Memorial services for Walter Bugbee "Buddy" Knorpp, age 82, were held at 2:00 p.m. on Monday, April 5, 1999, in St. John The Baptist Episcopal Church in Clarendon with Rev. Ned Creswell, Vicar, officiating.

Cremation was held in San Antonio and interment will be held in Citizens Cemetery in Clarendon at a later date under the direction of Robertson Funeral Directors, Inc.

Mr. Knorpp died Friday, April 2, 1999, in San Antonio.

He was born August 21, 1916, in Clarendon and was the son of Wesley and Bliss Knorpp and the grandson of John C. Knorpp and Thomas Bugbee who were early Texas Panhandle pioneers. He had been a resident of Clarendon most of his life until moving to San Antonio recently.

He married Margaret Kelly on February 18, 1939, at Clarendon. She preceded him in death on July 26, 1989.

Mr. Knorpp served for several years as President of the Clarendon School Board and the Clarendon College Board of Regents. He was instrumental in the establishment of the modern Clarendon College campus, and he served as the City Secretary of Clarendon for eleven years.

He was a director of the Donley County State Bank and was also involved in ranching and the insurance business. He was a member of St. John The Baptist Episcopal Church in Clarendon.

Survivors include two sons, Walter B. Knorpp, Jr., and Todd Lewis Knorpp, both of Clarendon; one daughter, Karen Rose of Abilene; two brothers, John Knorpp and Carroll children, Christi Noble of Dalhart, Ashley Knorpp and Korey Knorpp, both of Clarendon, and Katie Rose, Jeff Rose, and Kelly Rose, all of Abilene; and 3 great grandchildren.




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

Lubbock Judge Protects Freedom

Kudos to Judge Sam Cummings. The Lubbock federal magistrate is apparently one of the few federal judges who have actually read the second article of amendment to the United States Constitution.

Last week, Judge Sam Cummings ruled that Timothy Joe Emerson's right to keep and bear arms is a protected individual right under the Second Amendment. Cummings dismissed charges that Emerson violated a federal law prohibiting gun ownership by someone under a restraining order.

This is a ground-breaking case according to national press reports because no federal gun control law has ever been struck down for violating the Second Amendment.

Federal prosecutors in the case are up in arms (no pun intended) over the ruling, claiming that the Second Amendment applies only to the government's ability to raise a militia a la the National Guard and that it in no way suggests that individuals have a right to own guns.

Well, the Second Amendment actually says: "A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed."

The language seems pretty clear. The constitution clearly says "the right of the people." It does not say "the right of the government." In fact, it's the same language the Framers used when writing the First Amendment - "the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government." As far as I know, federal prosecutors have never argued that the government has the sole right to petition itself. Why then this confusion over the right to bear arms?

The answer to that question is simple enough. There are people mainly liberals - who believe that only the military and the police should have guns.

The right of the people to own guns is one of the most fundamental and most important of rights outlined in the Constitution. It is on par and perhaps even more important - than our First Amendment rights to religion, speech, and a free press.

The Second Amendment is not about shooting clay pigeons. It is about the ability of a free people to defend itself against tyranny. It is the insurance policy of liberty. It is the failsafe that will keep us free if all other elements of our republican form of government should turn against

In college, a friend of mine from Haiti told me he didn't think citizens should have guns. "In Haiti," he said, "only the police and military have the guns."

"Do you have any problems with dictators down there?" I asked. He fell silent. There was nothing he could say because at that same time American armed forces were invading his country to overthrow a corrupt government.

I wonder now if ethnic Albanians in Yugoslavia have the right to keep and bear arms.

I recently helped introduce a bill that would take us in that direction. The bill is called the Landowners Equal Treatment Act. This is wrong. It is also unconstitutional.

The Fifth Amendment clearly states that private property should not "be taken for public use, without just compensation." Right now, the federal government is doing just that - which is one reason the Endangered Species Act needs to be rewritten and one thing the Fish and Wildlife Service should keep in mind as they consider the future of the prairie chicken this week.

Eradicating boll weevil will yield benefits, prosperity for area

Dear Editor,

Cotton producers and landowners in our area are facing a very important decision, whether or not to eradicate the boll weevil. I was asked by the Texas Department of Agriculture in 1997 to represent some 1,900 persons in 14 counties from Donley County on the west to Clay County on the east. As you might guess, there are a number of different opinions about what should be done in this 14 county area regarding the boll wee-

It has been suggested that this plan has two unique aspects that zone start an eradication program after a cold winter. The cold winter would reduce weevil populations and thereby reduce the amount of spraying necessary to accomplish eradication. The boll weevil trapping survey done by the Extension Service in 1998 indicates the weevil numbers are down now as a result of the extremely hot, dry summer of 1998 as compared to the weevil numbers in 1997. The budget was prepared in 1998 presuming weevil populations observe in 1997. Based on current boll weevil populations, it is logical to assume that eradication could be accomplished now at some amount less than budget.

Approximately one-half of the cotton grown in Texas is now under eradication and ALL other cotton growing states are now covered by some stage of eradication activity.
