



One hundred and eighty tons of steel, every minute of the night and day during the entire yearthat is what the steel industry is ! able to produce with its present record ingot capacity.

Such high production calls for larger quantities of raw materials than have ever been assembled by the steel industry. Nearly 250 tons of iron ore will be required each minute as well as 203 tons of coal and large quantities of other materials, some from distant parts of the world.

To transport a year's ore, coal and limestone would require nearly 5,500,000 freight cars, loaded to 50 tons each, for one trip each.




