## P. T. A. Sponsoring Science Fair March 7th

The local P.T.A. is sponsoring a Science Fair here Friday, March 7th in the Jr. High gym beginning at 8:30 a. m. until 3 p. m. The following gives the purpose, rules and awards governing the fair and the public in general is urged to attend.

- Purpose of a Science Fair**
1. To offer opportunity for the display of scientific talent and to provide recognition of this talent.
  2. To motivate, encourage and inspire in students and teachers the desire for scientific experimentation and discovery.
  3. To encourage talented youths to enter scientific careers.
  4. To focus attention on science and stimulate student, teacher and community interest.

**WHAT IS A SCIENCE FAIR?**  
A science fair is a collection of exhibits, each of which is designed to show a biological, a chemical, an engineering, a mathematical or a physical principle, a laboratory or other procedure, or an industrial development.

- BASIC RULES**
1. Only displays prepared during the present school year may be entered.
  2. All exhibits must be constructed exclusively by students. Professional and technically trained people may give advice.
  3. All tools and equipment for setting up must be supplied by the exhibitor.
  4. No exhibitor or sponsor will be permitted in the exhibition room during the judging period.
  5. The safety precautions must be observed.
  6. The exhibit number must be placed in the front right-hand corner of the exhibit or exhibit space.
  7. Exhibits will be limited to one per person.

**Setting up Exhibits**  
Exhibits must be set up by Thursday afternoon before four o'clock, March 6, 1958.

**REMOVAL OF EXHIBITS**  
The exhibitor is responsible for the removal of his exhibit by noon, Monday, March 10, 1958. He must present his claim check to the fair officials before removing his exhibit.

**1958 WHEAT**  
Field measurements have been completed on all wheat acreage for the year 1958. Final measurement notices will be mailed to each wheat producer within the next few days. We wish to thank you for your cooperation in helping us accomplish this work.

**ACREAGE RESERVE**  
Our last report indicates 185 agreements have been signed for Soil Bank 1958 Cotton Acreage Reserve. This represents banking 6969.5 acres of allotted cotton carrying a maximum compensation in the sum of \$170,920.64.

**DATE TO REMEMBER**  
February 28, 1958 is the final date to place 1958 grain sorghum in the loan.

**NO GRAZING**  
No grazing of Soil Bank Acreage is permitted.

**CONSERVATION RESERVE**  
Applications for placing acreages in the Conservation Reserve (5 or 10 year plan) will be accepted through April 15, 1958.

**ASC 1957 PROGRAM ASSISTANCE**

More than 400 farmers took advantage of the 1957 ACP Program and performed practices covering establishing vegetative cover crops, brush control, digging wells, terracing, deep plowing cropland, and other practices helpful in soil building and increasing productivity of their land. Payments under this program totaled \$66,912.02 for the year 1957.

## Registered Vehicles Safety Inspections Lagging

Captain Alan Johnson, Service Commander of Motor Vehicle Inspection of Region No. 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today that only 30 per cent of the registered vehicles in this Region have been inspected to date for the year, 1958.

Captain Johnson pointed out that motorists are subject to a fine of one dollar (\$1.00) to two hundred dollars (\$200.00), if they are apprehended operating a vehicle without a valid Safety Inspection sticker.

Richard Brock, Motor Vehicle Inspection Patrolman for Donley County, advised that out of 2592 vehicles registered in the county, only 843 have been inspected to date. This represents only 33 per cent of the total vehicles in this county required by State law to be inspected.

Brock stated 4 State approved Inspections Stations are located in Donley County and that motorists should have their vehicles inspected as soon as possible in order to avoid a last minute rush to meet the April 15 deadline.

## County Agent Urges Use of Soil Test

The adequate subsoil moisture that is now available as a result of the fall and winter rains indicates an exceptional yield potential for the coming year, according to H. M. Breedlove, County Agent.

With this reserve supply of moisture and increased yield potential would come an increased need for an adequate fertility level, he points out. In drought periods, lack of moisture naturally becomes a limiting factor in crop production. But in periods of sufficient moisture, plant nutrients often become the limiting factor.

