We have during the past few years permitted the farm income to drop tragically, while at the same time the cost of living was increasing. This not only jeopardizes the farmer, but it puts the small independent American business man in the farm supported communities in a squeeze from which he cannot free himself and must face eventual bankruptcy. The decrease in farm income has resulted in a substantial decrease in the farm population. The records will reflect that this emigration from the farm has turned into immigration to the metropolitan areas and a resulting increase in the general labor market. In other words, the former consumer of the products of labor is fast becoming the producer of those products and no longer the consumer thereof. This can result in nothing except an unbalance of the general economy. This means unemployment, it means social problems, and it means subsequent demands for expansions of present government social programs.
