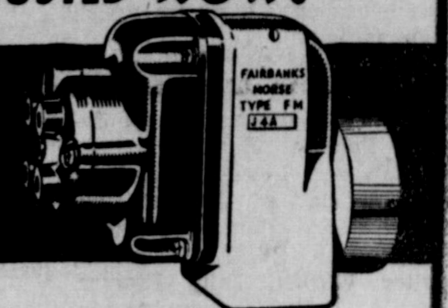
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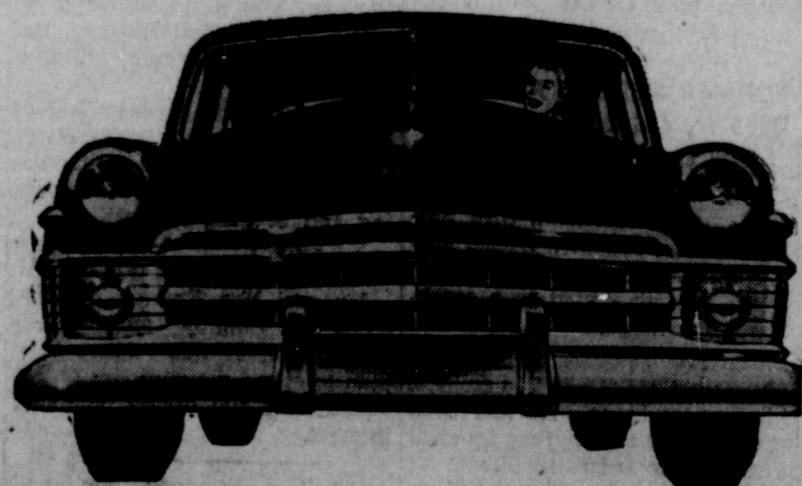

This week we shall report the Junior reading list first. Two books were donated by Ralph Harmon, "The Mystery Hunters at Lake Side Camp" and the "Mystery Hunters at Old Frontier." These are written by Capwell Wycloff. There are five of his books on the shelf besides these. For boys and girls younger we list "Lightning, a Cowboy's Colt" and its sequel, "Silver Stallion." These are written by Bill and Bernard Martin. More than 10,000 boys and girls in schools thru out the nation advised these writers to please write this sequel. These stories team Danny Morgan, his cousin Melissa, and his friend, Eagle an Indian boy with a courageous and gallant horse. There are three of the Cinder books by Romney Gay that the primary group will enjoy—"Cinder," "A Joke On Cinder," and "Cinder's Secret."

**CONSUMERS' PRICES RISE IN HOUSTON**

AUSTIN—Consumers' prices in Houston rose 2 percent from March 1949 to March 1950, as contrasted to a 2-per cent decline for other cities in the United States, reports from the Bureau of Labor Statistics to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research showed.

Prices of miscellaneous items in Houston were up 3 per cent from March of last year, while price declines for other groups ranged from 1 per cent in food to 4 percent in clothing.

In comparison with February prices, March prices of all items climbed one half of one per cent to 173 per cent of the 1935-39 base period. Food prices advanced 1 per cent in March and miscellaneous items rose fractionally from the previous month, while clothing, house-furnishings, fuel, electricity, and ice showed small price decreases from February.

Federal internal revenue collections in Texas from July 1, 1949 through March 31, 1950 fell 8 percent from the similar period last year, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

My name distinguishes me from some one or something else; it identifies me in any case of controversy, and it is a means of God identifying those that are his. No man can say that he is a

child of God until God has recognized his name as such. No man can say that he or she have a scriptural name until they can read that name from God's Holy Word; it is not scriptural until the Inspired Scripture reveals it. In the 10th chapter of John verse two says, "and he calleth his own sheep by name." Yes we are known of the heavenly father by name, and that name must be the name that he has revealed for us to wear. And if we are wearing a name religiously that has not been revealed from the word of God, how can we ever know that God ever thought of such a name? If he did he forgot to say or reveal it in Holy writ, and I

**SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS**

The size of an organization makes no difference when it comes to coverage under the old-age and survivors insurance section of social security. John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo office of the Social Security Administration, said a wage earner who is the only employee has the same opportunity to qualify for insurance under the plan as do workers in large manufacturing plants, provided, of course, his employment is in commerce or industry, as the Federal social security tax applies to employers of one or more persons.

There have been several cases of older workers who did not have quite enough coverage to qualify for retirement benefits. "Sometimes they recall having worked for an employer who thought he did not need to report wages since he had only one or more employees," Sanderson said. "It is not always possible for such workers to get credit for non-reported earnings as far back as the beginning of the Social Security Act. However, if the employer can be located, and he files proper returns for such past employment, or if the services have been performed within the past four years, the wage earner may have his earnings added to the record on which benefit payments are based," he explained. 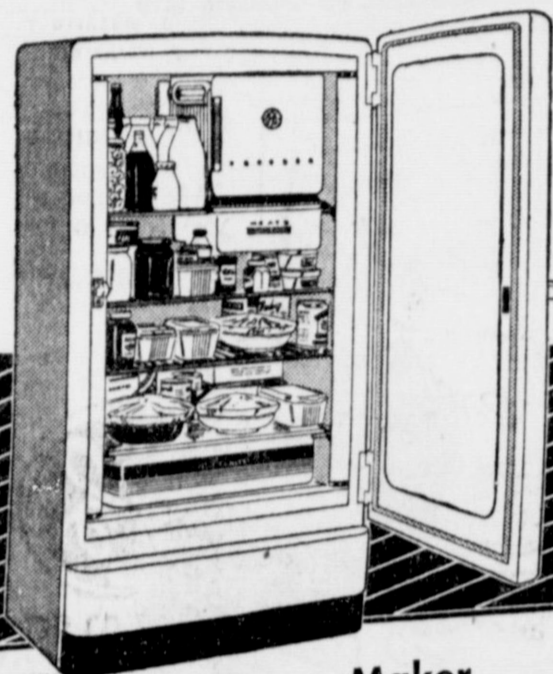

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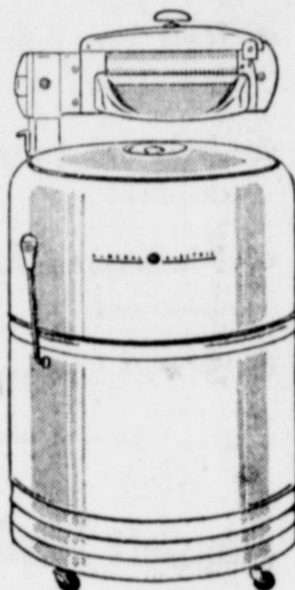
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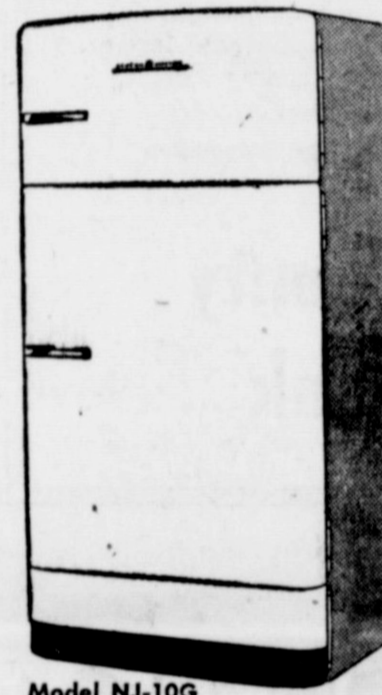
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