So, with chances for sufficient moisture looking good, and since no farmer wants a limiting factor in his crop yields, Breedlove advises farmers to apply sufficient fertilizer to supply enough plant nutrients for good growth.

To determine the needs for the coming year, Breedlove strongly urges the use of a soil test. The soil test not only will determine the amount of nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium and limestone which will be needed, but it will also determine the proper balance in which the nutrients should be applied. The recommendations based on a soil test are designed to give the yield increase which would result in the most profitable return from money invested in fertilizer.

The game was a regional play-off game to determine what team from this area would go to the regional tournament in Lubbock this week-end.

The game was a nip-and-tuck affair from start to finish. Each team commanded as much as a six-point lead during the game. Gruver led 19 to 13 midway of the second quarter and the Bronchos held a 44 to 38 lead early in the fourth quarter. The Bronchos led 11 to 10 at the end of the first quarter and Gruver was ahead 22 to 21 at the half. Clarendon was leading 40 to 37 at the third quarter intermission.

Jerry Behrens, leading scorer for the Bronchos all season, played a great game on both offense and defense and was high point man for the local boys with 18 points. Jerald Hill made 13 points, John Tom Morrow 11. Keith Schollenbarger 5 and Richard Vallance 4. Behrens, Vallance and Hill were all playing their last game for the Bronchos. Behrens and Vallance are both seniors and Hill is a junior, but is using his last year of eligibility. Lesley Barkley was high point man for the night with 21 points for the Greyhounds.

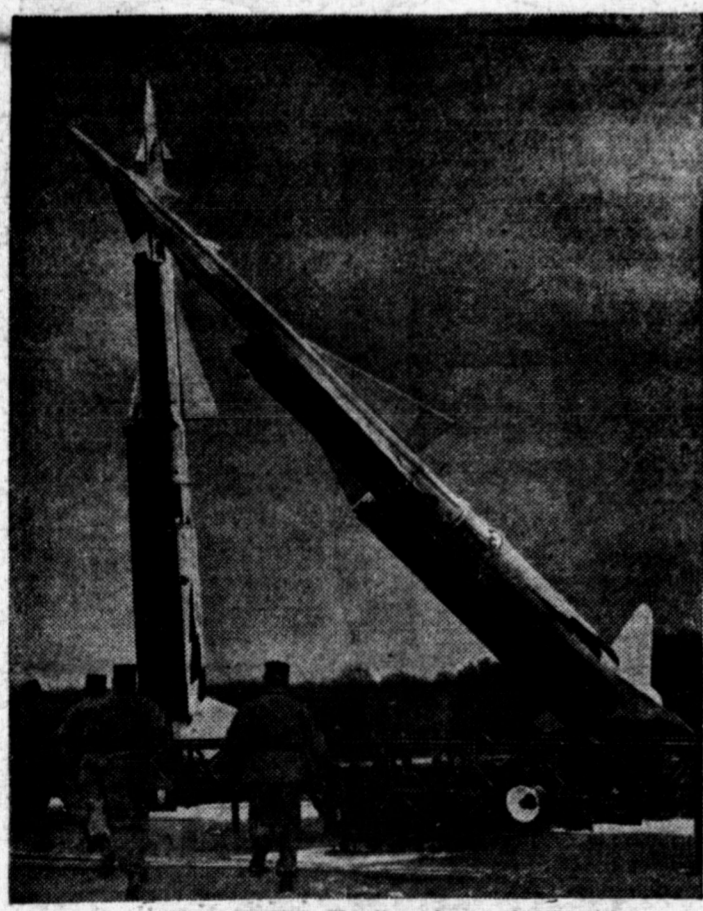

any good farmer is also an ecologist, for he recognizes that his own welfare depends upon the proper treatment and management of the acres that he owns and farms.  
Today the number of artificially created farm ponds has increased by hundreds of thousands and is growing constantly. Sometimes these ponds are supplied by natural springs and sometimes merely by run-off water. Either way they are an economic benefit to the farmer in the conservation of water, the prevention of floods and the watering of his livestock. A well kept pond rewards the farmer with good fishing, besides water for livestock. Fish must eat. If proper fertilizing and stocking with game fish, a pond on the farm or ranch can become the most valuable acre of that unit from amount of food produced and pleasure derived.  
About three years ago Raymond Farr had the pond near his residence fertilized because he happened to have some slack labor and some of the best type of fertilizer at hand. Raymond did not realize at the time that many of the local residence and many outside visitors as well, would be catching healthy game fish in large number, and of several species also. Some of the Bass

weighed more than five pounds, and some of the other species have exceeded three pounds.

**STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights**

**AUSTIN**—Money is making the biggest news in Austin at the moment.

Discussion swirls around such topics as campaign funds, unemployment, recession, taxation, receiverships and credit insurance rates—all pocket-prodding issues.

Gov. Price Daniel publicly deplored the money-raising efforts of Texas' Republican National Committeeman H. J. (Jack) Porter. Porter staged a \$100-a-plate dinner in Houston to raise money for Republican congressional campaigns. His widely publicized letter asking contributions pointed out the need to gain support for the natural gas bill now before Congress.

A hard-fought issue for many years, the bill is generally favored in Texas and other gas-producing states, but bitterly opposed in gas-consuming Eastern and Northern cities. Opponents were quick to label Porter's approach as "mass bribery" and "selling legislation for campaign contributions." Proponents of the bill groaned. They contended that Porter had heaved a huge monkey wrench into plans for passage this session.

Governor Daniel said the incident "should convince all Texans that the Republican leadership in this state has nothing to offer but embarrassment, discord and division."

**WHY NO JOBS**

Viewing the soaring unemployment figures, Governor Daniel took more jabs at the GOP.

Loss of jobs reportedly increased more in the past month than at any time since World War II.

As far as Texas is concerned, said the governor, much of the blame can be laid to the Republican administration's ineffectiveness in controlling oil imports. Competition of foreign oil, he asserted, has caused Texas production to slip steadily, bringing loss of jobs and revenue to the state. Texas farm policies also were criticized by the governor.

Texas Employment Commission says its January unemployment compensation payments hit \$537,800, an increase of almost 70 per cent from last September.

**MORE TAXES?**  
Governor Daniel has slightly and very cautiously amended his determinedly cheerful stand about possible need for new state taxes.

He still doesn't agree with Comptroller Robert S. Calvert's chilly prediction. These are for a \$12,000,000 deficit by the end of this biennium (in 1959) and need for the next Legislature to scratch up \$100,000,000 in new revenue.

Governor Daniel said he felt the state would just about break even by 1959. But he conceded that needs of a growing state might call for more money by then. He still favors a gas gathering tax, which he proposed last year, but emphasized he isn't recommending that or any other new tax for the time being.

**LET'S FACE IT**  
It's a recession, all right, but a minor one.

This is the answer Dr. John R. Stockton, one of the state's top business analysts, is giving many groups these days. Dr. Stockton is director of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Re-

search. Ebbing of prosperity and fear of another Depression have put the spotlight on BBR's studies. Dr. Stockton minces no words about there being a recession, but contends that the cures for this one are in plain sight. He cites increased federal spending and easier credit regulations.

A "minor" recession, says the BBR director, usually lasts about six to eight months.

**RATE ORDER DELAYED**  
State Board of Insurance is re-studying an order that would cut in half the rate for insurance on people who get small loans.

Order brought a storm of protest from credit insurers who said the regulation would put them out of business. After a hearing, the Board postponed effective date of the order from March 1 to April 1.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has said he would head a drive to crack down on "loan sharks" if the Insurance Board would tighten up credit insurance regulations.

**ANTI-GIFT LAW TOPPLES**  
The Attorney General has declared invalid a section of a new law prohibiting insurance company officials from making gifts to State Insurance Department employees.

His reason: the bill's caption or title did not mention the subject. Texas' constitution requires that a bill's caption must state specifically what is in the bill. In this case, the caption did mention that Insurance Department employees could not accept gifts from industry people. But it did not say that industry people could not give them.

