The gas lines should be disconnected at the meter and a pressure of 15 to 20 lbs. put on the lines to detect any leaks.

FARM NEWS

COMBINATIONS AND SUBDIVISIONS OF FARMS.—If any of you have two or more farms that are being operated as one farm, these farms should be combined under one worksheet in the county office. Please notify this office as soon as possible if you have bought more land or otherwise acquired land that should be added to your present worksheet.

Clouds forming in all directions converged on this area late Monday afternoon to give parts of Donley County good moisture, other sections beneficial showers and a few spots received damaging hail. The heaviest fall reported was in the Chamberlain community and in the Hedley area where around two inches was said to have fallen. In the Hudgins area, D. B. Koen reported 1.25 inch and Sam Dale reported 1.15 at Goldston with the amount decreasing to the north. To the west of Goldston, M. W. Hatley reported 1 1/2 inch at the Country Club.

Ben Lovell reported .65 inch at Ashtola but said the moisture was heavier to the south and north. John Rhea reported .85 at his camp on the JA ranch and a good fall was reported in the Brice area. The dry spot in the storm was in the Midway-Sunnyview community and southeastward thru Lelia Lake where only a light shower was reported. To the northeast, a part of Spade Flat received good moisture but some parts received damaging hail and this same destruction was reported northeast of town in the Kelly Creek area. Here in town, Joe Goldston reported .55 inch in the southeast part of town and our gauge located on College Hill only showed .42 inch. The rain seemed to fall in strips with a half inch variation within a quarter mile or less distance.

Some observers of the cloud moving in from the northwest reported seeing a small twister forming but it lifted and no damage was reported, although it was in this area that the damaging hail fell and a dense cloud of red dirt moved in across the west part of town from that direction.

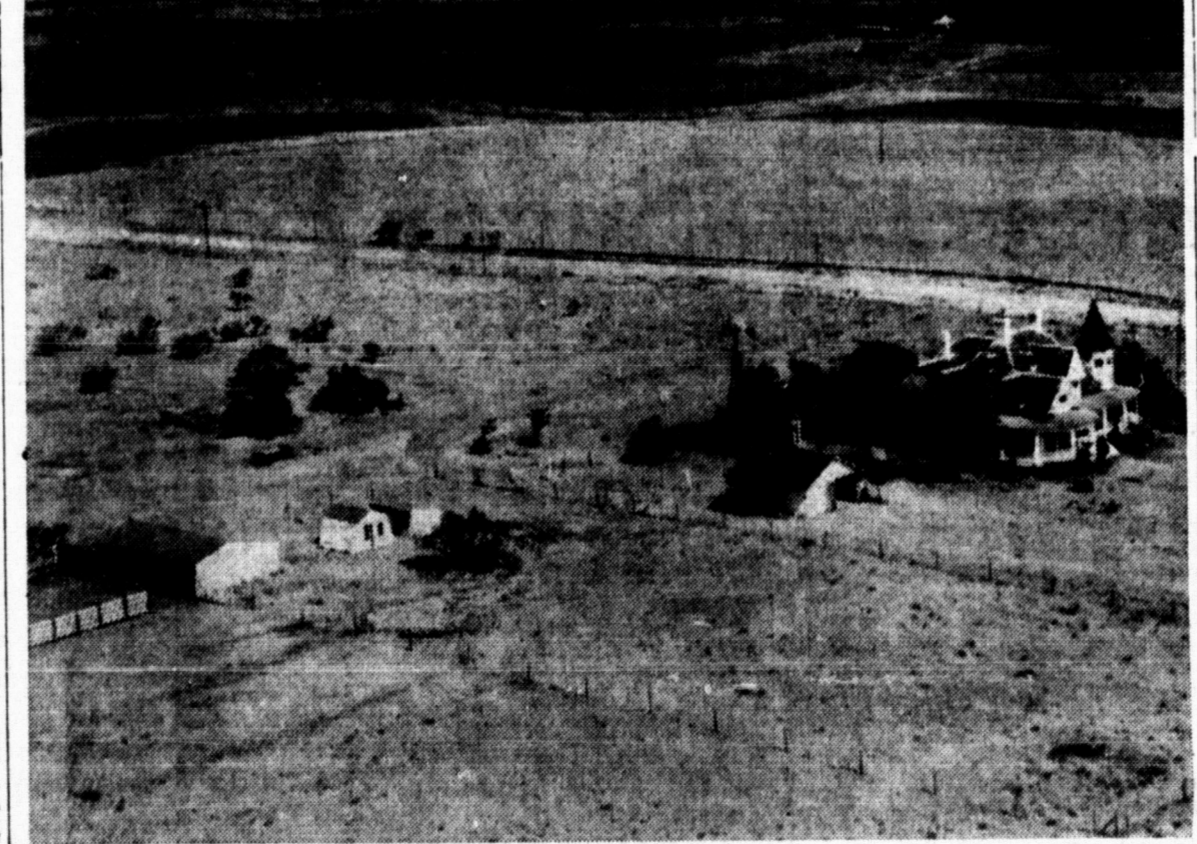
Among reports coming into the Leader office, the storm struck only one place and this was the White Way Laundry. The damage wasn't noticed until the next morning but upon opening her place of business, Mrs. W. K. Wade saw a pair of trousers and a shirt lying on the floor that were left on a line to dry the night before and upon investigation she found where the bolt of lightning came through the roof in some manner, burned a hole in the ceiling where the clothes line was fastened and traveled along the line burning the clothes loose. If it caused a flame of any nature, it must have gone out on its own accord, Mrs. Wade stated.

