Elections will be by mail only, and the Ballots will be mailed out to all eligible producers as soon as possible after August 6. 



## THE SHAME

We the people here in Clarendon are very fortunate to live in such a nice little progressive town as we do. It is most unfortunate that anyone would be so unintelligent as to invest one single dollar in this community that is still so close to the dark ages.

Anyone that makes an investment here must be completely out of his or her mind to do so. There is definitely no way of telling what can and will happen to the money that you have invested due to the fact that we have very little or no cooperation or coordination between the business men of our great little metropolis. Either the people here labor for self and self alone or they say "I have got mine let's see you try to get yours." The selfishness of this little town is exceeded by none that I know of anywhere. As long as we have a community of this type we are bound to progress in the same manner that the people of the dark ages, getting nowhere in a hurry.