Each year a number of newly-passed laws are thrown out by the attorney general, or by courts, as being improperly written. Governor Daniel has suggested a bill-drafting division in the attorney general's department to help legislators avoid such errors.

## SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION

Self-employed people who are planning to file claim for social security benefits should bring copies of their 1957 tax return, including their Schedule C or Schedule F, plus a money-order stub, Internal Revenue receipt, or other evidence that the return was filed, according to John R. Sanderson, District Manager of the Amarillo Office of the Social Security Administration. The original of this return should be filed with the District Director of Internal Revenue.

Sanderson pointed out that it is expected that many self-employed persons who have reached retirement age (62 for women and 65 for men) will retire or limit their activities this year and apply for their social security benefits. He emphasized that the self-employed applicant's claim will be processed much sooner if he presents a copy of his income tax return, along with evidence that it has been filed with the Director of Internal Revenue.

Most people self-employed in a trade or business were covered by social security beginning with 1951 provided the annual net earnings are \$400 or more. Net earnings from self-employment

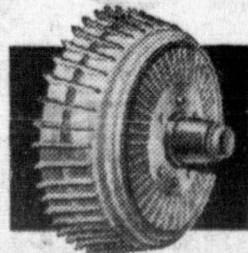

**DOG TOYS FOR CHRISTMAS**

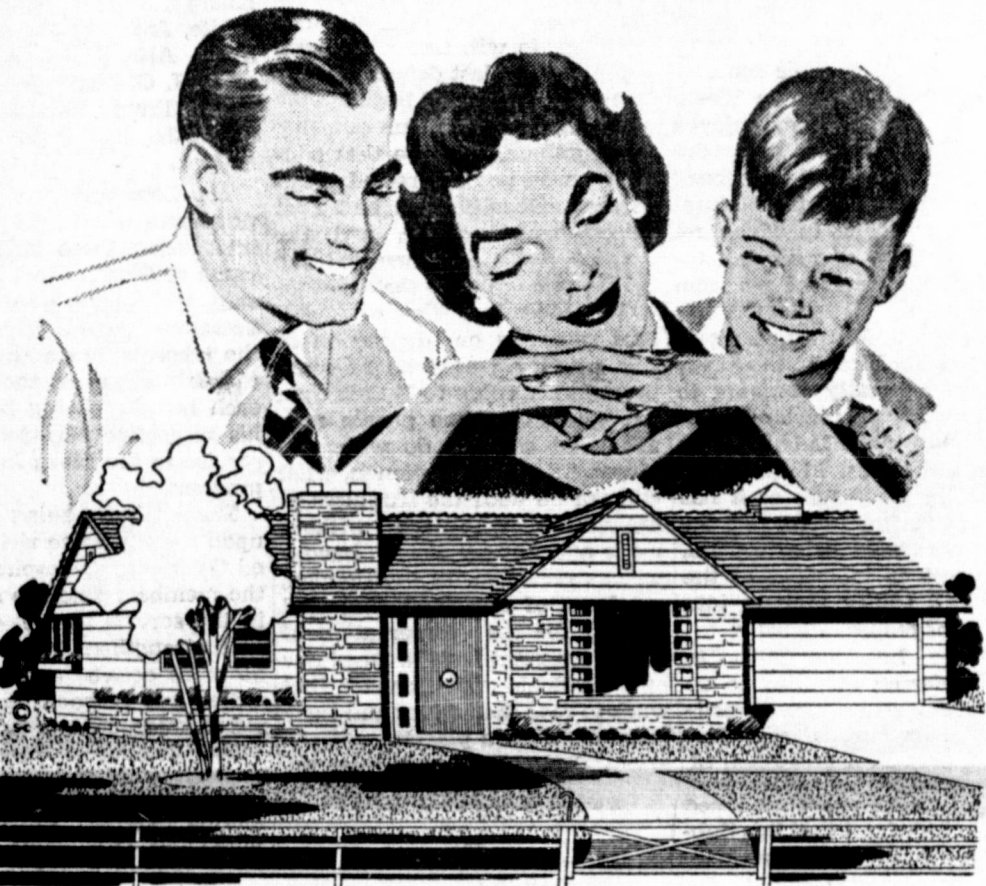

### TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18TH DISTRICT

#### HEADLINE ITEMS

Two matters of controversy in the National Capital fought for the headlines last week. On one day both seemed to win in one of the Washington papers, as both appeared in equal headings on the front page. One of these matters involved Texas, while the other was concerned with the investigating Subcommittee in the House of Representatives digging into the Federal Communication Commission's activities.