Farmers in the areas receiving the most moisture reported that it meant the difference of several thousand of dollars to their prospective crops, and the areas receiving the lesser amounts will be benefitted by saving some crops but more moisture is needed to bring their cotton and feed through in good shape.

Entrants who have already signed up will be announced at a later date. The Farm Bureau queen for Donley County will be chosen August 26th at the annual Farm Bureau Chicken Barbecue at the Lelia Lake school house.

Eligibility rules for the contest have been changed some this year and are as follows: Contestant must be a daughter or sister of a Farm Bureau member, single, age 16 to 22. Daughters of county officers, and county directors are not eligible to enter the contest. The girls are to be judged on grace, poise, charm, vivaciousness and all the other qualities that go to make up winsome Texas future homemakers.

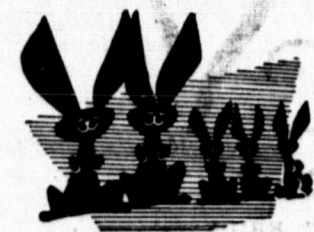

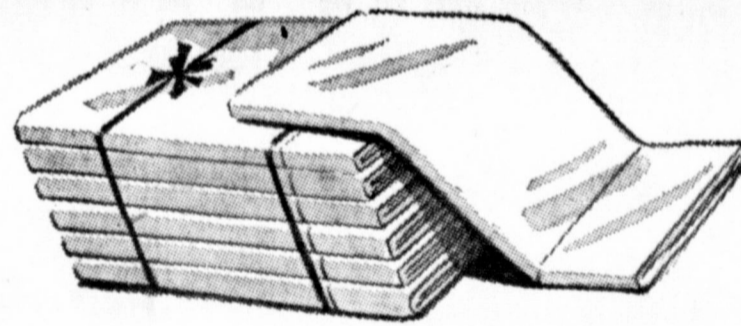

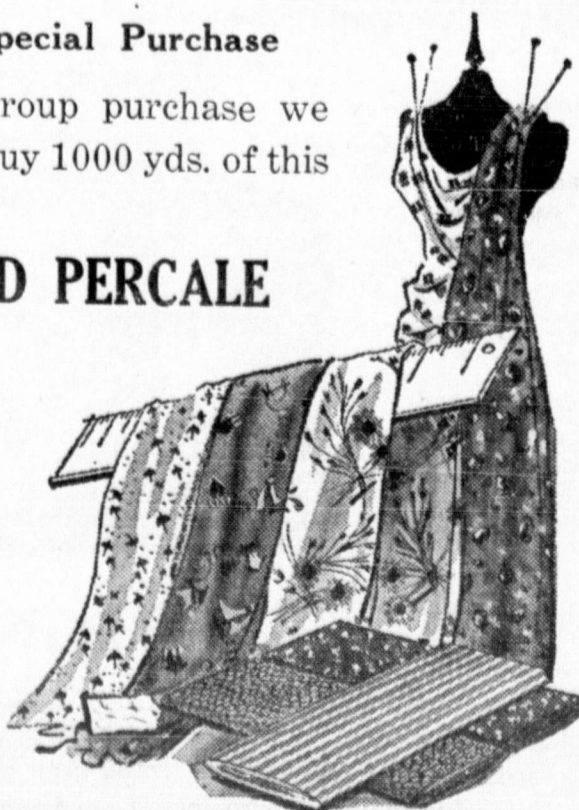

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not reduce the cost of health insurance to the average citizen, that it would not reduce the cost of medical services to the average citizen, and would not make available health insurance to those who could not now afford it. In short, it would not accomplish the stated purpose of the bill. In the main, it would have created and provided a direct and indirect subsidy to insurance companies. 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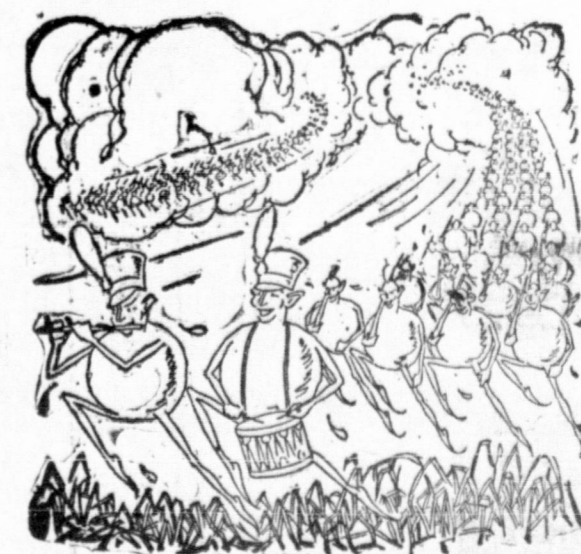

AUSTIN — The people have spoken! And what a speech they made. So close was the Governor's race that close followers of the

political scene here remained up all night Saturday in hopes of finding out whether there would be a run-off. Judge Ralph Yarborough was still in the lead at midnight. He left home shortly thereafter for

his downtown headquarters in the Littlefield Building. There the elevator jammed. When Yarborough was freed nearly an hour later, Governor Allan Shivers had taken a small lead which he never relinquished.

J. J. Holmes and Cyclone Davis, the two other contenders for the Governorship, polled just enough votes to make a runoff necessary.

It will be the first gubernatorial runoff since the Rainey-Jester campaign of 1946.

