CLARENDON SCHOOLS TO OPEN FALL TERM TUESDAY, SEPT. 7th

The Clarendon Public Schools will open the 1954-55 school term on Tuesday, September 7, superintendent H. W. Truitt has announced. All school buses will start their regular runs Tuesday and the school cafeteria will be in operation that day also.

First graders must have a birth certificate and must be 6 years of age on or before Sept. 1st. It will be to the child's advantage for beginners' parents to accompany them to school. First graders will be assigned to sections after enrollment is completed.

The enrollment schedule is as follows:

All grade school and Jr. High School students will report at 9 o'clock and all these students will be in school until 2:30 with the exception of first graders. All Band students and those contemplating working in the cafeteria should enroll in sections designated in that manner. All Jr. High students should come prepared to pay a \$1.00 library fee.

All High School students will register in the Study Hall which is room 11. The Seniors will register from 9 to 10:30 a. m.; Juniors from 10:30 to 12:00; Sophomores from 1 to 2:30 p. m. and the Freshmen from 2:30 to 4 p. m. All students are reminded to come prepared to pay their library fee of \$1 and locker fee of \$1.

College students will register from 9 a. m. to 3 p. m. in the Library.

Tops Gilreath Resigns Welfare Job

Tops Gilreath, who has been the local Field Worker of the State Department of Public Welfare in Clarendon for the past several years is announcing her resignation from the Department effective Sept. 10th. Miss Gilreath stated the Department has been contemplating closing the local office here since May 12th of this year. Through the efforts of Judge Jack Gray, the county commissioners, chamber of commerce and other interested individuals, the office has remained open but it is not known at this time the status of the Welfare office continuing here.

Miss Gilreath expressed her desire to thank the people with whom she has worked, for their splendid co-operation and the understanding of the limitations of the program of the state. She also expressed words of appreciation to the business men, professional groups and other organizations for the help which has been rendered to the people of this county.

"I do not know of a finer county to work in, Miss Gilreath added, and it is with genuine regret that I am leaving; however, I am accepting employment in Hall county which will enable me to stay at home."

The Clarendon Dusters came out in third place standing in Caprock League play Sunday afternoon after defeating Pierce Street of Amarillo and winning a flip of a coin over Groom. Groom defeated the Amarillo team in the second game of the afternoon to give them a tie with Clarendon for 3rd and 4th place and the flip of the coin decided the placing. The outcome of these two games gave Clarendon and Groom an opportunity to take part in the play-off games which will decide which two teams will play the best two out of three games for League honors. Clarendon will play second place Pampa at Pampa Sunday and Groom will play first place Hedley at Hedley the same afternoon.

The Dusters and Groom teams had to really play heads-up ball to defeat the Amarillo team. The Dusters came out victorious 6 to 4 and Groom got their winning run over in an extra inning with the final score 8 to 7.

Amarillo started the scoring in the first with 2 runs and the Dusters came back in the same inning to even it up and then two more in the second to go ahead. Amarillo evened it up in the third and the Dusters added their winning runs in the 5th.

In the game with Groom, Amarillo racked up three in the first which were evened up in the 2nd and third innings by Groom. Allan Shivers Re-elected Governor

Latest unofficial election returns showed Gov. Allan Shivers had received approximately a 100,000 vote lead over his opponent Ralph Yarborough in the Governors race. Yarborough conceded the race about midnight Saturday. Few Brewster won the Associate Justice of Supreme Court race over Alfred M. Scott and in local politics Jess Finley came out victorious in the Commissioners race in Precinct 4.

The second primary vote here in Donley County was higher than expected with around 1500 going to the polls. In the county voting Shivers received 838 votes, Yarborough 657. For Associate Justice of Supreme Court, Brewster received 665 and Scott received 480. In the County Commissioner Precinct 4 race, Jess Finley received 52 votes and George Preston received 46 votes. This was the only run-off race in Donley County.

Lelia Lake School Opened August 23rd

The Lelia Lake Schools opened Monday, August 23rd for the 1954-1955 school term. John C. Stepp, superintendent, announced a complete faculty composed of Mrs. J. R. Lions Raid Black Gap

AUSTIN—The Assistant Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission reported that mountain lions are cutting down some of the big game transplanted in the Black Gap Game Management Area in the Dead Horse Mountain country.

Returning from an inspection trip West of the Pecos, he said the big cats have been moving into the Brewster County refuge from nearby Mexico and the Big Bend National Park.

"There seems to be two main reasons for the invasion," the Assistant Director explained. "One is that the deer population in the nearby park seems to be thinning out. The other is that we have been stocking the Black Gap area and have been impounding water which is attractive to both our transplanted deer and antelope and certainly to the lions."

He said "it is the old story of having to take the bad with the good" and then added: "Whenever you have wildlife you have predators. We expected the raiders sooner or later, but frankly they seem to have shown up in surprisingly large numbers."

The Director quoted the Resident Manager of the Area—Fred Moore—as reporting that deer were the main targets of the lions. "The deer prefer the foothills and that is where the cats prowl around most," Moore observed. "The antelope prefer the open plains and are more or less out of range."

Moore has been trapping in an effort to curb the invaders. His last catch was a big female which had been denned up with two kittens. Moore said he believed the young ones either perished or left the area. This lion had killed at least three doe deer, two of them bearing fawn.

The Resident Manager said the grim counter attack routine recently was spiced by his black cocker spaniel, named "Skeeter Bill," which began acting like a lion dog.

That is, the dog did until he foolishly leaped off an overhanging rock upon the head of the big cat that had one leg in a trap. Only thing that saved the pooch was that the lion, in swinging furiously at the pup, shook it loose from the ear to which it was clinging. Had the lion's paw

struck home that would have been all for "Skeeter Bill."