The item involving Texas was the letter written by the Republican Chairman of Texas in connection with soliciting funds for a \$100 a plate dinner to be addressed by Honorable Joseph Martin, the top leader of the Republican Party in the House of Representatives. Texas is always fair game for headlines in this part of the country. This letter, which appeared to be soliciting funds for political activities and talking about the Natural Gas Bill, was just too much for the commentators and columnists back here in the consumer areas. They hopped onto it like the proverbial duck hopped on the June bug. The opponents of the Natural Gas Bill were in high glee over the whole affair. It furnished them new ammunition with which to carry on their continuing fight to centralize in Washington the powers now enjoyed by many of the states. The entire transaction was a tragic setback to the proponents of the Natural Gas Bill, provisions in which are for the purpose of relieving independent producers of gas from domination by Washington bureaucracy. It might also be said that it was a setback to the forces that are continually striving to prevent further encroachment upon the rights of the individual, as well as the states. If the trend continues in the future as it has in the past, it would seem that the near future would bring control, either direct or indirect, of the rates on all utility matters into the hands of federal agencies.

The other headline item to which I referred also had to do with federal bureaus. The investigation of these boards and bureaus will furnish a great deal of news material in the future. Just about two weeks ago I predicted in a radio broadcast that this Subcommittee would be in front page news during this session of the Congress. I did not know at that time that it would land on the front page so quickly. All of the

present headlines have to do with only one of the several agencies that were intended to be investigated. If the headlines that came out of this agency can be used as a yardstick of what to expect in the future, the people can look forward to some interesting reading for the next several months.

Whatever may be the facts, the American people are entitled to know them in detail. The faster these are brought into the clear, the better for the country as a whole. If there has been wrongdoing by any of the boards or bureaus, proper action should and, no doubt, will be taken. If there has been wrongdoing on the part of the accusers, proper action should be taken in that respect. But, in any event, the whole story is due the people of this country, and I have full confidence that it will be forthcoming. Certainly my efforts will be directed to that end.

#### The RECESSION?

The question of whether or not there is a recession could be argued for a long time. The answer to the argument would be of little consequence. The real issue should concern what we are going to do about our economic situation to cure whatever recession might be present or to avoid whatever recession, if any, might be developing. It is my opinion that the entire difficulty can be cured through one segment of our economy. That is, the segment of the economy in which it began, to wit, the agricultural economy. The last depression that this country suffered began in the agricultural part of our economy and continued because that situation was not corrected. Our present difficulties can be traced directly to agriculture, and the quicker these are corrected the quicker we will stop the trend toward economic difficulty. A serious recession or depression in this country would be of more propaganda value to Russia than ten sputniks. Some people may ask what we will do with surpluses. The real question is, what will we do with the surpluses of individuals who are without work and hungry if we have a serious recession. In my opinion, surpluses of foodstuffs that God created for the preservation of man are a great benefit. Surpluses of individuals who cannot find work to feed themselves and their loved ones are a plague.

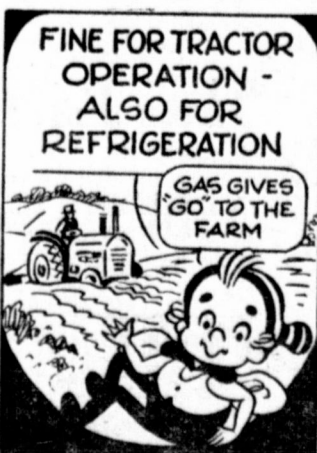
