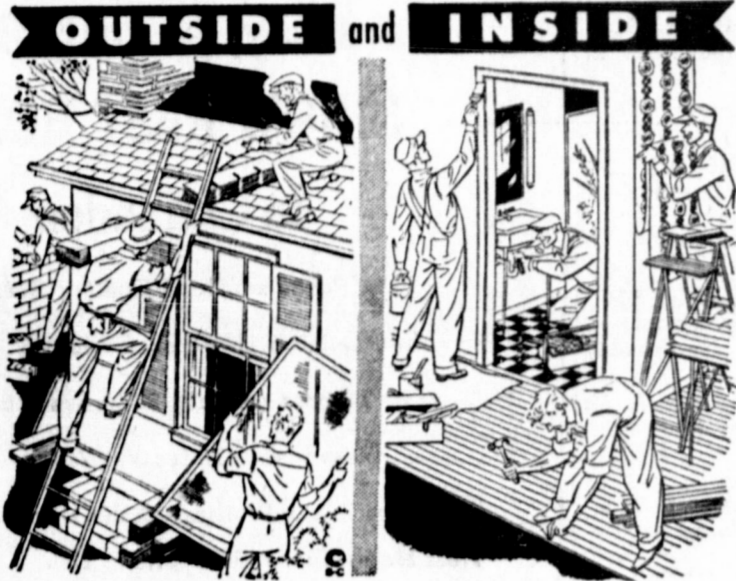

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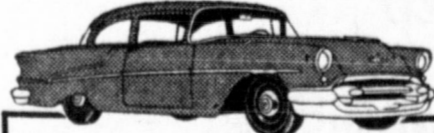
