



A close relative of good old Bob White, the fowl being introduced by the State Fish and Game Commission is a native of the rough, dry areas of Spain. It is called the Spanish Redlegged Partridge and it holds great promise as a Texas game bird, according to W. G. Glazener, director of Wildlife Restoration for the department.

"It is a bigger and hardier bird than the bobwhite quail," Glazener said, "and observers in Spain say the Redleg flourishes in hot, dry, rough areas where almost no other game wlil." He said the first 70 birds will be delivered this week. They will be released by agreement with landowners north and southwest of Childress. Landowners will agree in contracts to protect the Redlegs while they remain on their land. Other legal protection of the birds will also be offered until it is assured that yearly increase will keep pace of sportmen's bags.
