### SOCIAL SECURITY **NEWS**

The size of an organization makes no difference when it comes to coverage under the oldage and survivors insurance section of social security. John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo office of the Social Security Administration, said a wage earner who is the only employee has the same opportunity to qualify for insurance under the plan as do workers in large manufacturing plants, provided, of course, his employment is in commerce or industry, as the Federal social security tax applies to employers of one or more

There have been several cases of older workers who did not have quite enough coverage to qualify for retirement benefits. "Sometimes they recall having worked for an employer who thought he did not need to report wages since he had only one or more employees," Sanderson said. "It is not always possible for such workers to get credit for non-reported earnings as far back as the beginning of the Social Security Act. However, if the employer can be located, and he files proper returns for such past employment, or if the services have been performed within the past four years, the wage earner may have his earnings added to the record on which benefit payments are based," he explained. 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