A runoff also is in order for a place on the Court of Criminal Appeals. Contenders are Judge Lloyd Davidson of Austin and District Judge Alan Haley of Wichita Falls.

A third runoff race is that between Alfred M. Scott of Austin and Justice Few Brewster who seeks re-election to the Supreme Court.

Duke In Trouble

Something new happened in Duval County. George Parr's candidates did not win by a landslide.

In fact, some of them didn't even win. Duval County votes were impounded after being counted, and locked up in the district clerk's vault, by order of District Judge Maxwell Welch.

Drouth Aid

Twenty-three Texas counties, hard hit by one of the state's worst drouths, have been made eligible for relief by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, with help to be forthcoming immediately.

All in the Central and West-ern parts of Texas, the counties were among 54 to be listed for federal aid. The others were in Colorado and Wyoming.

No details as to the nature of the relief program were made by the Department of Agriculture.

Canal Suggested

A proposed plan to stop Texas' continuing water problems was explained by Dr. Walter P. Webb of the University of Texas at a conference.

Webb's plan, already widely publicized, calls for a billion-dollar canal that would extend from

East Texas through the dry areas of South Texas.

Conservation

Federal water conservation policy backed by President Eisenhower will not support state conservation plans that are "piecemeal," the executive board of the Texas Society of Professional Engineers has been told.

J. S. Hudnall, Texas representative at the National Rivers and Harbours Congress in Washington, said that the president would "look with disfavor" on water projects that do not fit an overall planned program for entire river systems.

Natural Gas

Two Texas officials have tabbed the Federal Power Commission order freezing natural gas prices on gas sold to interstate pipelines as "serious" to the state's natural gas industry.

Railroad Commission Chairman Ernest O. Thompson and Attorney General Shepperd expressed dismay at the mandate, which was considered to be an initial step by the federal government

to take over regulation of natural gas traffic.

Shepperd said that the move means "financial ruin for a large segment of the Texas natural gas industry."

Thompson called the ruling a "tragic blow" to the state treasury. Texas levies taxes on natural gas according to market value.
