Yarborough conceded the race about midnight Saturday. Few Brewster won the Associate Justice of Supreme Court race over Alfred M. Scott and in local politics Jess Finley came out victorious in the Commissioners race in Precinct 4.

The second primary vote here in Donley County was higher than expected with around 1500 going to the polls. In the county voting Shivers received 838 votes, Yarborough 657. For Associate Justice of Supreme Court, Brewster received 665 and Scott received 480. In the County Commissioner Precinct 4 race, Jess Finley received 52 votes and George Preston received 46 votes.
