





> Bucks Disdain Role In Tests

AUSTIN - Two buck deer seemingly are not too proud of their role in an East Texas experiment, according to a report made to the Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and

The bucks were trapped from their natural habitat last year and placed in a fifty-eight acre pen of thick timeberland in the Siecke State Forest near Kibryville where the Commission is

studying deer food habits. Dan Lay of Buna, wildlife biologist in charge of the project, said the pen, while comparatively small, comprises very heavy woods which the deer successfully use for concealment. Distribute Na- that they have been so elusive tionally Advertised Watkins that Jack Phelps, who resides on the Forest near the pen, just recently saw one of the stately bucks for the first time.

"The purpose of the study," said Lay, "is to determine the deer-carrying capacity of East Texas range and how it should be managed. Permanent plots in the pen are used to observe what foods are taken by deer each season. Additional bucks will be placed in the pen each year to determine changes in feeding habits until the limit of the food supply is reached.

"Only bucks are being used because it is important to know how many deer are causing the observed effects on the food supply. With does there would be increases and immature sizes to consider, and counting them would be difficult. With bucks alone, track counts after a rain are satisfactory for checking the

number of deer in the pen. "Some of the early observations indicate that the more palatable East Texas deer foods include: rattan, sassafras, black gum, holly, French mulberry, black haw, and various weeds.'

## Texas Farm Cash Income Lowest of Any Year Since 1946

AUSTIN-Texas farm cash income in 1954 totaled \$1,848,000,-000-lowest of any year since 1946 and 1 per cent below 1953, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

The general conclusion reached at the U.S. Department of Agriculture's annual outlook conference is that 1955 will be very much like 1954, the Bureau adds. Most of the commercially important crops produced higher

income in 1954 than in 1953. Generally speaking, 1954 farm eash income livestock and livestock products failed to equal the 1953 total. The only exception was sheep and lamb income, 14 per cent above a year earlier. Cattle income was off 5 per cent, eggs, 22 per cent, and milk and milk products, 17 per cent. The 3.920.000 bales of cotton harvested in Texas during 1954 was well above the 10-year average but still below 1953 total production.

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
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
