For the multi-year Disaster, a pro-
ducer must have received an indemnity from either crop insurance or NAP/Disaster in at least three of the last 5 years (1994-1998) combined. This is a major change.

Previously, a producer would have had to receive indemnities a
least three years of the last 5 from crop insurance or at least three years of the last 5 from NAP/Disaster. This change could result in more producers being
eligible under the multi-year program. eligible under the multi-year program.
Under the multiyear program eligible Under the multiyear program eligible producers would receive a payment of
$25 \%$ of the indemnities received on eligible crops.

ariicte of amendment to the United Suates Constintion. Last week Jodges Sam Cummings ruled that Timothy right to keep and bear arms is a protected individual right under the Second night to keep and bear arms is a procected individual night under the second law prohibiting gun ownership by someone under a restraining order. This is a ground-breaking case according to national press reports because no federal gun control law has ever been struck down for violating the Second Amendment. Federal prosecutors in the case are up in a ms (no pun intended) over the ruling. claiming that the Second Amendment applies only to the government's ability to raise a militia a la the National Guard and
in no way suggests that individuals have a right to own guns.
in no way suggests that individuals have a night to own guns.
Well. the Second Amendment actually says: A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to being necessary to the security of a free State.
keep and bear Arms. shall not be infringed."

The language seems prettry clear. The constitution clearly says "the
ht of the people." It does not say the right of the government." In fact, it's the same language the Framers used when writing the First Amendment - "the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government." As far as I know, federal prosecutors have never argued
that the government has the sole right to petition itself. Why then this that the government has the sole right to petition itself. Why then this

The answer to that question is sim
The answer to that question is simple enough. There are people -
mainly liberals - who believe that only the military and the police should have guns. The right of the people to own guns is one of the most fundamental
and most important of rights outlined in the Constitution. It is on par and perhaps even more important - than our First Amendment rights to religion, spech, and a free press.

The Second Amendment is not about shooting clay pigeons. It is
about the ability of about the ability of a free people to defend itself against tyranny. It is the insurance policy of liberty. It is the failsafe that will keep us free if all
other elements of our republican form of government should turn against other elements of our republican form of government should turn against
us. In college, a friend of mine from Haiti told me he didn't think citizens should have guns. "In Haiti," he said, "only the police and military have
the guns."
"Do you have any problems with dictators down there?" I asked. He fell silent. There was nothing he could say because at that same time American armed forces were invading his country to overthrow a corrupt government.
I wonder now if ethnic Albanians in Yugoslavia have the right to
keep and bear arms.

thereby reduce the amount of spray ing necessary to accomplish eradication. The boll weevil trapping survey done by the Extension Service in 1998 indicates the weevil numbers are down now as a result of the extremely hot, dry summer of 1998 as compared to the weevil numbers in 1997. The budget was prepared in 1998 presuming weevil populations observe in 1997. Based on current boll weevil populations, it is logical to assume that eradication could be accomplished no
